Seizure gives principal 'insig

When Alison Imrie heard that someone was having a seizure on the grounds of Goldfields Special School in Paeroa, she assumed it was a student.

But then she saw her boss'

Cam McKenzie, 45, suffered his first and only seizure on August 22 at around 8.10am.

It was caused by a meningioma brain tumour that doctors said had been growing inside his head for around 10 years.

The principal has since recovered from a surgery to remove the tumour, and is back working at the special school on Nor-

wood Rd.

He told *The Profile* he's now armed with a great-er appreciation of what some of his 87 students go through on a regular basis.
"They are the un-

heroes," he "A student could have three or four [seizures] a week and they don't make a big deal out of it."
On the morning of the

seizure, Mr McKenzie, who lives in Ōmokoroa in the West-ern Bay of Plenty, drove through Katikati, the Athenree Gorge, and the windy Karangahake Gorge before reaching work.

He had the seizure just outside of his office 20 minutes before students were set to arrive.

"It was a Monday morning and I could hear all the staff, so I went over to our student cards

to get the details for the ambulance, but then I saw my boss's feet and thought we better get the staff file instead," Alison said.

In what is a usual routine for the trained teachers at Goldfields, staff called an ambulance and timed the length of Mr Mc-Kenzie's seizure.

It lasted almost four minutes,


during which he bit his tongue and chewed a hole through his crown, cracking his filling. An ambulance crew from Paeroa St John arrived on site within two minutes after he woke up.

Mr McKenzie said he was then taken to Thames Hospital, where they discovered the benign tumour the size of an apple.

He underwent an operation at Waikato Hospital on August 31 got 42 staples in his skull, and now has an impressive scar.

"The neurosurgeon said I'd hit the tumour jackpot," he said, "because it wasn't tangled around anything, it was just sit-

ting right on top."
He cannot drive for 12 months;



instead, he has been catching a ride to school each day from a fellow teacher at Paeroa College. The whole ordeal, he said,

has left him with a greater appreciation of what his students go through on a regular basis some of whom suffer from epi-

lepsy.

"It gave me a greater insight into how vulnerable they are, because when you're down on the ground, you're really putting your trust in the people around your trust in the people around you," he said. "I also have a greater appre-

ciation of what our parents go through with their children, knowing that something like that could happen at any time... they just trust us without ques-

Mr McKenzie said he'd thanked his staff "at least three times each" for their support during and after the seizure, and also wanted to show appreciation to the staff at Paeroa St John and Thames Hospital.

In the beginning, it nearly didn't happen at all - we were about to go to print with our first issue when the country headed into its first four-week Covid-19 shutdown.

Thankfully, our loyal advertisers stuck with us and we published the first issue of the Valley Profile in May, 2020.

At that time, the Valley Profile was just 16 pages, and published monthly. But as people discovered this new title - and realised how much they missed their local news, support grew and The Profile was published fortnightly by the end of 2020, then weekly within its first year.

During that time, we also increased our distribution to 16,000 copies delivered to every letterbox in Ngatea, Paeroa, Waihī, Thames and Thames with bulk distribution Coast. around the entire Coromandel Peninsula.

We have also now launched our digital platform, The Coromandel App, which gives us an even broader reach for our local journalism and offers a val-



During its first 100 issues, the Valley Profile has seen huge growth, increased its delivery area, employed new staff, launched the Coromandel App and won national awards - all while battling the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic.

uable resource for locals, bach owners and visitors.

The app is free and easy to download from your smartphone app store or go to coromandelapp.nz/install.

Our staff also grew, from an editor and part-time graphic designer initially, to three fulltime journalists, an advertising manager, two part-time contractors and 45 paper delivery

All this despite the uncertainty of the pandemic, which saw newspapers across New Zealand closing, merging and laying off journalists due to a drop in advertising revenue.

These changes have resulted in The Profile being the only local paper with journalists who live and work here, which gives our readers the benefit of grassroots journalism so we can find the best stories; cover local meetings and events, and show we truly care about our communities.

