ouisa travelled Humphry more than 4000km across the Pacific to start her life in New Zealand.

But home was never far behind.

For her service to the community and culture of Kiribati, her home country, Louisa was named an Honorary Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit, as part of the Queen's Birthday Honours announced Monday.

The Thames woman was born "under a coconut tree" in Kuria, Kiribati, an independent island

nation right on the equator.
"I came to New Zealand when
I was nearly 17, and I was lucky
enough to get a scholarship, and
went to school in New Plymouth. I stayed at Scotlands hostel.

"That was really a culture shock," she told The Profile.

"The language was a huge factor, because even though my written English was perfect, I couldn't stand in front of the class and tell them a story.

"It took me nearly a year to

"It took me nearly a year to be able to sit and converse with

people.

To Louisa, the food in New Zealand was strange, the milk was strange, and even the water was strange.

"Our water was really quite brackish in the islands, and it had a salty taste to it, so when we were given water here, I used to put a little dash of salt in it," she

She also had to have three hot water bottles placed in her hostel bed to keep her warm, considering the climate was so different to Kiribati.

"But I found that people were

my saving grace," she said. Louisa met her husband Jack Humphry when the latter was volunteering in her home country, and the pair got married on

the island in 1973.
"I come from a family of 10, so I said to my dad, you are not to give me any money, we have to start on our own... so we did,"

Louisa said. "We travelled from Kiribati on a boat to save money, and I was

a boat to save money, and I was seasick as a dog."

While on a bus in Fiji, heading toward a plane which would take them to New Zealand, Jack and Louisa serendipitously met a Kiwi who offered Jack a job at his welding company in Glen at his welding company in Glen Innes, Auckland.

We didn't have a car, but we went to a pawn shop, and took our watches off, our jewellery, gave them our gramophone, and had enough of a deposit to get a flat and bed and that was it," Louisa recalled. "We lived on coffee and bread and cheese un-

coffee and bread and cheese until Jack's first pay.

"And you really do appreciate life when you do it like that."

Throughout her time in New Zealand, Louisa helped set up a Kiribati community group in Auckland, and was part of the group who established some of the first Kiribati Independence celebrations and the body now recognised as the New Zealand Kiribati National Council.

Kiribati National Council.

In the 1970s, she was a key advocate for Kiribati's presence in Auckland Pasifika festivals. She was a member of the group who established the first Pacific health clinic in Hamilton, K'aute Pasifika Trust, and she also managed the Hamilton Combined

Christmas wonderland calls for festive helpers

Help is needed to bring a Christmas wonderland back to Thames for this year's silly season.

The Thames Christmas Wonderland is planned for December 11-24 but more hands on deck are required to ensure the event's survival.

Around 3500 people visited the wonderland - held at the Thames War Memorial Civic Centre - when it opened for the first time in 2016.

Organiser Nikky Fisher said the event's purpose was to create a safe environment for families to enjoy the magic of Christmas.

"It was also about creating traditions," she said.

"When our kids were little, we used to pop them in the car and go driving to look at all the houses, because there used to be lots of houses done up with lights. Now, you go driving and there's one house here, one there, and one there.

"So it was more about giving people somewhere to take their kids that was in a safe environment."

A meeting will be held on Monday, June 14 at 6pm at the GBD restaurant in Thames, and people who could help create the displays from now until Christmas were asked to attend.

The organisers also needed people to help set up the display, "man" the door during its opening hours, and pack down and clean up on Boxing Day.

Without help, Nikky said the event "will not exist".

"It's a really mammoth task." The December event breaks the Mary St Civic Centre into a "maze", with visitors able to navigate different rooms with different themes. Past themes included a fairy forest, Santa's toy shop, the north pole, and a reindeer stable.

There was also another room set aside for games and crafts, Nikky said.

The entry price was kept low, \$2, to ensure more families could attend and this year, Nikky's husband, artist Rick Fisher, has painted the 20-ft container holding the decorations with Santa Claus on the side.

Christian Food Bank from 2004 to 2019. She has been involved with the wider art community to preserve and share weaving practices to maintain Kiribati traditions.

As an artist herself, she has exhibited throughout New Zealand, and recently one of her and Whiritoa artist Kaetaeta Watson's works - Otintaai - was acquired by Te Papa museum.

acquired by Te Papa museum.

"In Kiribati, you weave because you need to live. You weave for a purpose: a basket to put your food in, a mat to sleep on... I've now gone and ventured into decorative things, and my mother would often say: 'What's that for?' and I'd say: 'It's pretty', and she'd say: 'But it's useless'.

