Library listener lends a paw

There were a handful of patrons in Waihi Library on Friday afternoon: adults perusing the stacks; some teens on a computer; and a furry, four-legged visitor curled up among the picture books. Six-year-old Connie, an Italian Spinone, was visiting the library with her owner and handler Sue Hagen for a new free programme called Read to Kuri [a dog].

Every Friday, they will be available from 3-4pm for children to sit and practice their reading in a non-judgemental, safe space, by reading aloud to Connie. The programme is free, with each participant able to book a 10-minute slot with Connie and Sue.

The duo are part of Canine Friends Pet Therapy, a New Zealand-wide network of people who bring their dogs to libraries, rest homes, hospitals, and other places where they can have therapeutic benefits. Sue has been part of the group for around 15 years, with both Connie and her previous pets.

"It's something that we can do together; it gives

[the dogs] a bit of excitement, other than going to dog shows. I did agility with one of them, and that was fun, but I tripped and broke my ankle, so I stopped doing that," Sue said.

The animals go through exposure testing before joining the Pet Therapy network, to ensure they are able to handle the uncertainty of unfamiliar environments and people.

"The assessment they do is just to ensure that she's shock-proof, really... they dropped crutches on the floor around her and things like that."

The spinone breed was particularly well-suited to library work, Sue said.

"They're relatively calm, even though they're big, and they're just quite friendly," she said. "And she doesn't stop wagging her tail."

Read to Kuri has been running since May 16, and Sue said she was thrilled with the response so far.

"Last week a little girl had a book about a cat, and she wanted to read that to Connie, and she said, 'is it all right? Will it upset her?'" Sue said. "Some of the kids just lay down with her and read in her ear."

Sue is learning too.

"There was one [child] that was probably nine, and she introduced me to graphic novels because I didn't really know what they were," she said.

The ages of the participants so far have varied, from five and just beginning to

read, up to around pre-teen. Several of the children had been excited to find dog-themed books to show to Connie, Sue said.

Library staff member Shey Scott said the programme was just another way the library could encourage children to become more comfortable with reading, and with the library environment.

"Ideally we'd like children who are making a little bit of an attempt. But even if they can't read and they just come along... that is getting the kids interested in the books and literacy," she said.

"And the wonderful thing about Sue coming in with Connie is that the children all got books out afterwards. And they would probably not have made that trip in."

"Just getting them in the door is a great thing, isn't it?" Sue added.

"Libraries are such wonderful places."

Waihi to the world: a lifetime in rugby recognised

Rugby stalwart Ross Cooper knew something was happening on the sidelines.

He just wasn't sure what. While both Ross and his wife Judy had their suspicions something "secret squirrel" was afoot, with mail even being "snaffled" from the letterbox, it was little more than a week ago when they learned the purpose - that he'd been named a King's Service Medal recipient in this year's King's Birthday Honours.

The recognition has left him feeling "incredibly proud" and humbled, as he reflected on more than 50 years of service to rugby.

As a player, Ross played for Wairarapa-Bush, Centurions, and the Thames Valley Rugby Union, serving as captain, and variously as team manager and selector coach between 1984 and 2007.

He won two national titles with Thames Valley in 1988 and 1990. He then moved on to be a senior coach for Counties Manukau, and the Chiefs Super Rugby Team, and has been a selector for various New Zealand Under 17, Under 19, New Zealand Colts/Under 21s, Academy, Divisional, and Heartland teams.

He was an All Blacks Selector and Assistant Coach from 1994 to 1998, and counts among his proudest moments being part of the All Blacks coaching team that made history in 1996, clinching their first-ever series win on South African soil.

But despite working on rugby's

biggest stages, Ross has never lost sight of his Thames Valley roots.

He has been involved for more than 14 years on the Thames Valley Rugby Union Executive Committee, including five as deputy chair, and is now its president and a life member.

And even in the most established rugby circles, he always made sure his region had a voice.

"I was in the Canterbury Supporters Club and Bill Bush, who's a famous All Black, was reading out the results of the day," he re-

calls. "I said: 'Excuse me, Mr Bush, could you please read out the results for Thames Valley?' And the whole crowd turned around and looked at me. I just thought, well, you shouldn't just read out First Division."

Having spent most of his life in the provinces, Ross, from Waihi, knows first-hand the strength of New Zealand's rugby heartbeat in the smaller regions. He says he's most proud of helping to break the notion that skilled rugby players only come from big centres.