We have received national awards for this incredible growth, and also for our journalism, which means our readers can trust us to provide them with fair, balanced and accurate reporting delivered to their letterboxes and online.

So I'd like to say a big thank you to all our advertisers and readers, who pick up The Profile each week and support what we are doing.



Tree 'makes crochet cool agai

he crocheted Christmas tree The crocheted Christmas tree that takes pride of place along Ngātea's main street is even "bigger and brighter" this

The tree - made up of more than 2000 crochet squares - has been erected at the Hugh Hayward Domain, and Ngātea Li-ons member Bruce Foster said the colourful icon continued to gain attention.

"When we were putting it together, people would stop on the side of the road, and they'd look, and they'd come over. One woman was with her children and said they loved the playground, but they also loved the tree, and each time they came through they stopped to have a look at

The tree now stands between 7-8 metres tall two metres taller than last vear thanks to a funding donation by the Hauraki District Council.

There are also new crocheted squares, made by more than 40 creative people throughout the community, and this made the tree bigger and brighter than ever before, Bruce

The crocheted angel on top of



The frame was made up of an old rocket ship from a play-ground, and while council's parks and reserves manager found the best site for the tree, Alex Quinn from Quinn Engineering crafted the support frame and mounting system, which is permanently embedded Four years on, the tree's construction has become a muchanticipated holiday tradition, and this year, more than 20 hands were on deck to help set it

up on December 5.
"It is just so neat when you walk up the domain and see people stopping, and kids and families having a look at it,"

We just want a huge thank you to go out to all of those who

have helped out in some way. "We couldn't have done it

without the public helping us." Hauraki District Council provided the Ngātea Lions with funding via an application to the Creative Communities Scheme, with \$575 used to raise the height of the existing structure, and \$1380 used to pur-chase 400 balls of wool which were distributed to the 40-plus crocheters.

This year, it also funded the installation of a "cool burning LED uplight" inside the tree which will provide a visual night-time experience.
"This sort of community-led

project that creates interest in our parks and provides an opportunity to collaborate is exactly the type of project we love," Mayor Toby Adams said.

'Not to mention this unique Christmas tree is making cro-chet cool again and that's a real win for highlighting talents that are in danger of becoming a lost

Mayor Adams said there would now be stiff competition between the tree, the Paeroa L&P Bottle, and the Waihi Pumphouse for the best place in the district to take a photo to say: "I was here" this summer.

Thames Community Board ready for action

It's all go for the new Thames Community Board, who are keen to make change happen. Newly elected Chair, businessman and JP Adrian Catran urged the Board to work together proactively to be a driving force for improvement.



Architect and Public Art Trustee Rob Johnston was elected Deputy Chair.

Board members and Councillors visited Köpü

Marine and Business Precinct, Thames Airfield, Thames Football Club and Netball Centre, Moanataiari and Create the Vibe in Mary Street to assess progress. As well as inspecting construction at Kōpū, the group discussed initiatives underway such as Thames and Surrounds Spatial Plan (a blueprint for Thames' future growth), Thames Sports Partnership Project (looking at alternative sports fields for Rhodes Park), Thames Sub-region Aquatic Facilities Project (developing a new swimming pool facility to replace Centennial Pool), Tōtara Valley infrastructure (to enable housing development) and the Shoreline Management Plan (to protect our communities from coastal erosion and flooding risk).

Hauraki Rail Trail new sculptures

Two new vibrant sculptures are set to be installed on the Hauraki Rail Trail after a recommendation by Thames Community Board to commit \$5,432 for maintenance and repairs.

Interwoven (concept model by Chris Budgeon) and Miners' Gates (concept model by John McKeowen), were entrants in the 2017 Thames Public Art Trust community sculpture competition

At 3.1m high, made of macrocarpa beams, *Interwoven* will be installed on Ngāti Maru Highway, not far

from the junction with Maramarahi Rd. Miners' Gates is built of 12 frames using old railway sleepers forming a replica of entry gates to a mine shaft. The structure will be installed near Rhodes Park.

