Six months on from a "nightmare" dog attack in Waihi, Yifat Goddard still doesn't have the full use of her hand. KELLEY TANTAU reports

t was a quiet Saturday morning when Yifat Goddard decided to go for a walk around her neighbourhood.

The Waihī woman was still in view of her house when a dog ran from a property and attacked her, unprovoked.

By the time I looked back, the dog was in my face. I put my hand out and he grabbed me and dragged me a little bit down the street until I held a plant

"I could hear the bones breaking," she said. "I knew straight away there was a problem.'

Yifat was one of 21 people attacked by a dog in the Hauraki district in the year to June, 2022.

According to the local council, this number had "increased considerably" from 11 reported dog attacks on people in the previous year. There were also 205 reports of roaming dogs.

Despite this, Hauraki District Council did not believe there was a 'significant issue" with dogs in the district.

But Yifat and the man who stopped to help her disagree.

"The owner got a \$200 fine... and it costs more if you don't pick up your dog's faeces [\$300]," Yifat

"It's not that I am against the owner, I'm against the fact that there are dog attacks and they can be avoided with a bit more force from the council.

A man working in the area on the morning of March 26, who asked not to be named, saw the attack unfold. He said the dog ran across the street and "flew itself at Yifat, proceeding to bite down on her arm.

"The screaming that was going on... it was a nightmare.

# og attack victim unable to use hand

He believed there was a problem with roaming and unregistered dogs in the town, and that it was the council's job to police the issue.

"I've seen dog attacks be-fore; I've seen the wounds of the person after it happened. If a human did that, I'd expect them to go through the courts. Who is taking responsibility for these attacks?" he asked.

'I don't want anyone else to witness what I witnessed.

The incident left Yifat bloodied and bruised on the sidewalk. She needed at least 40 stitches and still does not have the full use of her hand.

The owner of the dog - which was registered as a Bull Mastiff cross - euthanised their pet voluntarily.

Six months later, Yifat has only just started to drive again.

"I don't walk anymore. I'm too scared. That's the mental damage that comes with cases like this," she said.

I can't go to friends' houses that have dogs, unless they tie them or put them in another room, so, yes, it has its impacts, absolutely."

According to a council report, dog attacks on other dogs or animals remained higher than attacks on humans, with 31 reported incidents in the past year. The number of infringement notices filed to court was slightly up compared with in-fringements in the previous year, from 62 to 74 in 2021/22.

No prosecutions were under-

taken in the 2021/22 year.

"The owner of the offending dog [in Yifat's case] rang council and reported the incident," a council spokesperson told *The* 

They surrendered the dog to our animal control officer within an hour of the event taking place. The dog was euthanised the following day.

"Our animal control officer visited Ms Goddard a couple of days after the event and talked through what action we had taken in regards to the offend-

ing dog and the fine issued to the owner. The matter was reported to the police."

In total, 479 incidents were reported to council between July, 2021, to June, 2022.

Council's spokesperson said the number of roaming dogs was low two years ago (171) and this was most likely a result of the Covid-19 lockdowns and people working from home.

In the two years prior, council recorded 206 and 259 re-

ports of roaming dogs.
"We do not believe that there

is a significant issue with dogs in our district, but any dog at-tack is a concern and something that we take very seriously," they said.

DETAILS: Should anyone observe

a roaming dog or are threatened or attacked by a dog, council asks that people call as soon as possible. It also helps if people are able to send pictures of the dog. Council's phones are monitored 24/7: 07 862 8609 or 0800 734



# Thieves fleece \$2k from bank account

A Waihī woman is reminding people to be money-aware after her Visa debit card was used to fleece her of \$2000.

Dale Fleetwood noticed Waihī woman is reminding

something was wrong with her finances on June 4, after her debit card kept declining at petrol stations and supermarkets.

"It was so embarrassing. You get up to the check-out, and your card declines... I got rather ill over it, to be frank," she told *The Profile*.

But Dale kept the problem to herself, believing it to be some sort of error with her superannuation payments, and didn't alert her family.

It was more than a week later when she got through to her bank - Kiwibank - and was im-mediately told someone was withdrawing money from her account.