"I've spent most of my time in Thames Valley, but people just assume that you have to be in Auckland to make a team," he says.

"You sort of break down some of the barriers that, you know, you have to live in Auckland or you have to play for the big teams to get there... but a lot of our All Blacks start in little Heartland units. You've got to dream; you can get anywhere if you want to work hard," he says. "I'm very passionate about Heartland rugby, that's what I'm trying to say."

As a selector and coach, Ross had a sharp eye for emerging talent - and a knack for spotting it early. One of his most memorable discoveries came during his time coaching Counties, when he first saw a young Jonah Lomu play for Wesley College.

"I came back from Counties one night, and told Judy: 'I've seen an All Black.' She said, 'What? You've seen an All Black?' and I said, 'Well no, he's not an All Black yet, but he's going to be'. And it was Jonah. "What happened was, in '94, I got him in my squad. He played against Horowhenua in 1994, and that was his first game ever in the league."

Rugby Database has it written: It was Wednesday, May 4 at what was then called Lion Red Stadium. Counties won 108-12.

It's a memory etched into the try line of his career, but Ross - whose first job was as an intermediate school teacher in Rotorua - says he wouldn't have been able to master any of it without his family's support.

"I'm just a school teacher from Waikato, basically, who fell into coaching," he says.

"You know, I'm very honoured. If it wasn't for Judy and the family, I would have never made it. I would never have done it without them."

And even though the King's Birthday Honour was, for a time, a well-kept secret, Ross' impact on New Zealand and homegrown rugby is anything but.

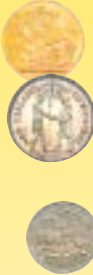

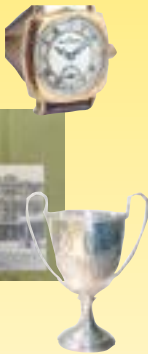

Historic oven latest to be swiped at battery

Volunteers at the Victoria Battery near Waihi are asking the public to keep their eyes peeled for an historic oven stolen from the site.

Between the evening of Wednesday, May 21, and early morning on Friday, May 23, a “small but very heavy” oven that had been stored on top of a carriage chassis was taken.

The chassis, which had been chained to others up at the Waikino museum, had also been moved down to the main gate.

The oven had been donated to the Victoria Battery Tramway Society five months ago for restoration and future display, and chairperson Kerry Single said the item had originally been used at the battery site, possibly to melt gold for sampling or to keep workers warm.

“This oven’s removal would have required at least two or three people with a trailer, utility vehicle, or van,” he said.

The theft has been reported to Police.

The historic site in the Karangahake Gorge has seen an increase in after-hours activity as of late.

Between the evening of Sunday, May 18 and Tuesday, May 19, a large skip bin was tipped

off a bogey wheel chassis before the chassis was moved around 10 meters on to another rail line and pushed to where other wheeled items were stored.

“It was then left there as it was probably found to be very

heavy to shift from there,” Kerry said.

And in the last two years, two signs have also been stolen.

“Items outside are chained to each other and generally awkward shapes, sizes and weights.

We are considering CCTV, but that is a huge cost and [the thieves] would probably steal those as well,” he said.

“The main entrance gate is locked at night so it would be difficult to get a vehicle on to



the site without damaging the gate or removing the lock.”

Kerry told *The Profile* it was frustrating for the small but dedicated group of volunteers to show up to the site and find things had been stolen; however, despite the setbacks, they were committed to “safeguarding this invaluable heritage”.

“Volunteers spend on average about 300-400 hours a month at the site showing visitors around, maintaining and refurbishing the engines and carriages, repairing and maintaining the rail track, and museum exhibits,” he said.

“We would like to get the oven back so that we can preserve it and have it for all visitors to enjoy.”

Hauraki rates set to rise 10.6 per cent

Hauraki District Council confirmed its rates for the next financial year at its May 29 meeting, with the adoption of its 2025/26 annual plan.

Council's group manager of business support Duncan Peddie said ratepayers could expect to see an average increase of 10.6 per cent per property overall.

The new rates will come into effect on July 1.

Property rates had previously been projected to be a 13.3 per cent increase in the council's 2024-2034 long term plan, but would now be increasing by only 8.4 per cent. This would amount to an average of \$251 extra per residential property annually, or 69 cents per day.

Duncan said the council had managed to offset the property rates with two one-off reductions in the council's budget: a \$1.65 million underspend on its roading budget, and a property sale of council land in Ngatea.