Carvers spend a year making float

It was back in 2021 when Alby Tukia and Sefo Tupou started working on what would become the hero piece of their 2022 Christmas Parade float.

The two carvers from Thames and Paeroa, respectively, crafted an 11-foot tall rimu chair to showcase during the yearly Santa Parades.

They've already completed the Paeroa parade - and won People's Choice while they were at it - and will be at the Thames Parade this weekend, ready to "smash it out of the park".

"My brother passed away up in Auckland, and he used to collect recycled things. I went up and saw [the rimu] and I never thought about carving it at the time, but I kept it and it came together," Alby told *The* Profile.

Profile.

Alby is the president of the Paeroa and Thames Tongan Community, and this year, their float had the theme of The Royal Family', symbolising the British and Tongan

monarchies.

The chair is named Tu'i Tonga - a line of Tongan kings that originated in the 10th century - and for the Paeroa parade on December 2, local Taufa Kaifa stood atop the float's highest point, thus making him "King for a day," Alby said.

He is not sure how much the chair weighs, but it takes "four or five Tongans to lift it"






Waihī's lakeside Christmas

Truckers haul national awards

Puriri truck drivers Corey Petifer and Brayden McMillan-Phillips were "in shock" after hauling national awards at the national truck driving championships last month.

The Graeme Wright Transport drivers told *The Profile* they were entered into the Auckland heats of the TR Group NZ Truck Driving Championships 2022 by their boss, Graeme "Gunner" Wright, with both qualifying to compete in the final held in Christchurch on November 26.

Brayden went on to win TR Group Young Driver of the Year at the finals, and Corey, who has driven trucks for Gunner for six years, said he "fluked it" to win the TR Group Truck and Trailer Driver of the Year and New Zealand Truck Driving Champion.

"[I was] pretty shocked really, didn't really expect it, [because I was] competing against some drivers from the South Island who had probably been driving for 30 years," Corey said.

"I just went in and gave it what I got...and [the judges] were impressed - good driver, steady, and focused

"I've been told I've got an automatic entry into the finals in two years' time when it's held again."

Corey, who previously worked for Kerepehi Transport, said competitors at the Auckland heats on October 15 had to undergo three trucking tasks.

These included a 35-question NZ Heavy Vehicle Road Code theory test, a pre-trip inspection, and completing a driving and maneuvering course.

"Gunner asked 'would you be interested in doing it?' so I was like 'oh yeah, I'll give it a go'.

"[The judges] were impressed and one of the judges was known to Gunner as well in previous years, he was an ex-Puriri local I think.

"I came first in the Auckland heats [for the truck and trailer category]... and that put me into the finals in the South Island [Christchurch]."

Corey said there were eight finalists in the final competition, who competed in a driving and maneuvering course and an on road test that was observed by a TR Group driving trainer.

Brayden, who returned to truck-

ing for Gunner six months ago after working for Alpha One Transport and Brett Marsh Transport, said drivers had to be 25 years and under to compete for the Young Driver of the Year award.

It was "a bit of a shocker" after he won TR Group Young Driver of the Year, he said.

"I must've scored the most points out of the young fellas. "Meeting with the other drivers

"Definitely something to look into and I encourage young fellas to give it a go."

Trees for Survival flourishes in Thames Valley

By GORDON PREECE

Thousands of trees have been planted by Thames Valley Schools in the past three years as part of a nationwide environmental initiative.

Trees for Survival is a charitable trust which works with more than 150 schools and local communities across New Zealand to grow and plant native trees along waterways and on erosion prone

The programme provides an opportunity for school children to make a practical difference to their environment as well as learn about conservation, revegetation, wetland restoration and protecting stream quality.

