Before he got the phone call new Mayor of Thames-Coromandel, Len Salt was setting up a sound system for an event in Whitianga's town hall.

up a sound system for an event in Whitianga's town hall. But after the news broke around 3pm on Saturday, Len admitted it was hard to focus on anything else.

admitted it was hard to locus on anything else. "It takes a little while to really get your head around it," he said, "and it's quite a transition because up until that point, you're focused on the election and there's two ways it can go: you either succeed and go forward down that path, or you don't succeed and your life takes a different turn.

"So, a big part of Saturday was just knowing with some certainty what was happening next."

The preliminary results for the local body elections show Len as the clear front-runner out of the seven mayoral candidates for Thames-Coromandel District Council.

As of Monday he had secured 5195 votes, ahead of runner-up John Freer who obtained 2489 votes.

Cherie Staples had received 1839 votes; Steve Hart, 1080; Ron Julian, 983; Eric Carter, 720; and Peter Pinkham, 560. Len stood for mayor in 2019

Len stood for mayor in 2019 and received 4301 votes, losing out to incumbent Sandra Goudie.

He said while he did not expect to win in 2019, he decided at that point to talk to people

across the district to find out "what the issues were and what projects and problems needed to be solved". He was "thrilled" to have the

public's confidence this year.

Len was the only candidate vying for the mayoralty who did not live on the western side of the peninsula, and when he spoke to *The Profile* less than 48 hours after clinching the Photo: SUPPLIED

top job, he was already at the council's main office in Thames learning the ropes.

"So, I really enjoyed the process... but one of the biggest challenges during the Meet the Candidates [events] was you had a very, very short time about three minutes - to talk about all the work you've been doing for the past three years, and that's tough."

The Profile made it even tougher, and asked Len what people could expect from his mayoralty using just three words.

"A new beginning," he replied.

Fresh blood on all Valley councils

A mix of familiar faces and first-timers will be sitting around Thames Valley's two district councils for the next three years, following Saturday's local body elections. Preliminary results for the lo-

Coromandel District Council have been released, and as of Monday morning, it looks to be business as usual for some, and

a new career path for others. In Hauraki's Waihī Ward, only Anne Marie Spicer is making a return to her seat as a councillor for another triennium, with three newcomers - Sarah Hol-Bhavesh Ranchhod, and Josh Martyn - being elected by voters to sit alongside her.

The fifth representative for Waihī will be Austin Rattray, who was a councillor for the ward back in 2016-2019.

Across in Paeroa, all four current councillors - Paul Milner, Carole Anne Daley, Rino Wilkinson, and Jo Tilsley - will sit on council for the next three years, with newcomers Mike Bennett and Melba Pakinga missing out

this term. In the Plains, there will be two new and two returning representatives.

Current councillors Ray Broad and Phillip Buckthought have been re-elected, alongside highest-polling ward candidate Neil Gray, and Stephen Crooymans. Over in Thames-Coromandel,

Goudie chairs last meeting as Mayor

Sandra Goudie's final full council meeting as Thames-Coromandel Mayor was a big one.

Not only did she and other elected members vote to press ahead with the Thames and Surrounds Spatial plan and Pollen St Infrastructure Upgrade, she also presented more than a dozen people with community services awards, and thanked retiring councillors Sally Christie, Murray McLean, and Tony Fox for their work this past term. For the next three years, Thames-Coromandel District Council will be headed by new Mayor Len Salt. Fresh blood around the table is also guaranteed.

Sandra, who copped nationwide criticism in 2021 for her refusal to get the Covid-19 vaccine, told the public in her closing speech to "never be afraid to express a difference of opinion".

"Honour our forebears by fighting for our rights and freedoms, so vote, cherish your vote, cherish our democracy, uphold free speech, the right to justice, the right to be treated equally," she said. "I have totally loved my time in local government working

"I have totally loved my time in local government, working in the real world where common sense can still prevail. Thank you to all for giving me the chance to serve you." Prior to the presentations -

"I know she thought I was going to be her councillor from hell, but in actual fact, Sandra, I've really grown to admire your style, your chairmanship, and you, personally."