However, water rates would

now be increasing by 15.3 per cent instead of the projected 10 per cent; an increase mostly caused by the government's water levy increases and extra regulatory reporting requirements, the council said.

For an average residential property, this would mean an extra \$108 annually, or 30 cents per day.

At the meeting, the council also approved a grant of \$1500 for the proposed community garden on the corner of Aorangi and Ainslie Rds in Paeroa, subject to the group providing a satisfactory plan for the scheme.

It was noted that a land use consent would also be required, as the lot is zoned for residential and a community garden would be considered a farming activity.

A second grant of \$1691.50 was also approved for Waihi resident Sarah Keall, to attend the Aspiring Leaders Forum in Wellington.

Rise in outdoor burning complaints

Waikato Regional Council has received more complaints about burnings than usual for this time of year.

For the month to 25 May 2025, it received 36 outdoor burning complaints, up 50 per cent from the same period in 2024, when it received 24 outdoor burning complaints.

Incident response team leader Wayne Reed said people needed to be aware of the impacts of fires on their properties. "Communication is also key, so we encourage people to talk to their neighbours before they burn," he said.

"We have had a lengthy dry summer and now that the weather has changed, I can understand people will be wanting to have a bit of a clean-up."

Council said environmental regulations in this region allowed certain materials to be burnt, however, people needed to ensure the burning would not: cause adverse effects on human health or the health of flora and fauna; result in odour

that is objectionable that it causes an adverse effect over the property boundary; discharge particulate matter that is objectionable that it causes an adverse effect over the boundary; significantly impair visibility beyond the boundary; cause corrosion or accelerated deterioration to structures beyond the boundary.

Materials that could be burnt, so long as the above conditions were adhered to and the materials had been sourced from the property were: untreated wood and vegetative matter; paper and cardboard; food waste; non halogenated plastics; animal carcasses on production land.

Kaihere Hunt to raise funds for turf

Organised by the Kaihere School PTA, The Kaihere Hunt has more than \$10,000 worth of prizes on offer this year.

People are invited to hunt pigs, deer, turkey, peacocks, magpies, rabbits, hare, stoats and ferrets - but the main focus is possums.

The PTA will organise the possums to be plucked and then the fur sold.

Hunting location is open and weigh-in is at midday on June 8 on the school fields.

Event co-ordinator Clare Ward said: "Thanks to the great support from local and other businesses plus community members, we have some awesome prizes up for grabs".

"The hunt is gathering momentum year by year with participation by hunters of all ages."

This year the focus is on possums, a major pest in the area, with four prize categories: most possums; second most; average number; lucky number.

Younger hunters are encouraged to be involved with 'mini hunters' prizes as well as spot prizes for the ugliest possum, the longest rat's tail, the silliest goose and the best dressed hunter.

Kaihere School children had their interest sparked when Maree Limpus from the Department of Conservation recently gave a talk about the importance of keeping the environment pest free - an important and serious message that goes with the fun and the competition of the hunt.

There are also categories in the 16 years and older group for average weight pigs, biggest tusks, and for heaviest deer and best head.

Mini-hunters, the under 16 year old group, can enter for average number of possums, most runners, most flight, most climbers and most overall pests.

SOS call: Save Our Sheep, a sector in crisis

From the golden age of wool to lamb roasts at Sunday dinner, sheep farming has sat at the heart of our national identity for generations. We used to proudly say New Zealand was built off the sheep's back-but today our sheep farmers are sitting at a crossroads, unsure which way to turn.

Our sector is in crisis - and we can no longer face it alone. Sheep are quickly becoming an endangered species in New Zealand. Their main predators? Pines, pigs, and poor government policy.

To paint a picture for you: I'm only 44, and in my lifetime alone we've already lost over two-thirds of our national flock.

That's not just a scary statistic-it's a warning sign that our policy settings are badly broken and that something is very wrong.

Since 2007, when the Emissions Trading Scheme (ETS) was first introduced, our national flock has shrunk by 40 per cent. We're now losing almost a million sheep every year.

If that trajectory continues, within the next two decades there'll be no sheep left in New Zealand. Is that really the future we want for our country?

As sheep numbers continue to decline, huge pressure is being put on the critical infrastructure that supports our red meat sector, like meatworks, shearers and stock trucks.

Without sufficient livestock, our

meat processors - already operating on tight margins - will struggle to justify the continued investment required to continue operating.

The economics simply don't work. Alliance's Smithfield meatworks in Timaru has already closed its doors, and that's not a one-off: it's a symptom of the times.

