clare Snanaher lights up when she talks about pool. Or any cue-based sport really - snooker, billiards, eightball, nineball, tenball; she loves them all.

The Te Puru woman, currently the coun-

try's fifth-ranked woman in the sport, has been named captain of the women's team for New Zealand's first foray to the Eightball World Championships in more than 25 years. She will join five other women from across New Zealand in Blackpool, England, on June 18-27 to represent the country, along with a men's team of nine players. "This has been my dream, to represent

"This has been my dream, to represent New Zealand," Clare said. "[And] this was an absolute wow moment for New Zealand pool. It's about getting New Zealand on the pool map so that then we can continue to go to them in the future."

Clare wasn't always into pool. However, by her own account she has always been competitive - formerly competing at darts, ten-pin bowling and Irish dancing. And when she did pick up a cue 18 years ago, she quickly found she was a natural.

Clare Shanaher is excited to be captaining New Zealand's first eightball team in more than 25 years.

"I was in my 40s when I started playing pool, which is old to start a sport, really," she said. "I joined the club in Nelson. And then a month later, I was playing in the Nelson rep team. I had really found the thing that I loved, and luckily had a lot of natural ability at it."

CONTINUED FROM P1 play like a man'. I do not take it as an insult, it's me playing ag-gressive, getting out there and potting and not blocking pockets and stuff like that. But when I need to, I'll block those pockets

and play the tactical game." Ninety per cent of the game was mental, she said. "When I go, I focus on it. I don't drink alcohol, I'm there to play.

Preparation for the championships has been intense. Clare travels to Auckland every week to play in Glen Eden. In between, she's lining up shots at the Thames Workingman's Club. In order to practise with international rules, she's also had to teach her club mates the official ruleset, and hunt down people in Auckland with international-sized tables

"Different tables, different balls, different rules," she said.

"The white ball is smaller... It moves differently when it contacts the ball. As I said, it's maths and science. It's harder to get the ball to go forward, but way easier to screw it back. "It is a very strategic rule set,

but it's very positive and aggressive. I absolutely love it. It's my favourite rules by far."

to learn that Clare won't be focused on winning in Blackpool.

"If I play well and I lose, that's actually okay. There's a saying that I love: losing is learning and winning is teaching.' And that's why when I lose in a tournament, I generally like to stay and watch the people. Because they're better than me.'

What she truly loved about the game, Clare said, was the social aspect. She can play with mates, with strangers, with

"For a mother to have her 27-year-old son ask you to be his partner is something else. That's a really great feeling.

Bringing the game to the next generation is another thing Clare is passionate about. 'I was a big part of getting the

national juniors going again. "So when I come back, want to get into what I did in

Nelson - I want to start coaching kids. The ideal age to start teaching people is like 11 or 12. They're capable, but they're not knowledgeable. So I want to get involved.

First though, she needs to make it to Blackpool. The play-ers are self-funding their trip, which includes a mandatory 10-day stay at the hotel where the competition is being held.

"Just the accommodation alone for us is \$24,000. I'm doing raffles, and people in Christchurch have been running pool tournaments for funding... We've even got beautiful shirts [for sale]," she said.

"I'll put it this way, I've got my car on the market to help fund my trip. That's how much this means to me to go.

And in the end, Clare said, she's just happy to have the op-portunity to do something she loves

"We are creating history for New Zealand pool, and to be selected - not only as a player, but to captain the team - I just feel really honoured."



Thames' upgraded Porritt Park playground ready for play

Thames' new destination playground in Porritt Park opened to much fanfare on May 31, with a crowd of benefactors, dignitaries and eager schoolchil-dren present for the occasion.

The \$1.5 million playground was officially opened at 10am by Thames Coromandel Mayor Len Salt and four Thames children chosen from a group of colour-ing competition winners. After the ribbon cutting, seven-year-old Anika Irvine from Pārāwai School was given the honour of having the first play on the new

equipment. The opening was the culmi-nation of several years' work, after the majority of the budget was gifted to Thames by philan-

was gifted to Thames by philan-thropist couple Jackie and Chris Reeve for the express purpose of a free, accessible play space. Jackie told *The Profile* she and Chris wanted something that was open to everyone. "We build playgrounds that have no age limit," she said. "It's one of the main things for us because there's so many parents and grandparents who should be allowed to play with their children. And carers should be allowed to play, but also, especially, there's a lot of communities which have adults communities which have adults that have a younger mind, and they should be allowed to play.