"It's nice to retain your own

"It's nice to retain your own culture, so you're not lost," Louisa said.

"I always tell the kids who are born in New Zealand but are I-Kiribati, don't ever lose your identity, your language or your culture. It's everything that you are."

Louisa said she enjoyed working with children, and on June 11, she'll be making flax stars with the students of St Francis School in Thames for their Whānau Day.

Some of the works will then go on display at the St Francis Children's Matariki Arts Exhibition at The Vibe, Mary St, from June 24. Louisa said receiving the

Louisa said receiving the honorary MNZM - people who were not citizens of a Commonwealth realm were given "honorary" membership - was humbling.

"When you do things for people, you don't expect anything [in return]," she said.

"You do it because you want to do it, so when something like this happens, it's overwhelming; somebody feels you deserve it."



Chilli-eater turns up the heat at nationals

It was the chowing down on one of the world's hottest chillies at a Ngatea barbecue festival that propelled Wei Zhang on to the national stage of spice.

Now, she's been crowned the country's second-best chillieater, and the competition's top female competitor.

The Paeroa translator's heat history is long-spanning.

Growing up in the Chinese province Jiangxi meant eating spicy foods was second nature.

"In China, there are basically three provinces famous for their spicy foods, and my home province is one of them," she says. "If you grew up there and didn't eat spicy food, people would think you were strange. It's probably like if you grew up in New Zealand and didn't like fish and chips."

Wei grows her own chillies - her greenhouse was built around her jalapeno plant - and often asks Indian or Thai restaurants to cook her meal "as spicy as you can".

"And they always want to double check: 'Are you sure, are you sure?""

So when Ngatea local Adam Matete organised Hauraki Plains' first Up in Smoke barbe-

cue festival earlier this year and included a chilli-eating competition, Wei's love for spicy food saw her enter.

She had never entered a chilli-eating competition before but despite that, she won.

It was her impressive polishing off of a Carolina Reaper chilli that qualified her to enter the NZ Chilli Eating Champs in Auckland last month, where competition was fierce.

"We were given different kinds of chillies, from mild to hot, and we were required to chew the chilli for 30 seconds and then swallow the whole thing except the stalk," Wei says. "Then, we waited another four minutes before being served another, hotter, chilli."

Wei's lips began to burn after eating another Carolina Reaper, but still, there was more to come. "Because the contestants were so good, even the Carolina Reaper couldn't knock out many people, so the organiser decided to serve 'chilli kebabs' - just four chillis on one toothpick." By the final round, Wei and the eventual champion had already eaten 40 chillies each.

"In the last round, we were going to have to eat 10 of the hottest chillies in the world, and at that stage I thought: 'I don't really want to throw up in


front of so many people'."

Wei said she thoroughly enjoyed the event, and while she wouldn't pursue chilli-eating as a talent per se, she would love to participate in more events, and to see more females giving it a go. "It does require practice," she says. "But the more you eat spicy foods, the spicier you can get."



Travel agent still stuck in Covid-19 'nightmare'

Travellers making up themravellers making up for lost selves in for a two-week stay on a tropical island, marking a slow and steady return to international tourism

But travel agents are still feeling the pinch of the pandemic, with one saying that while some businesses begin to move on, they are still stuck in the Covid-19 "nightmare".

Jo Robinson, the co-owner of helloworld Travel in Thames, said the tourism and travel industry continued to struggle, one year since the country exited lockdown restrictions on June 9, 2020.

"I think 90 per cent of industries have overcome the financial stress Covid put on them, and some of them are actually now better off than they were pre-Covid, except the tourism and travel industry," she said.

'We're still living the Covid nightmare.

Jo said it had been really challenging having no government support, apart from the 12-week subsidy last year. They were still also trying to get families reunited.

'We're still sending the odd person overseas and still trying to get people back.

One is going back to England in July, and I've been working with them for a year.

Another was one of my first clients who came in after lockdown, trying to bring his family back to New Zealand. It's been 14 months of us trying to get his family back.

However, the opening of the Cook Island travel bubble in May, in which travellers could fly to and from the Cook Islands quarantine-free, was a blessing



helloworld Travel's Jo Robinson said it's been a slow start to international travel, but there is, at least, a 'light at the end of the tunnel'.

for the industry, she said.

"After the Cook Island bubble was announced, we were crazy busy for the next two weeks.