Man pleads not guilty to 8 charges

The same man who appeared The same man who appeared in court after allegedly ramraiding two Thames businesses has entered not guilty pleas to a raft of charges against him. Appearing in Thames District Court on October 3, the man

- who is facing eight charges including theft, driving while disqualified, and burglary pleaded not guilty to all and was remanded on bail until his next appearance in late November.

Earlier, court documents stated that on August 10, the man entered Thames Jewellers and Sunburst Cafe in Pollen St, Thames, without authority and with intent to commit an im-prisonable offence, which carries a maximum sentence of 10 years. It was reported that the man was caught red-handed by patrolling police officers from Paeroa around 2.20am on August 10, after crashing into one shop, reversing, and driving into another.

Also in Thames District Court that day, one man was charged possession of cannabis, for while another was fined \$400

for failing to stop for police. The court heard that just after midnight on April 30, Blaire Coll was caught driving "much faster" than the 50kmh signposted speed down a road in

Whitianga. He did not stop for police when they activated their lights and siren.

Mr Coll refused officers' request to give blood after a breath test result proved inconclusive, saying: "I've been caught a lot of times, I know how to get out of this'

Mr Coll was fined \$400 for failing to stop for police, sen-tenced to 140 hours community work, and disqualified from

Judge KBF Saunders told the defendant that irrespective of how cocky he is, he will not get away with any further offend-

ing. In another incident, police at-tended Luke Hodge's address on January 2, 2022, and found cannabis plants, four of 35

Judge Saunders told the de-fendant that "reality had set in". Mr Hodge was sentenced to 100 hours of community work, nine months supervision, and the cannabis plants were ordered to be destroyed.

The court heard that Mr Hodge smoked cannabis "on a daily basis" and had since been suspended by his employer for failing a drug test.





A once 'dapper presence' in Paeroa



As part of a Valley Profile series, **MEGHAN HAWKES** explores our local history by seeking out stories of life and death in the Thames Valley

he highly cultured, handsome Charles Colclough cut quite a figure around Paeroa

The 75-year-old had several years earlier come from Otago, where he would sit at the only piano on the goldfields and play classical music with a master's hand.

But it was a noble deed of val-our, performed in the Cromwell district in 1868, that distinguished Charles. A man of unsound mind, armed with a hatchet, rushed into a tent, and while other onlookers were paralysed with fright, Charles dashed in to find him straddling a man, about to strike.

The backward throw of the axe gave Charles a nasty gash as he restrained him just in time to save a life.

This brave and daring deed resulted in the public presentation of a handsome gold medal and a heavy purse of sovereigns.

At the age of 13, Charles had been sent out to Australia from Dublin, Ireland, to learn farming, and later worked in one of the government

The town of Paeroa as it was in 1909. departments. Gold fever, however, led him to give up his government work and follow nearly all the gold rushes in various parts of Australia.

Around 1861, he and his wife Mary came to New Zealand, for many years living in Dunedin and gold mining centres in the South Island, where Charles worked as a mining agent. The descendant of an aristocratic family, Charles later came into an inheritance and moved to the more genial climate of the Thames Valley. He arrived during the boom time, and was greatly enthusiastic about gold mining matters, being interested in several mining companies in Ohinemuri and Thames. In 1901, when Charles was 66, he became the local face of Doan's Backache Kidney Pills featuring in advertisements endorsing the product, his standing as a Justice of the Peace evidently giving more weight to the recommendation.

"When a man comes forward and testifies to his fellow citizens, adPhoto: SUPPLIED

dresses his friends and neighbours, you may be sure he is thoroughly convinced or he would not do so. Telling one's experience when it is for the public good is an act of kindness which should be appreciated," announced one advertisement. Charles Colclough, JP of Hill St,

Paeroa, described his symptoms, concluding with: "I am glad to say, however, that the pills cured me".

But they may not have, as by September 1909, his fellow citizens, friends and neighbours were advised that, regretfully, Charles wasseriously ill. His wife had died the year before and since then he had not been in the best of health.