"Play is really important to me," she said. "Before I met Chris, I was a solo mum, just trying to make ends meet, really. I used to pack a picnic lunch three





times a week, and we'd go to a park and play. And then it ended up with a whole lot of other families that knew our kids, and they would join us. It was just so cool because it was free, and it was

fun. Construction at Porritt Park began in early February this year. The upgraded playground features new play equipment such as a climbing tower lighthouse and Wakatere boat, based

on the local history of the area. It includes wheelchair-accessi-ble equipment, and some of the original play pieces have been re-tained. Extra seating, a barbeque area and a basketball court have also been included, with the aim of making the space a gathering place for the whole community.

Laughter and shouting quickly filled the air at the opening as the invited children gave the new equipment a once-over, and

Convictions for reckless driver

Aman has been convicted of reckless driving after being accused of ramming into the back of another car four times then failing

to stop. On May 27, the Thames District Court heard how Terry McColl was driving at night in Tuateawa on the Coromandel Peninsula on September 2 last year with his headlights on high beam and hazard lights on.

"[The victim] pulled over to let you pass, instead you crashed into her causing damage to the car, and then left without checking she was

okay," Judge KBF Saunders said. Mr McColl had attended a restorative justice meeting with the victim where he explained he was trying to pass her on a hill and accidentally struck the back of her car

However, she disputed his version of events, saying he rammed her car at least four times.

Mr McColl was charged with operating a motor vehicle reck-lessly and failing to stop after an accident. He was sentenced to intensive supervision for one year and was required to complete a non-violence programme, as well as being disqualified from driving for six months.

In sentencing, Judge Saun-ders took account of his apology, willingness to pay reparations of \$2700, and a character reference holding him in "high regard". However, she noted his his-

tory of offences, which included alcohol, driving and violence of-fences dating back as far as 1993; and cautioned Mr McColl to "take

stock" of his situation. Meanwhile, a man found with an unregistered rifle and ammunition on April 29 has been con-victed and sentenced to 80 hours of community service.

The court heard Emmett Dreaneen, who does not hold a firearms licence, was accused of unlawfully being in possession of the items after they were found by a member of the public under a road cone in Auckland.

Mr Dreaneen's lawyer said the man had removed the items from some youths who were pointing it at his dog, and subsequently hid them under the traffic cone to avoid being caught with them. However, the prosecuting ser-geant told the judge this version of events was unconfirmed.

Judge Saunders said she could give him the benefit of the doubt for possessing the rifle, but not the large amount of ammunition, and said he should have taken it to the

police. "Clearly knew you shouldn't have had it... Ordinarily the only reason to have an unlawful weap-on is for unlawful reasons," she said.

"The wrong decision was made." Judge Saunders also ordered the destruction of the items.

"Unfortunately, the current workforce shortages with medical practitioners that we require to ensure the continued delivery of quality medical care from our Te Aroha Whānau Health Centre has made it increasingly difficult for us to operate," the letter said.

"After considerable reflection... we have had to make this very difficult decision to temporarily downsize our medical care servic-

The clinic was already operating with reduced hours, with services only available on Wednesdays.

From June 4, the medical team, receptionist and kaiāwhina will be relocated to Te Korowai's Paeroa Whānau Health Centre.

A Te Korowai spokesperson said the 1600 enrolled patients who identified Te Aroha as their preferred treatment site would still be eligible to receive medical services at other Te Korowai clinics in the district.

"There is an international and national shortage of clinical staff, particularly GPs," the spokesperson said.

"We are, however, fortunate to be able to continue to deliver ser-

vices from another of our sites ... We do acknowledge that travel can be an issue for some whānau,

particularly in our rural locations." The consolidation of staff to one site would help manage wait times for patients in the meantime, they said, with two GPs, three clinical nurses and two kaiāwhina now available in Paeroa.

The spokesperson also said the organisation was committed to keeping practice fees affordable despite the need to attract more staff.