Trees for Survival school facilitator for Hauraki and Lower Coromandel Tim Cruickshank told The Profile he had introduced the programme to 13 schools in Thames Valley over the past three

years.
"With each school we develop relationships into mana whenua [territorial rights] and usually some local sponsorship if possi-ble and anyone that would like to be involved in reforesting native plants in and around the school

community," he said.
"We look for a land holder associated with the school to try and do some restorative planting whether it's stream edges or erosion prone banks or supporting

as we do here in Hauraki. "It's the beginning of a long relationship year after year.

Tim said the Thames Valley schools that had engaged with the programme included Te Puru, Pārāwai, Thames South, St Francis, Puriri, Hikutaia, Goldfields, Kerepēhi, Netherton and Kaihere.

"We probably planted around 21,000 trees in the past three years. Last year we planted 4500 of those on the Hauraki Rail Trail with a majority planted by stu-dents in conjunction with HELP

"Some students had never picked up a spade and they loved getting out of the school environment and into the real life plant-

ing situation on farms. "We plant trees appropriate to the restoration site, so if it's a stream edge, then we're likely to plant sedges and grasses so they will better move with the flow of

Hauraki Plains College was the latest school Tim had initiated the

Trees for Survival programme. Its horticulture students completed potting seedlings of native trees on October 26. "The small seedlings at the moment, they start at a few centimetres tall. We have a minimum planting size of 300 millimetres and depending on the variety and stage and height they were, they're going to be passing that on to the first rain in autumn," he said.

"Then maybe in May, June,

be planting 450 to 600 native

Tim said Te Uru Rākau New Zealand Forest Service had also commemorated Trees for Survival schools with stainless steel plaques and Hauraki Plains Col-lege had received one to honour teacher Logan Taylor for estab-

teacher Logan Taylor for establishing and maintaining the Hayward Farm educational site.

"This was part of the Matariki Tu Rākau programme, it's a celebration of Matariki and the planting of trees and it's a national project to establish stands of trees across Actarara as places to trees across Aotearoa as places to honour New Zealand's heroes," Tim said.

'Four hundred and fifty seven trees were provided by the Trees for Survival programme and funded by Te Uru Rākau New Zealand Forest Service as part of the One Billion Trees programme and were planted by Hauraki Plains College in winter of 2022 to honour Logan Taylor."
Tim said more trees planted on

the Hauraki Plains would bring long term benefits to the area

The Hauraki Plains could do with a lot more native trees, the last three summers have been the driest on record.

"We need more shade and shelter and if we're going to continue putting animals out on these plains, we need to help them out." Tim said he planned to intro-

duce Moanataiari School to the Trees for Survival programme

Damp summer predicted

Hauraki-Coromandel rural residents have been prompted to stock up on essentials as ex-tropical cyclones are predicted to hit the area this summer, NIWA says.

NIWA meteorologist and forecaster Ben Noll told *The Profile* the opportunity for these types of rainfall events was higher compared to the previous December to February period due to a strong presence of La Niña.

"At the front end of summer we're certainly not anticipating a drought to develop here early on in the summer season, so that's good news for the locals, and the farmers and those on water tanks," he said.

"However, on the flip side of that, the climate driver that we have is La Nina, the oceans around New Zealand as well as off to the north in the Southwest Pacific are warmer than average.

"That can be energy fuel for low pressure systems that form to the north and kind of drop down into the northern North Island including the Coromandel Peninsula and around the Eastern Waikato"

Mr Noll said this weather pattern had created "equal odds" for normal or above normal summer rainfall and a normal to elevated risk for ex-tropical cyclones.

He said this could make way for Coromandel roads to be susceptible to floods and slips between December and February 2023.

"It does look like a wetter season compared to last summer, what we saw last summer was dryness kind of built up during January and then persisted into

the Autumn season," he said.

"I think this year the opportunity for rainfall events will come at a higher frequency compared to the previous year like sporadic downpours that can bring heavy rain and maybe even some localised flooding. "If you hear of one of those strong

"If you hear of one of those strong weather systems tracking in, whether it's SH25 or wherever you may be located and you do live in a very rural place, maybe stock up on essentials in case you are cut off due to slips or floods."

are cut off due to slips or floods."