For some weeks, Charles was confined to his bed receiving every possible care and attention but it was to no avail, and the once dapper presence that had so enlivened Paeroa passed away quietly.

10 years in business for Pamper Me

On Pauline De Thierry's first day running Pamper Me MediSpa, she had three clients and made \$80.

Ten years later, the business on Pollen St, Thames, has grown to amass 8500 clients, four staff, and numerous accolades. It's an "organic" growth that

It's an "organic" growth that is in part thanks to the people continuing to walk through the doors.

"It used to be a very traditional beauty clinic with traditional services, but I saw a need in our community for our clients to get results," Pauline told *The Profile*.

"That's when I started expanding into more advanced therapies and paramedical skincare, so, it's been our clients who have inspired us to introduce new treatments."

Pauline specialises in advanced skin therapies and cosmetic tattooing, and took over the ownership of Pamper Me in September, 2012.

This month, the team will celebrate their milestone 10 years with a black, white, and goldthemed birthday party.

It'll be a reflection of the highs and lows over the past decade in the "always-advancing" beauty industry.

"The first several years of my involvement in the industry, it was very stagnant," Pauline said.

"We were quite behind in New Zealand for some time, but New Zealand is definitely catching up on the advanced therapies available, and not only that, the post graduate education." Pauline said highlights throughout the years included being recognised with a number of awards, including therapist of the year and runner up for salon design of the year, as well as local Retail and Peoples Choice business awards. However, there had also been some challenges.

In 2018, the back half of the building sustained significant flood damage after heavy rains and strong winds caused havoc across Thames-Coromandel. They then discovered there

was asbestos in the rear building that had to be removed.

Pauline retained her four staff and for about 10 weeks, they only operated out of the front shop and one treatment room.

However, Pauline said "it was the best thing that had ever happened".

"Having the flood gave us the chance to take a breath and refresh the back salon, I love adding my own touch and upcycling.

"We're not perfect, our skin is never perfect, beauty is never perfect, it's perfectly imperfect, and I grew up with my mum, Jessie, who would bring antiques back to life, so I think I got my creative flair from her and brought that vibe into the clinic."

For the past 12 years, Central Kids Ngātea Kindergarten has enjoyed a weekly excursion to Speedy's Reserve, on the outskirts of the township.

The programme is designed to allow the kids to connect with nature, go on insect and fungus hunts, to build huts, climb trees, jump in muddy puddles, bird watch, and create games

Teacher Terri Bjerring said the cur-riculum aligned nicely with the Toimata Enviroschools kaupapa for which the kindergarten was a part of and had earned its bronze level in.

One of the guiding principles was whanaungatanga – interconnectedness of all living things, she said, therefore it was a natural step to intervene when the kindy noticed a rapid decline in the health of native trees, as well as a sud-den increase of pest plants taking over the ngahere (forest).

"Restoring ecosystems for future genreations to enjoy is an important part of Enviroschools and our Central Kids philosophy," Terri said. "With support from Hauraki District Council's parks and reserves manager Paul Matthews, the Speedy's Reserve whānau, and kindergarten whānau, we set about to 'give back' to the ngahere."

The kindergarten successfully received \$750 in funding from the Central Kids Kindergarten Tree Fund, and \$1000 from the Thames Seagull Centre Local Community Grants, and on Septem-ber 24, its vision of rejuvenation came to life with the planting of 200 native trees.

'It was such a lovely morning with whānau enjoying the time together busily clearing areas of weeds and planting trees for future enjoyment," Terri said.

Entries for the Ahuwhenua Trophy, the most prestigious award for excellence in Māori horticulture, are now open.

The Ahuwhenua Trophy is presented annually, and over a three-year cycle covers dairy, sheep and beef, and horticulture, with the inaugural competition for horticulture held in 2020.

The competition objective is to recognise excellence in Māori horticulture and is open to inditural operations, as well as other entities such as Māori trusts and incorporations.

In 2021, Pouarua Farms, near Ngātea, was a finalist for the Ahuwhenua Trophy in the dairy category.