The organisation will continue to advertise for new recruits, but said it could not reopen services in Te Aroha until it could ensure its services could be delivered safely

services could be delivered safely for both patients and staff. "Unfortunately the shortage has made this an extremely chal-lenging employment market," the spokesperson said.

'Furthermore, it would be remiss of Te Korowai Hauora o Hauraki to not mention the need for appropriate and sufficient general practice funding required from government, considering the pressures on services and constraints on access are even more accentuated in Pare Hauraki, as a rural sector of the health system."

\$450k overspend concerns cour

he Hauraki District Council's mayor and councillors knew nothing about a \$450,000 budget overspend on council projects, it was revealed in a recent meeting.

A report tabled at the May 29 meeting said the council's approved delegation cap of \$76 million in net debt had been exceeded in April, with the borrowed fig-ure now standing at \$76.45m. The report said the extra expenditure

was due to a higher operating expendi-ture than forecast, and it recommended the council retroactively approve the overspend.

However, councillors were quick to voice their displeasure with the request, saying the overspend was indicative of a persistent over-budgeting culture within council.

'Every time we have these meetings we're over-budgeting. We need to ad-dress [it]," councillor Josh Martyn said. Councillor Bhavesh Ranchhod said: "Why do we have delegations if they

can be exceeded and retroactively ap-proved?" The question was echoed by councillor Carole Daley, who said: "We're operating outside our authority". Councillors also raised concerns

around internal communication. Several members, including Mayor Toby Adams, said they had been unaware of the overspend until they received the report.

"This was quite a big jump and no one knew about it - that's the part where the councillors are concerned. It should have been flagged a lot earlier that there would

be overspend," Mayor Adams said. The report said a number of pro-jects on the council's current work programme would need to be put on hold if the overspend was not approved, until the adoption of the new long term plan.

Chief executive Langley Cavers said the pressure was on the council to achieve 80 per cent of its projects, saying the overspend was a pragmatic, short-term issue. However, he acknowledged the councillors' concerns, taking note of their "very clear message" not to deviate from project budgets.

"We got it a bit wrong in this case... We spent a bit more than we had planned,' he said.

The overspend was eventually approved by council, which also approved the raising of the delegation cap to \$90m of net debt, bringing it in line with new forecasts from the long term plan.

Meanwhile, the council also agreed to continue endorsing Destination Hauraki Coromandel (DHC), bringing it in line with Thames Coromandel District Council's recent commitment to continue supporting the organisation.

DHC was seeking an "enhanced status quo" from the councils, and tabled a review which said the entity was fulfilling its core purpose but had "room for improvement".

Councils were not asked for extra funding, and the commitment would instead involve more collaboration with DHC to ensure a consistent approach to tourism marketing in the region.



Do your trees need a trim?

Trees in power lines cause 1 in 4 power cuts on our network each year.

Overgrown trees and the risk of falling trees and branches can affect power lines, cause outages and make it difficult to restore power. Trees near power lines can also be a fire risk.

You can help by planting trees and shrubs away from power lines and regularly trimming your trees.

We keep an eye on trees growing close too power lines and will give you a 'cut or trim' notice if your tree is too close.

Cutting trees near power lines is dangerous and can result in electrocution and serious injuries, so you need to get a Powerco-approved contractor to do this work. And when it's done, you need to let us know.

If you don't use a contractor, or let us know that the work's complete, you could be fined up to \$10,000, plus a further \$500 per day that the work is outstanding.

Let's each do our part and together, we'll keep the lights on. This tree may look clear of the power lines but it still poses a danger,

even if it's not in the growth limit zone. Remember: only approved contractors can cut or trim trees within 4m of power lines.

Protestors gather for nationwide hikoi

More than 50 people gathered in Paeroa on May 30 as part of nationwide action or hikoi organised by Te Pāti Māori and Toitū Te Tiriti to protest against the government's proposed changes to legislation affecting Māori.

People across the country showed up to attend hikoi or rallies in their regions, which also included demonstrations in Thames, Ngatea and Waihī.

In Paeroa, adults, children, and whānau sang waiata, held up banners and waved Tino Rangatiratanga flags while passersby offered honks and waves of support at the roundabout intersecting State Highways 2 and 26.