"I was going hungry, but that was my own fault," she said. "I should have contacted my fam-

ily."
She went to Kiwibank in Thames before being transferred to the bank's fraud department, which she said initially told her they wouldn't be able to reimburse her funds. Then, they agreed to deposit \$50, then, finally the full \$2000. "When I found out what had happened, I went to the [Waihī] Police, and the receptionist there was absolutely

brilliant. She said it was very common, and they gave me a big box of food, which blew me

Dale said the thief appeared to be someone living in New Zealand, as there was an array of TradeMe purchases and transactions made in North-

She has since received a new bank card and the offending seems to have stopped, but she still doesn't know what happened for her account to have been targeted.

"[People] said I must have dropped my card somewhere and someone's come along... but no, that was not the case," she said. "Nothing like this has ever happened to me and I never want it to happen again, and even though it did happen, I still don't know how it happened."

Dale is now cautioning peo-ple to keep their wits about them when using social media and when sharing account de-

"Never, ever give anyone your

bank details," she said.

"The bank and the police kept asking if I do internet banking and no, I don't. They asked if I buy anything online. No, I

Dale also said victims of online scams need to ask for help from friends and family.

from friends and family.

"It's just so personal," she said. "You think you've done something wrong. But if something is wrong, don't ignore it."

A Kiwibank spokesperson told *The Profile* it was really important for victime to

"If you've been the victim of unauthorised activity on your accounts, we'll reimburse any money you've lost as long as you've complied with our general terms and conditions, haven't acted dishonestly or negligently, and have taken reasonable steps to protect your banking," they said.

Kiwibank advises taking

several measures to stay safe: Keep your contact details up to date so a bank can let you know if it notices anything suspicious; don't let your card out of your sight – if a retailer needs to swipe your card, make sure they give it back to you straight any whore possible straight away; where possible, swipe your card through Eftpos terminals yourself; check your statements for any transactions that you don't recognise; and never give your card details to someone over the phone unless you initiated the call and you know the company is reputa-

# Thousands of kai packs created at college

More than 5000 meals have been made by students at Waihī College this year, filling a hunger gap within the Hauraki community.

Every Wednesday, a group of predominantly Year 12 students - lead by school service leader Divyash Swamy - don aprons and prepare around 200 kai packs which are then offered for free to the public.

It's a "heartwarming" act

It's a "heartwarming" act of goodwill that is worth one lunchtime a week to pursue, Divyash said.

"It's become huge now, but the only thing that could be improved on is the [number of students] who come," he told The Profile

"When we first started, a lot of Year 13s came and this class-room used to be full of people, but it's kind of lowered in numbers. I'm completely fine with missing out on one lunchtime a week, and we have just as much fun here as we do sitting outside."

Creating kai packs at the college kicked off this year, when technology teacher Siobhan Fitzgerald noticed how much food was being wasted when students - absent from school due to Covid-19 - did not collect

their free lunches.

To combat this waste, they arranged to use the remaining raw ingredients to create meals for the public.

Divyash said the solution was "a really good way to give back to the community".

"It makes me feel happy, in a way, because it shows that people are receiving what we're giving them, but it also gives me the sense that there are so many people out there who need help.

"That's what motivates us to keep us going and give as much as we can."

Mrs Fitzgerald said the student helpers were "incredible" and gave credit to Divyash's commitment.

"This young man brings a crew every single week. He's our service leader and he's really risen to that role," she said. "It's mostly Year 12s who are coming, and I think they just enjoy the fact they can do something for someone else."

Around 200 food portions are

made up each Wednesday, and are stored in one of the college's three freezers. Members of the public are welcome to walk into the student centre and fill up a bag. Almost every week, the freezers need to be refilled, Mrs Fitzgerald said.

"Sometimes people don't feel comfortable coming here; there's a bit of a stigma still around it, so we're trying to make it as open and as easy to access as we can.

"But doing it this way means it can get to the right people."

Meanwhile, the college is

Meanwhile, the college is gearing up for its annual head shave event to raise funds for leukaemia.