The farms are jointly owned by Ngāti Maru, Ngāti Paoa, Ngāti Tamaterā, Ngāti Tara To-kanui and Te Patukirikiri, and is the largest single dairy platform in the Hauraki region, in which 4,600 cows are milked across 1,775ha. Pouarua Farms are now fully operated by iwi own-ers under a limited partnership arrangement, and in 2021, chief executive Jenna Smith said being named a finalist was an "honour"

Ahuwhenua Trophy management committee chair Nukuhia Hadfield said the past decade had seen more Māori become major investors in the horticulture sector; however, there was still "much more to do".

"I am sure with the positive publicity that the Ahuwhenua Trophy competition generates, this will encourage more Māori to become involved in the secNukuhia said in all the major horticultural areas around the country, there was clear evidence that Māori were setting up new horticultural businesses, or further developing established ones, and were major contributors to a sector which, in the past year, earned \$6.5 billion for the economy of Aotearoa New Zealand.

"I now urge all those Māori enterprises to take the next step and showcase their operations to Aotearoa by entering this competition. It is a unique op-portunity to demonstrate the innovation and quality, along with genuine sustainability which sits behind our horticultural businesses," she said. **DETAILS:** More information, in-

cluding the entry form, are on the Ahuwhenua Trophy website: www.ahuwhenuatrophy.maori. nz. Entries close December 9 and the finalists will be announced in February, 2023. After that, field days will be held in April-May, and the winner will be announced at an awards dinner in Tauranga in June.

Keep watch for allergies

Did you know your dog or cat can suffer from seasonal allergies just as you do?

There are primarily two types of allergies: food allergies and environmental allergies.

If your pet gets itchy during spring, summer or autumn, she or he is probably reacting to seasonal, environmental al-lergens. 

PORTS ne-point loss in action-packed match

HEARTLAND RUGBY

Thames Valley gained two bonus points from a disappointing 43-44 against Horowhenua Kapiti loss in their Heartland Championship match played at Te Aroha last Saturday. In spite of losing the game, the Swamp Foxes have remained in third place on the points table. This means that for the last four seasons Thames Valley has made the play-offs in the Meads Cup section of the competition. They will now play Whanganui in a semi-final at Whanganui next Saturday. As a result of a convincing 41-21 victory over North Otago, King Country jumped into fourth place and will play South Canterbury in the other semi-final.

There was plenty of action at Te Aroha where a total of ten tries were scored and the lead changed hands seven times. Horowhenua Kapti had plenty to play for with a place in the Lochore Cup semi-finals in the offing and they can be well pleased with their performance.

Thames Valley opened the scoring with tries to Lea Mau Fangufan-gu and Telly Hemopo, both of which were converted by Zak Stephens.

Midway through the half the score was 17-all. Stephens had added a penalty goal while the visitors had scored three tries and a conversion. There was a feast of scoring up until half time when the Swamp Foxes led 34-31. Stephens had kicked his second penalty goal while Tayne Tupaea and Calum Wood both scored tries which he converted. Horowhenua also notched up two converted tries.

With a total of 65 points on the scoreboard, the momentum slowed in the second half as each team tightened up their defence. Both sides exchanged penalty goals and then the Horowhenua fullback managed to score between the posts following some fancy footwork.

The successful conversion enabled Horowhenua to regain the lead at 41-37 with ten minutes to go.

This lead was short lived as Stevens kicked his fourth and fifth penalty goals and the Swamp Foxes were back in front. Time was almost up as Valley endeavoured to hold on for a 43-41 victory. In doing so they conceded a penalty right on full time and Horowhenua kicked the goal to win 44-43 and gain a home semi-fi-nal in the Lochore Cup section of the Heartland Championship.

It is not the best preparation for the Swamp Foxes to go into the semi-finals with consecutive loses to two teams below them on the points table. They are not defending as strongly as they were at the start of the season and too many promising attacks are not producing points. However, with hard work this week they have the potential to be more than a match for Whanganui. On the plus side it was good to see replacement five-eighth Zak Stephens' excellent goal kicking in scoring 23 points against Horowhenua with five penalties and four conversions. 