Paeroa hīkoi co-coordinator Hinemoana Collier told *The Profile* the call was to "urge our people to oppose our coalition government" regarding the proposed repeal of Section 7AA of the Oranga Tamariki Act 1989, the fast tracking approval bill and removal of Te Aka Whai Ora Māori Health Authority.

The day was an "opportunity for us to make history and to include our tamariki and be a part of this", she said.

Paeroa protestors started just before 8am with a karakia. At 9am the group finished

with waiata and karakia, then

made their way over to join the "a u Thames hikoi at Victoria Park. to th

Toitū Te Tiriti, or Honour the Treaty movement, and Te Pāti Māori called for Māori and non-Maori to join in the action by going on strike to demonstrate

"a unified Aotearoa response to the government's assault on Tangata Whenua and Te Tiriti o Waitangi".

They said the kaupapa (cause) was about "asserting the mana of Te Tiriti o Waitangi as endur-

ing and everlasting".

Prior to the nationwide action, Prime Minister Christopher Luxon said it was "entirely wrong" and "illegal" for Te Pāti Māori to be encouraging people to take the day off work. Photo: DAVIDDA HIKATANGATA

"Feel free to protest - that's what we have weekends for," he said in a media conference.

People were free to protest as they want - "as long as it's legal and peaceable and it's lawful", he said.

MEGHAN HAWKES searches through old newspapers to bring you the stories Thames Valley locals once read about themselves.


1913

Waikaka (now Patetonga) set-tlers petitioned the Minister of Lands asking for improved methods of transport from the Piako River and to build a goods shed in the settlement.

But the Minister refused saying Mr Scotcher's truck was well used for the carriage of settlers' goods from the wharf on the Piako River up to Waikaka, a distance, of $3^{1/4}$ miles. When the truck was not in use by Mr Scotcher, he lent it to any settler who required it, but the settler had to find his own horse and driver.

As well as Scotcher's truck there were two smaller ones which are always available for use. On the wharf there was a very large shed for storing goods, and no reason why arrangements could not be made for settlers to access their goods whenever they wanted. Under the circumstances the

government felt it was not necessary to put an extra tram on the line and adequate storage had already been provided for settlers free of charge at the wharf. Another petition, this time

from Miranda settlers to the Thames County Council, asked for their co-operation in securing from the government a block of land at Miranda on which hot springs were situated, and also acquiring land for small areas of settlement.

It was well known that the hot springs at Miranda had curative properties, and steps needed to be taken to have them reserved for the benefit of the public. The request was approved.

Meanwhile, a mystery, almost as perplexing as a movie plot, came Mr Hawken's way after he finished his entertainments - the showing of moving pictures - at Paeroa.

It was his custom to return home to Karangahake in a sulky each evening and have this vehicle brought round to the front of

the theatre. It was also his custom to have supper before leaving, his horse calmly standing outside waiting. As well as the sulky for Mr Hawken and the operator, there was a spring trap to carry the engine and other show paraphernalia.

This, with the driver, safely got away but when Mr Hawken and his attendant came out, to their intense surprise, they found their horse and trap had vanished. Theory was rife, some bystand-ers suggesting that someone had taken it to Hikutaia and would return later.

Mr Hawken immediately procured a bicycle and made off in the direction of Karangahake hoping to catch up to the driver of

the spring trap. Having reached Turners Hill, and seeing no trace of horse

Photo: SUPPLIED or trap, he returned to Paeroa, branching off in numerous directions without success. Long after midnight, another trap was se-cured for Mr Hawken and his assistant and they drove off to Karangahake. A couple of Karangahake resident's was also scouring

the country for the valuable rig. Each took different roads, but, worn out, they gave up the hunt at 6am and returned to Karanga-hake. There they found the horse peacefully standing at the stable door waiting to get in.

No equipment was disturbed, and theory was the horse must have followed the spring trap for a distance and wandered off for a bit of fresh grass or that, after all, some diabolical individual had taken it to Hikutaia, brought it back again to Paeroa, and turned it adriff.

not because I am a workaholic, but instead because of my loss of routine. My normal routine is to rise early before the kids and steal a moment of stillness.