"Our first clients that flew out last Saturday to Rarotonga are off on a two-week holiday, and I've got another lot going out for a two-week holiday this Saturday.

People are going for longer and are excited and are counting down their sleeps.

However, travel to tralia was moving at a slower pace - although people travel-

ling across the ditch for sports games or live shows was proving popular.

Jo said the timeline to travel returning to total normality was like shifting goalposts, but at least there was "light at the end of the tunnel now".

Her Pollen St agency still operates between the Covidreduced hours of 9am-2.3opm, Monday to Friday, with four staff working part-time.

They can help people redeem their airfare credit, plan a holiday, and navigate the "chal-

lenging" policies, declarations and regulations that now came with international travel.


"That support is key because we've had people in recently that booked things online but were struggling with connections on the phone, or changing things.

Creativity sessions hone in on artistic instincts

The woman behind the new aptly named 'The Creativity Sessions' in the centre of Thames wants people to reinvigorate their artistic instinct.

Deb Brock has run creativity workshops for two decades, and said everybody had the ability to be expressive.

"If you think you're not creative, that's not true. Every human is creative and it comes out in different ways," she said.

"Art is a very personal thing, and it's unique to every individual."

Deb, who runs workshops at Artsider, one of the vocational spaces of the Supported Life Style Hauraki Trust, said there was a huge gap in the Thames community in terms of creativity sessions for the general public.

So, The Creativity Sessions was born, and now provided a space where people could "generally just chill and be creative for a couple of hours", she said.

The first few sessions have been located in the back room of Nectar, but from Thursday, June 17, Deb will run the sessions from one of the upstairs rooms at the old Post Office in the centre of Pollen St.

The two-hour sessions could be based around art forms such as painting, drawing, sewing,



knitting, printmaking, sculpture, and stitching.

There was at this stage one morning and one afternoon session every Thursday, with the possibility of an evening session being established if the interest was there, Deb said.

"The way I'm viewing the sessions is that the people who

come to them would almost treat it like how they go to yoga once a week. The Creativity Sessions are the same really; it could be the one thing they do that week that is about them."

Deb said there was some structure around the sessions, but it was not an "art class"; however, high quality materials were provided for use on the

day.
"I often use the analogy of making a cake: if I gave you really awful flour and sugar and rancid butter and said 'make a nice cake', could you make a nice cake?

"It's the same with materials," she said. "With art and

creativity, you need good materials to produce something that you like."

DETAILS: The Creativity Sessions run on Thursdays, from 10am-12pm, and 1pm-3pm, and hold a maximum of eight people. It costs \$25 per session which includes teas, coffees, materials and tutorina.

New winter checklist released

The farming sector has developed new wintering checklist and wintering checklist and wintering designed to help ter grazing plans designed to help farmers make practical written plans for winter.

The advice is in line with new guidelines recently released by MPI.

The resources are now available from industry bodies DairyNZ, Beef + Lamb New Zealand and Federated Farmers. A comprehensive winter grazing plan is also available through the Ministry for Primary Industries

The new wintering checklist helps farmers assess whether they are prepared for winter and highlight any

potential gaps.

The checklist is supported by other new initiatives, such as webinars, workshops and regular information from industry bodies collaborating on advice to farmers to ensure it is co-ordinated and consistent.

DairyNZ farm performance general manager Sharon Morrell encourages farmers to make use of the new re-sources, as it helped take the right steps to continuing to lift winter graz-

ing standards.

"Planning for winter and wet weather now is important to deliver good outcomes when adverse weath-

er arrives," she said.
"Farmers will begin moving stock on to crops in the next few weeks, so now is the critical time to ensure all plans are in place for the months ahead. We are all committed to lift-ing winter grazing performance and using a wintering checklist and prac-tical plan helps farmers and graziers to do that" to do that.

In addition, DairyNZ's new winter grazing plan provides step-by-step

strategies for paddock set-up and grazing management for immediate focus this winter. This includes protecting critical source areas and waterways, bale placement, back fencing and having a wet weather contingency plan. Beef + Lamb New Zealand will also


Man missing in the Waihōu



As part of a Valley Profile series, **MEGHAN HAWKES** explores our local history by seeking out stories of life and death in the Thames Valley

Robert Floyd had completely vanished. The distinctive looking man - a 20-year-old African American from Brooklyn, New - was one moment standing near the galley door of the steamer *Patiki* as it loaded cargo and the next he was gone. There were several people on deck at the time he disappeared but no-one saw Robert go overboard and no splash was heard.