The event will take place at the school on Thursday, September 29 at 6.30pm, and the college is encouraging a great audience support.

With a gold coin entry, attendees can lap up the music and entertainment, sausage sizzle, and all the hair-chopping action. Cash donations can be made on the night, and if brave visitors want to join in at the spur of the moment, they are welcome to partake. Last year the college raised \$9724 and was hoping to achieve the same feat in 2022.

# Lack of prostate resources a 'horror stor

Prostate cancer kills as many men as breast cancer kills women, so why is there less information about it in local health centres? KELLEY TAN-TAU continues her coverage of prostate cancer awareness during Blue September.

little over a week ago, Barry Ayoung was in a Thames cafe talking to a man about prostate

"I said to the bloke: 'You're about the age, have you had a check-up?

"He said: 'No, I'll never do

that. If I get it, so what?"
A number of reactions
coursed through Barry's body. As a former president of the New Zealand Prostate Cancer Foundation, and as a man who was diagnosed with the disease


more than 20 years ago, his first thought was that the stranger was "stupid".

"Second - I wondered if I should've done more to per-suade him. Third - it was to, as I did walk away from it and won-

did, walk away from it and won-der what can you do?" Barry tells it clearly. He has watched men die with the dis-

Every year, more than 4000 Kiwi blokes are diagnosed with prostate cancer and around 650-700 die from it.

Barry says he is "more than emotionally involved" because he was diagnosed when he was

He doesn't want to tempt fate, but says "at this time" he is free of the cancer, and credits his positive outcome to good doctoring.

He was sent for a biopsy after his PSA test - a test that measures the amount of prostate-spe-cific antigen in the blood - came back with a reading of 4.

"The first biopsy... nothing. But, being a good doctor, he said: 'I really think we should do another'. I discussed it with my wife, Caroline, and she said: 'Barry, they're trying to tell you something'.

Cells showing signs of change were found in Barry's body, and

eventually, he asked for a radical prostatectomy, a major operation which moves the removal of the entire prostate gland and surrounding lymph nodes. "And I'm still here 25 years

later.

When he moved to Thames, Barry set up a group for all men's cancers, but said he was now becoming "convinced" he needed to do more about prostate cancer.

He visited the Thames Medical Centre and Te Korowai to look for information on the disease but couldn't find any.

"I was in here [Thames Medi-cal] some weeks ago, and went to the brochures, and while I was looking, one of the doctors came out and said: 'Can I help you?" I said: 'I'm looking for information about prostate can-

cer, and I can't see any'.

"At neither place is there any information about prostate cancer. So, what is going on?

"Is this right through the

country? If it is, it's a bloody

horror story." Paul Hayes, the NZ Prostate Cancer Foundation's fundraising and marketing manager who manages Blue September, told *The Profile* the lack of availability of information on prostate cancer in GP and other health clinics was an ongoing

"As far as we are aware, most Te Whatu Ora Health NZ regions do not routinely provide this information in either their hospital clinics or to primary healthcare clinics in their re-

He said the Prostate Cancer Foundation had many different leaflets, posters, and other information tools that were available for both hospital and primary healthcare clinics to use, free of charge.

# Waikino School fights for full status

Hauraki school is left won-Adering why it's not allowed to accept students in Year 7 and 8, an option its principal says would be beneficial to tamariki not ready for a "jump

in learning".

Waikino School has been trying to get the Ministry of Education to approve enrolment for Year 7 and 8 pupils (ages 10-13) since 2019, but principal Jo Wheway says her attempts have been unsuccess-

Now, a proposed enrolment scheme for the neighbouring Karangahake School has motivated Jo to try again.

"Ninety-nine per cent of our kids go to Waihi College, which has an intermediate, and most of our kids are ready to go to that intermediate," she ex-

"So if we have an option for kids to stay, it's actually only for those who aren't develop-

mentally ready for that next big jump in learning."

The proposed enrolment scheme for Karangahake School extends enrolment for Year 7s and 8s further than its enrolment for Year 1-6s

It spans eastwards to include the area surrounding Waikino School, securing the option for Waikino leavers to enrol at Karangahake, 6km away across the gorge.