A moment where I can have time to read, reflect, and fuel up my spir-itual tank so to speak. Sometimes the routine feels dry and does not feel like it does a lot for me, and sometimes its absolutely inspiring. Yet almost without fail every time the holiday's roll around I relax. My alarm for the early rise goes

off and I fall back to sleep. I stay up later and my routine or rhythm crumbles. And the funny thing is that I am suddenly reminded of how important my routine is for me. Even when it feels like it's boring and lost a bit of focus, it turns

out rhythm brings life for me. As I reflect on this, I remember learning that the only clinically proven actions that help depres-sion is routine and for anxiety it is exposure. I heard this at a train-ing around the therapeutic model, DNA-V, that we use in our work. This has been such a helpful thing to be aware of both for myself and for people I connect with. It is so normal for most of us, when something unexpected or hard comes along to be knocked off track a bit.

Our routine gets thrown out the window and it can be a challenge or even impossible to step back on

to that same track. The challenge is that if we stay off track long enough, we will begin to experience apathy and a loss of direction. And as George Washington Carver said, "Where there is no vi-

sion, there is no hope". From there it's not hard for de-

pression and anxiety to take hold. And the irony is that the very things that are good for us, the very things that would get us back on track, become the hardest things to do. Depression destroys moti-vation and the last thing we want to do is follow a routine. Anxiety breeds fear and the last thing we want to do is face those fears.

Yet they are the very things that will see the struggle reduce. They are the very things that will grow our world again. But I wonder if it's something to consider for most of us. Holidays are great, but they can lead to a loss of routine and motivation.

Chilling out at home is cool for a bit, but if you're a nervous personality it can lead to becoming anxious about doing certain things. And so, with these things in mind, maybe, just maybe, we need to consider that there are some things we do that we can't afford to take a holiday from. For me its my morning moment of stillness What is it for you?

If it weren't for our drains, where would we be?

Most Hauraki Plains farmers would agree with Fred Dagg that they'd be lost without their gum boots. But if it weren't for its drains, the Plains would also be in deep water.

Thanks to a land drainage network that includes drains, floodgates, pumps and stop banks, around 64,000 hectares of peat wetland and kahikatea forest is now farmland.

There are a few rules about urban and rural drainage that you need to know about, especially if you have our drains, stopbanks, floodgates or pumps on your property.

Refuse Transfer Stations

There's no kerbside collection in our rural areas, but we do have a recycling and green waste centre in River Road, Ngātea. Recycling is free to drop off. Greenwaste fees apply.

You can also take your rubbish, garden waste and scrap metal to our refuse transfer stations in Paeroa (weigh station available) and Waihī fees apply. Drop off of recycling including rigid plastics 1, 2 and 5; soft plastics; liquid paper board cartons; paper; cardboard; aluminium; tin cans and glass bottles and jars is free. We accept Eftpos, debit and credit cards. No cash facility.

Please take care on our roads

A large portion of Hauraki District's roading network (44%, about 230km) lies on soft, moisture sensitive organic (peat) and marine (gley) soils. The extreme drought of 2019/2020 and the recent severe weather events, means that some of our roads on the Plains are still showing signs of rutting and settling which causes uneven road surfaces.

Keep both hands on the wheel, drive to the conditions and always expect the unexpected on our rural roads. Watch out for roadworks and slow down for the temporary speed limits in place.

Protect yourself from strep throat

What is Strep Throat?

Strep throat is different from a viral sore throat that you might get with a cold. It is caused by a bacteria called Streptococcus. Without treatment, strep throat can cause rheumatic fever, which can damage your heart.

It is contagious and spread by close contact, often by breathing in droplets from an infected person's coughs and sneezes.

It can also be spread through food or drinks. Living in close proximity, such as your family home, school or university hostels, makes it easy to pass on strep throat.

The symptoms can include: painful or scratchy throat, especially when you swallow, difficulty in swallowing, redness at the back of your mouth, fever (a normal body temp is 37.5), bad breath swollen glands in your neck, tonsils are large and covered in white matter, headaches, stomach pain, nausea and vomiting.

To stop infections spreading or coming back: cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when vou sneeze or cough.

when they sleep to limit the chance of germs spreading.