Mr Noll said despite the predicted summer rainfall, it was "unlikely" to be a colder than average summer.

"That's been a theme going on for the last several seasons, so there's bound to be our fair share of hot days," he said.

"That may even come with elevated humidity as well, sort of hot sticky nights that are tough to sleep, the frequency of those might be elevated."

Christmas 'grinch' conned residents



As part of a Valley Profile series, **MEGHAN HAWKES** searches through old newspapers to bring you the stories Thames Valley locals once read about themselves.

Christmas

A Christmas Grinch in the shape of a woman imposter from Ngātea left a trail of chaos across Auckland in 1932.

In Christmas week she ran up an account with a taxi driver, and later called in a well-known surgeon, giving the name of a prominent farmer's wife at Ngātea. After arranging for an examination, she asked the surgeon for a loan until she could communicate with her husband.

He found the name the woman gave in a phone directory, and, being assured, lent her £2 5s.

She next went to an undertaker, gave the name of another Hauraki Plains farmer, and said that her husband's assistant had just died. She wished to arrange for the burial, she said. She described the body, gave measurements, and then borrowed £1.

She visited two other doctors, and, telling similar tales, obtained £2 5s from each. All the money was spent on drinking.

Meanwhile, in 1921, Kerepēhi school children enjoyed the rare treat at a concert which featured

a Christmas tree 'growing' in the middle of the stage bedecked with coloured balloons and presents. It looked the exact replica of trees read about in books and needed only the presence of a Santa Claus to

make the picture complete.
When Mr Booth, school committee chairman, asked if any child had not received a present, a hand immediately shot up from the back of the hall and a gruff voice said

A rather a portly gentleman, possessing not only a broad grin but a broad waistcoat, toddled to the chairman's table and to the amusement of all received his present, a balloon and bag of sweets.

St George's Church at Thames had a makeover in the lead up to Christmas, 1925. The steeple, which had rotted to such an alarming extent that it rocked in windy weather, was plated in zinc and iron, and the timbering strengthened.

The shuttered windows were renewed and new butconstructed were

throughout the building.

These and many other repairs were a severe drain on church funds but parishioners responded generously to special appeals and a substantial portion of the required money was raised. The church was one of the oldest and best known in the province.

Meanwhile, the train service at Waihī meant a large number of people could get away at their own convenience for the Christmas holidays in 1905.

The Railway Department appeared confident of carrying a lot of people during the holidays as they had many reserved carriages lined up in the station yards, but the ride from Paeroa to Waihī through a three quarter mile tunnel, up a steep grade, with a small, smoky engine, was not likely to be very much enjoyed during the coming season.

Postal delays caused bewilderment in 1899. A Paeroa resident was sent a goose by railway on December 23 from Te Aroha and at the same time a postcard was sent "Meet the goose today at the railway sta-

The goose reached Paeroa in half an hour, and, being expected, was met by the Paeroa resident on the arrival of the train.

The goose was killed, plucked, cooked, and about to be eaten and digested before the postcard was delivered next morning, the 24th, although it reached Paeroa by the same train as the goose.

Reckless disregard Paeroa's old racecourse has been described as "disappointing and sad" by a former Mayor who doesn't want to see the gates closed to the public.

In 2020, Wayne and Chloe Wright purchased the 33.5 hectare former racecourse with the intention of developing it commercially and residentially, as well as opening it up for community use after years of being closed to the public.

But an act of vandalism which saw the driver of a white station wagon do "wheelies' within its grounds could risk the private property's open door policy.

"I'm disappointed that there are some people in our community who would want to take advantage and do that sort of thing to generous benefactors of the town," Basil Morrison said.

Someone must know who did it, and surely they must be disappointed because I certainly am.'

Mr Morrison is a former mayor of Hauraki, and now is the "legs on the ground" for the Wright family. He keeps an eye on the racecourse and coordinates usage of the space.