Jo would instead prefer the option of Year 7 and 8s staying



at Waikino, should they choose

to.
"It may not be significant that numbers, but it's what that child needs," she said. "Most are happy to go off to the college... but moving school for two years, to then move schools again is quite a stupid thing to do to a child because it'll mess

them up on their journey."
Jo surveyed her students' parents and one called the pro-

posal "absurd". "The children of Waikino have developed strong relation-

ships through all year levels. To force them to move schools would be detrimental to all areas of their development," they said. "It is a real concern this

has even been proposed."

Another said their child should not be "pushed" out of the school because of "zoning" bureaucracy

'Waikino is a verv holistic. special, and unique school, and my son needs Waikino as much and as long as possible for his educational hauora."

Ministry of Education hautū

(leader) operations and integration Sean Teddy told *The Profile* consultation on the proposed Karangahake School zone was currently underway, and Waikino School had been sent the information on where to make a submission to the process.

"When making a decision on whether or not to establish an enrolment zone, the Ministry of Education considers how to make best use of the schooling network and manage the school roll in order to protect

the school from overcrowding,

he said.
"Consideration is also given to natural boundaries, current transport entitlement zones for schools, and any enrolment schemes already in place at neighbouring or contributing schools.

The Ministry of Education did not say why Waikino School was not able to accommodate Year 7 and 8 students.

**QUEEN ELIZABETH II DIES** 


Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II died at the age of 96 on September 8 at Balmoral Castle, surrounded by her family. Her son King Charles III said the death of his mother was a "moment of great sadness" for him and his family. Thames-Coromandel District Council will fly its flag at half-mast from the announcement of her death up to and including the day of the funeral, except on Proclamation Day - the day the new Sovereign is announced officially, when flags are to be flown from the top of the mast. A ceremony was held at Parliament on September 11 to celebrate the accession of King Charles III as sovereign of New Zealand. # Thames memories inspire new sculpture

A temporary sculpture inspired by warm memories of Thames is the newest to be installed by Thames Public Art Trust.

The 3-metre high corten steel and stainless steel sculpture, at the corner of Pollen and Campbell streets, was designed by Auckland artist Jay Hogan who now hopes the public's interpretations of it would provide him with ideas for the sculpture's name.

"It's a new format for me to try something new and see what people's opinions would be, but also to show people what calibre I'm at now and to be able to become noticed in Aotearoa for my skill set.
"I spend a lot of time in

"I spend a lot of time in Thames with my daughter due to my mother bringing me here as a child and staying at various lodges and family baches and I thought the town could do with something very unique.

"I'd also gone through a lot of healing in the mountains of Thames and I was inspired by different koros and the sheer height of the sculpture incorporates the mountains."

Thames Public Art Trust trustee Rob Johnston told The Profile the new sculpture, which was installed on September 8, was always part of the trust's plan to have more tem-

porary art in the town. "Jay was introduced to me through Fiona Cameron at the end of 2019, and he presented this particular work to us as an option and wondered whether we'd be interested, and we were," he said.

"We had been in discussion with Thames-Coromandel District Council from around that time and really spent time ironing out the best place in town that it would go.

"So we finally got it on the ground after quite a while but it's very satisfying to finally get it installed and I think it looks fantastic."

Rob said the trust covered most of the project's costs

which included a \$3000 to \$4000 plinth, a roughly \$1300 resource consent application fee and base preparation costs.

"We've also had people help
us out generously with some
of the other things that would
have cost us money ourselves
like engineering works from
[Thames engineer] Nelson Val-

iant, who did the calculations," he said.

"Then GDC Consultants Ltd checked them... and we've also had Rod Atkin from Watson Engineering who actually very generously lifted the plinth in for us at his cost, so he's done us a favour there as well."

Rob said the trust had a licence from council to occupy for two years.

for two years.

"But these works are always owned by the artist, so it's only a gift at the moment on loan."


Jay said he planned to auction off the sculpture within the next 12 months and would donate 30 per cent of the proceeds to Thames Public Art Trust.