It was about 9.45 on a June morning in 1898 and the *Patiki* was alongside Fisher's Landing, Netherton, on a run from Paeroa to Thames. Thomas Matthews, steward, called to Robert a couple of times to come to breakfast but got no answer. Shortly af-ter loading, the steamer resumed her trip and a baffled Thomas started searching for Robert. Miss Etta McPeake, a Thames dressmaker, was feeling mystified too. When near the landing, she was sitting on the deck watching the men unload a plough whe

she also observed a dog on the bank. Subsequently she heard it growl and then to her astonishment she saw the animal float past in the

About 12 minutes after Robert had been missed, when they had gone down river about three miles, Thomas informed the captain. The captain turned the steamer around. He sent a man up the masthead to ascertain whether he could see Robert on the bank anywhere, thinking that if he had fallen off he might have swum ashore.

When Thomas told Miss McPeake it was thought Robert had fallen overboard she said with alarm: "Oh! That is what I saw in the water." Miss McPeake pointed out the spot and the area was dragged for more than two hours. Dynamite was discharged after which they started dragging again. This time Robert's body was found near the spot indicated. When the *Patiki* came into Thames, Constable Hodgson received the

body and lodged it in the morgue. Robert had nothing of value on his person and no property on board the ship. He had been a cook on the Patiki for three weeks and prior to that had been a cook on the Roto-mahana. He was a cheerful man on good terms with everyone on board. He was single with no relations in the colony. He could not swim as far as anyone knew. Thomas Matthews, the steward, speculated Robert had been trying to shoot pigeons with his cata-pult and had over reached and fallen in. Thomas had looked and couldn't find the catapult either. An inquest found Robert Floyd was accidentally drowned in the Waihōu River. He was buried at Shortland cemetery, his funeral attended by the employees of the Northern Steamship Company and many of the general public. A Miss Gibson sent a lovely wreath which was placed on the coffin of the man who was there one minute and gone the next.

Ngatea rugby field 'like playing on concrete'

here's no need to visit Roto-**⊥** rua for its mud baths, we've got them right here - at Hugh Hayward Domain.

That's the belief of Doug Connors, who is hesitant to market the Ngatea field as a new spa destination, but the state of the grounds, especially after weather events, has left him no choice.

We know it's not the best of dirt or drainage, we know that this is the Hauraki Plains, but we've had comments that it's one of the worst playing fields in the Thames Valley," he said.

Mr Connors is the president of the Ngatea Rugby and Sports Club, and on behalf of the codes who train and play on the field, made a submission to Hauraki District Council as part of its long term plan (LTP) hearings on May 18-19.

Mr Connors said the club had been told "multiple times" over the years the upgrade and repair of the number one field at the domain would be included in council's next LTP: however. "nothing ever happens, and no feedback is ever received".

He told The Profile he understood council had plans to make the upgrades in 2025, but waiting another four years could be injurious to players using the field.

"There are ruts from where the earth has sunk from where the soak drains have been installed [and] this is a major health and safety concern due to players twisting ankles," he

"The lack of grass on the field will be like playing on concrete.

Mr Connors also understood an irrigator which cost council around \$15,000 has been used only once since it was purchased five years ago.

The irrigation system was deemed "not fit for purpose" and would take around 16-18 hours to irrigate one rugby field, he said.

There were also no lights on the grounds, which meant the junior league had to travel to Waitakaruru for their evening games.

Mr Connors was now calling on council to bring forward

any plans to repair the field to 2022. He also asked for a better irrigation system and new lighting.

"Get it so it's a good playing field for all codes, not just for rugby, but for touch rugby and athletics," he said.

According to Hauraki District Council's parks and reserves manager Paul Matthews, the council acknowledged the purchase of the irrigator was "a mistake".

They have plans to sell the

unit and replace it with something more appropriate after discussions with the Hugh Hayward Domain Users Committee.

Mr Matthews also told The Profile the fields were audited every six months by a turf consultant, and the consultant had never referred to their condition as either "poor or unsafe".

"In which case, we would close the field," Matthews said. 'Having said that, we're aware the field will need a complete renovation sometime in the next few years.

Council has allowed \$50,000 in its draft 2021-31 LTP for the field's renovations for 2024-25.

It has deliberated on all the submissions to its draft 2021-31 long term plan and, once it's adopted, will respond in-dividually to all submitters on the outcomes of the points they have raised.

It's expected the LTP will be adopted at a council meeting on June 23.