Not only have markets and festivals been held on the

grounds, but there have been luncheons hosted and organisations housed, and Mr Morrison said people using the space donate a koha which is given to the earthquake-strengthening fund at the Paeroa RSA.

vandalism occurred The around 11am on Monday, November 28 and was captured on video, which has been shown to the Police.

Mr Morrison said he didn't want anybody "locked up" over the situation, but the offending was still serious.

"There was such a push-back when the previous owner shut the gate and no one was allowed in. The community was very upset about it," he said.

'The new owners got bolt cut-

ters, cut the chain and opened the gates, and they haven't been shut since.

"So, while I understand these things happen... surely when you hear of people doing good things, you'd be a bit more respectful."



The stilt walkers are part of the Thames High Troupe that was strapped in by drama teacher Luke Devery at the be-ginning of the year. Luke told *The Profile* it was

his passion project and he had introduced it to the students

after teaching drama for 16 years at Waihī College.

"The reason for the troupe is so exciting - it takes the students out of the classroom into the real world and opens. into the real world and opens up professional and creative pathways that sometimes can be a bit hard to find," he said.

Luke said the troupe also stemmed from his early years as a roving performer. "I started as a mime clown

way back in the day, and after a few years I went to Melbourne to study and got interested in taking it further so I studied at the John Bolton Theatre School," he said. "While I was at the school I

got very interested in masks, physical theatre and melodrama and Shakespeare, and I came back and started an undergraduate degree to become a teacher.

"It was always the fun part that got me excited about being in that world and I'm trying to share that excitement with these kids and give them that pathway that takes them



beyond their school work into something a bit more real. Luke said the year nine to

"They've never seen anything like it before and it's wonderful to see them bringing their own

already making up new acts and exploring new ways of getting out there," he said.
"With the mum and dad stilt

walkers, it's supposed to be an old world colonial severe temperance woman with a slightly addled husband pushing a pram with a contemporary

21st century baby in it.
"The giant pram, that's a very old prop, it's been to the Edinburgh and Glastonbury festival many times."

Luke said stilt walking was also "not as hard as you think".
"The only trouble is you're

strapped into them so you're more vulnerable than you look and one of the first things we do is we teach [the students] how to fall," he said. "We also give solo perform-

ers another prop to give them a third point of balance, and they're always wearing knee

Luke said the 24 hour Walk-athon on November 4 was the first time the stilt walkers strutted their stuff to the public and new acts in the troupe would begin to follow.

"We put the stilt walkers out first because they are very visible, they look great in an environment because you can see them from a long way away, but there are a lot more masks, mime and character acts that we will put out as well," he

Simpson to restand in Coro

Scott Simpson has been reselected by the National Party to be its candidate for the Coromandel electorate at the 2023 election.

The incumbent Coromandel MP for 11 years told *The Profile* he was "thrilled and delighted" to receive the news of his reselection on November 30.

'It's a great honour to have been selected once again to be the flag-bearer for the National Party in the Coromandel electorate," he said.

"We've got a very big campaign ahead of us, and the good people of Coromandel have been kind enough to elect me at every election since 2011 and I'm hoping that they will do so again.

"But I have never taken it for granted, I always treat the Coromandel as if it's the most marginal electorate in the country and for me everyday is a campaigning

Mr Simpson, who retained the Coromandel seat in the 2020 General Election after beating Labour candidate Nathaniel Blomfield by 3,505 votes, said one of his high-lights as the Coromandel MP had been implementing fibre broadband to Coromandel communi-

"I was able to work closely with the then minister Amy Adams and the National government to ensure that we have around our region a really good fibre fast broad-band to most of our towns and communities," he said.

"It has meant people have been able to, for the first time in history many of them, have been able to have a work and income earning opportunity as a result of having access to fast fibre.

"But we still have some gaps so that's an area I'm looking to continue working on."


Mr Simpson said he had also campaigned to keep the Coromandel rescue helicopter in Whitianga for the summer period and long weekends. He also aimed to improve local roads, including fixing one-lane bridges, particulary around Tairua.