Rob said an official opening of the new sculpture would take place on September 17 at 11am, and is open to the public

11am, and is open to the public.

"Jay's going to come down with family, his mentor and friends and the public art trust would do the same with our supporters and people that had chipped in and helped with this, so it should be a good little opening."

Rob said he was also arranging an official reopening of the Colour Harmonics sculpture at Moanataiari to take place on the same day. The sculpture was reinstalled by the trust in December last year after high winds toppled it three months earlier.

# Rearing to go with donated lambs

Hikutaia School students are currently preparing donated lambs for their local agricultural days in October.

Rose Walmsley, who owns a drystock farm on Old Maratoto Rd in Hikutaia, told *The Profile* she collected the woolly creatures from a Spring Sheep Milk Company farm near Te Awamutu in August.

"Spring Sheep this year have been offering free lambs for rearing and for agricultural day or personal use so we rang them up and placed an order," she said.

"The 30 lambs that I picked up were weathered and they can't be bred, so we're almost helping the sheep farm out by taking these lambs because they're almost a by-product of the industry."

Rose, whose four daughters are also taking part in the

agricultural days at Hikutaia School, said the students met her at her property on August 22 to choose their lamb.

"It was quite cute actually, they were so happy, they all had a turn to look at the lambs and pick which one they wanted and they were so excited all cuddling their lambs," she said.

"The kids took them home and they'll be feeding them before and after school and some of them are still giving the lambs a bottle at night.

"We only had two entrants last year [for lambs] so If we can get most of the kids to bring those animals, we will have a big leap in lamb numbers



# Prostate info an 'issue'

"The foundation has plans to distribute the education materials it produces on prostate cancer more proactively to relevant health clinics in the future. This is an expensive exercise and is one of the reasons why we run fundraising campaigns like Blue September to raise the funds that enable us to do this.

Paul said even though prostate cancer was the most diagnosed cancer in New Zealand, little or no information about it was produced by Te Whatu Ora Health NZ or Te Aho O Te Kahu Cancer Control

The foundation "would really like" its educational brochures to be available in all relevant hospital clinics and in GP surgeries, but as a charity, it had not been in a position to send them out to clinics in an unsolicited manner.

Te Korowai Hauora o Hauraki told The Profile its brochure stands in its Whānau Health Centres were supplied by MediBoard, who also managed all of the content included on them.

A staff member checked the resources and confirmed there were none relating to prostate cancer; however, Te Korowai said its Whānau Health Centres would be "very happy" to make some prostate cancer informational resources available going forward.

Thames Medical Centre's stands were also managed by MediBoard, and practise manager Carolyn Sara said various foundations often sent informaton and brochures, which the GP displays where suitable. A check of MediBoard's downloadable brochures online did not show

any prostate cancer options.

"You ask why this is not out and around, and I don't know," Barry says.

"Women have done what they do for women's health - breast cancer, cervical cancer - brilliantly, but prostate can-

cer... I think it's largely because it's to do with men's sexuality. We're bullet proof until it's proved otherwise," he says.

Barry encourages men to get checkups from the age of 40. He also encourages them to ask for PSA tests.

This, to me, is the most insidious fact that everyone needs to know: in its early stages, prostate cancer does not usually exhibit symptoms. So, men have it, and they don't know they've got it.

"When symptoms do begin to occur, it is then usually too late for effective cura-

tive treatment. That's the horror of this

bloody thing."



## Explosion claims man's life



As part of a Valley Profile series, **MEGHAN HAWKES** explores our local history by seeking out stories of life and death in the Thames Valley

In February 1916 John Peters, the Kaiaua postmaster, returning from Pokeno, alighted from the train at Mercer expecting to have a horse waiting for him.