Mr Simpson said he had also worked on enlightened and prac-tical approaches to environment, transport and climate change issues as the National spokesperson for the portfolios.

"National is the party of prac-tical environmentalism, we like any other New Zealander want to protect and enhance our natural environment, we have a lot on offer, much of it is under threat and we need to have a better RMA [resource management act] system,

he said.
"We have to work with our farmers and our emitting sectors of the economy but also with in-dividuals, families and communities to do everything we can to decarbonise our economy, to electrify our economy, and to bend our emissions curve quickly as we can before the end of this decade.

 \mathbf{R} ichard Battson has continued a family tradition by placing a recently published Valley Profile article in the same spot where a 130-year-old ad for his Thames family plumbing business was recently found.

The Profile reported on November 30 that Richard's workmate Gareth Scott had found a newspaper advertisement for Francis Battson Plumbing inside the bathroom wall of an old Thames miner's cottage on November 14.

The advert was published in the The Evening Star newspaper in 1892 for the business, which was established in 1890 by Richard's great-great-greatgreat-great-grandfather, Francis Battson.

Richard, who is the current director of the plumbing business, told The Profile placing the article about the find inside the wall on December 1 was a "fitting touch"

"We thought that hopefully one day down the line if they do a rennovation or something like that again on the property you just never know, it might be a future generation Battson plumber who might stumble across it," he said.

"My old man [Gordon] was pretty chuffed with it and I've still got quite a few friends and family members saying they've seen me in the paper, so it's been a bit of fun really.

"I put it in a zip lock plastic bag to keep it preserved.

Richard said the 130-yearold remains of The Evening Star newspaper was "in pretty average condition" when it was found. He had passed it on to Gareth's father, Jim Scott, to keep it preserved.

"I think Jim's on the case to make a frame up for it from some of the kauri that was on site," he said.



\$20,000 raised from Swampfox socks

Thames Valley Rugby Union offloaded \$20,000 to Goldfields School on December 2 to go towards new projects to support its 87 students.

Thames Valley Swampfoxes head coach David Harrison told *The Profile* it was the fifth year the union had donated to the Paeroa school, with funds raised this year through sales of supporter socks.

"We've been doing jersey auctions I think the last four seasons and I think there's only so much of the one thing you can do, so we tried to change it up," he said.

up," he said.
"There's only 22 jerseys that people could win in auction and the socks were \$20 so it hopefully gave more people the opportunity to be a part of it.

"A lot of them knew the money was going towards Goldfields so that was pretty awesome to be able to support that"

David said just under 1000 pairs of socks were sold and the union topped it up to give the donation an even score of \$20,000.

He said the team also continued to strengthen its relationship this year with the school.

"We brought all our players into the school [in September]

and it was really cool to spend some time in the classrooms with the teachers and the students and our players get a taste of why we do it, the cause that we're supporting and it's always special," he said.

"Even players who had been in the team before they get to reconnect and the new ones can see what it's all about and understand why we do it."

Goldfields School principal Cam McKenzie said the donation was a bonus point as the partnership the school had with the team and the union was important.

"The players are role models to the students and I think the students are role models to them." he said.

"Every year we work on ways to make [the relationship] better and we work on engaging the students more and the players meeting the students so they know who they're playing for and the students love it when they come into school."

called the Foxes Den, which is planned to open in February.

"It's going to have the Swampfoxes logo on the front door and a mural inside with a fox on it and a place for students from all across the school to go and read, do literacy and be around books," he said.

"[It will cost] around \$3500 but that will be ongoing because books will be bought overtime and books would need to be replaced.

"We're going to invite the Swampfoxes and a kaumātua to open the room."

Mr McKenzie said the remaining funds would go towards another school van with the Swampfoxes logo on it, which is planned to hit the streets early next year.

The union donated \$30,000 to Goldfields School last year, which was used to purchase a new school van in March.