Finding it was not there, he began walking along the road in the direction of Kaiaua. He came across one of George Stubbs' wagons and got a lift as far as Stubbs' farm at Mangatangi. On arrival at the farm, George offered John the loan of a horse, but discovered all his horses turned out for the night. It was now nearly 9pm and John had about seven miles to go. George offered to drive John home in his car and directed one of his employees, Rangi, to fill the tank. In the corrugated iron barn where the car was housed, John took a seat in the front of the car and Rangi the back. George tried starting the engine with a crank but it failed to catch. George then discovered that Rangi had emptied kerosene into the tank instead of benzine. He began pumping the liquid out by the light of a candle placed on



a ledge at the back of the car. Suddenly a blue flame shot up, there was a violent explosion and the whole building was enveloped in flames. George was blown through the doorway of the shed and lay stunned on the ground for a minute or two. Rangi dived through the window at the other end of the building, but the sash of the window fell and pinned his foot. He hung face downwards on the outside wall until he was able to wiggle himself free and then fell to the ground.

By the time George and Rangi regained their wits a fierce fire was racing from one end of the barn to the other, the flames being fed by tins of benzine and kerosene. There was no way to fight the fire and no way to rescue John. Rangi was badly cut and George severely shaken but he rode a horse fifteen miles to Mercer and informed Constable Horan what had happened. John's wife and children were staying in Auckland but on learning the dreadful news, they returned to Kaiaua. At the inquest it was established that the vapour

of the benzine that was being pumped out of the car spread to the candle causing the explosion. The jury found that John Peters was accidentally killed, no blame being attachable to anyone. They added a rider that attention should be called to the danger of using benzine in proximity to lights or fire, owing to its highly volatile nature.

John, 53, was a married man with three children. He farmed an extensive tract of country at Kaiaua. He had been postmaster and mail carrier there for seven or eight years and was much respected in the district. The Peters family, originally from Scotland, had been connected with Kaiaua since its early days.

As well as running the post office and store, they donated land for the site of the first Kaiaua School. Their property was the original site of Kaiaua township. Although the funeral was reported to have taken place in Kaiaua, cemetery records show that John was interred at Hillsborough cemetery, Auckland.

o it's been about four years since we So it's been about four years since the named Splintas Firewood. And what a roller coaster ride it has been.

# Car restoration a passion project

The "dream" for Wayne Bennett looks something like this: driving his restored 1955 Chevrolet 210 along the state highway; his family spread along the backseat; a fish and chip stop at Mount Maunganui; a weekend spent on the road.

This is the dream that has underpinned two years and countless hours of car restoration, a feat that is finally nearing completion for the Paeroa man.

It's his first attempt at restoring a vintage vehicle - he says it's his last - and it all began with a motor.

When Wayne was a teenager, he and his brother and mates used to cruise around in a Vauxhall Victor that had a 327 Chevy motor inside it.

He sold the car when he was 19, but 25 years later, he bought the Chevy motor back from the same guy he sold it to.

This was the catalyst for the restoration that would span the next two years.

At the end of 2020, Wayne purchased a chassis and shell of a 1955 Chev from his uncle, John Burndred.

He then bought a 4-speed manual for the gearbox, inserted a new ignition, attached a

grill and bumper and dash, and chose an earth-green paint colour for the body.

"It's easy to bolt things together, it's like a jigsaw puzzle," he said, "but when it comes to things like the electrical work, I've paid people to help me with that."

like a Massey Ferguson tractor he bought off his dad and refurbished around a decade ago.

But though it's been a longhaul, Wayne said he was proud of himself and the helpful locals for seeing the project through to its end.

Rick Purcell, Steve Richards, Ajay's Ford V8 Parts, John Smith, Advanced Auto Refinishers, Wayne's panel beater Alex, and his uncle, John Burndred, had been instrumental in the 55 Chev's outcome, he said.

Wayne was now looking forward to debuting the car at Rotary Paeroa's Vintage and Classic Car Swap Meet this weekend, and also had plans to attend the Whangamata Beach Hop in November.

"He did say it was a 10-year project, but once he got into it, I guess there was that thrill of getting each phase done," his wife Amanda said.

"It's been his dream, and it's nice to see it come to reality."

The Vintage and Classic Car Swap Meet will this year be held at the grounds at the end of Railway St instead of at the traditional location on Wharf St.

As well as a swap meet and car displays, there'll also be food stalls, kids activities, and live entertainment. Funds raised from the event will go toward community projects.