This is not the situation our farmers should be facing, but even with strong prices for red meat, farmers are still exiting the industry. Their confidence has evaporated.

When farmers aren't investing de-

spite good returns, it means they're looking at the broader policy picture-and they don't like what they see.

So, what does a sheep farmer see when they look out their window? Right now, it's nothing but pine trees, pests, and politicians breaking promises.

New Zealand's climate policy is creating huge uncertainty, and the endless push to plant pine trees risks forever changing the face of our rural communities.

Between 2017 and 2024 alone, 260,000 hectares of sheep and beef

land were converted to pine - not because forestry is a better use of that land, but because of our flawed ETS settings.

This is short-sighted, dangerous policy. We're sacrificing food production, rural jobs, and community resilience at the altar of carbon accounting.

Sheep farmers are not climate deniers. We've always been environmental stewards, understand the land better than most, and want to leave it in better shape for the next generation.

But regulation must be grounded in practical reality, not ideology. Blanket environmental rules that fail to consider the nuances of hill country farming are doing more harm than good.

The great irony in all of this is New Zealand sheep farmers are among the most efficient and sustainable producers of red meat in the world.

Our carbon footprint per kilogram of lamb is lower than virtually any other nation, and our wool is a renewable and biodegradable alternative to synthetic fibres and plastics.

So why are our sheep-farming families being punished, rather than rewarded, for the work we do behind our farm gate? The answer is simple: politics.

Unfortunately, the electoral math is not in our favour. Politicians will always chase the votes of big population centres like Auckland and Wellington over small rural communities.


There also seems to be an attitude in the halls of power that the farming vote can be taken for granted, but those who hold that view should tread carefully.

So, what's the solution? I think New Zealanders need to ask themselves a simple question: do we still value our sheep industry? Because if we do, we need to act - and fast.

It's time to start valuing food production and put an end to the broken climate policies that are turning productive farmland into pine plantations and pest havens.

Farmers are sounding the alarm. This is our SOS. Please save our sheep - before it's too late.

Future leader steps up for Youth Parliament

Seventeen-year-old Holly Timmins has been getting a first-hand taste of what it's like to be a politician.

The Hauraki Plains College student was selected to be Port Waikato MP Andrew Bayly's representative in the 2025 Youth Parliament.

The programme, which runs from April 28 to August 29, sees 143 youths from the age of 16-18 shadowing a member of parliament as they attend meetings, chat with constituents, and go about their regular duties.

They will also attend a two-day Youth Parliament event in Wellington - meeting their fellow youth MPs, attending think-tank sessions, and preparing presentations on a number of topics affecting New Zealand.

For Holly, the decision to apply was easy.

"I've always had an interest in politics," she said.

"I care deeply about my country and hope to encourage my generation to stay in New Zealand and contribute in a positive way."

The experience so far had been eye-opening, she said.

"I went to the Anzac Day services in Pokeno and Waiuku, and at the Waiuku service, I

read the Governor-General's speech," she said.

"I think not many get the opportunity to walk around with Andrew Bayly, and I'm actually really impressed with him. It's definitely been a lot of fun."

Holly said the most valuable part of the experience so far had not been learning about the political ideals of her mentor, but rather the way he deals with is-

sues in the job itself; things like personal safety, information-gathering, and remaining impartial when addressing constituents' concerns.

"He's giving me pointers as he does things... about reading people and seeing what they need and how they need to be spoken to," she said.

"The way he interacts with people and the way he talks

about his goals for the future, just keeping calm.

"Another big thing that he taught was how to say no, because obviously there are some people who have really bad struggles, but you can't always give them exactly what they need."

Meanwhile, Holly has also been attending online meetings with her peers. Her group

has been assigned the topic of gambling, a subject which Holly said she knows little about - but she's eager to learn.

"I don't actually know too much about gambling, which is fine because I'm quite interested to research and learn about it," she said.

"And then, in the school holidays, I go down to Parliament, and I get to present a speech, as well as [the] group study project."

Holly's real passion, however, is education. She said she hoped to one day be able to improve the education system and career opportunities for other young New Zealanders.

And while she intends to keep up with politics in the future, it's the internal workings of the system that interests her most.

"I definitely am going to keep doing politics in the future, even if it's just a hobby, just keeping up with it. Because it's hard being a politician in this country," Holly said.

"But I'm more interested in the inside stuff. It's about knowing what's actually going on. And if I read something online, I think, oh, is that true? Maybe I should do a bit more research."

"I'm interested in the truth."



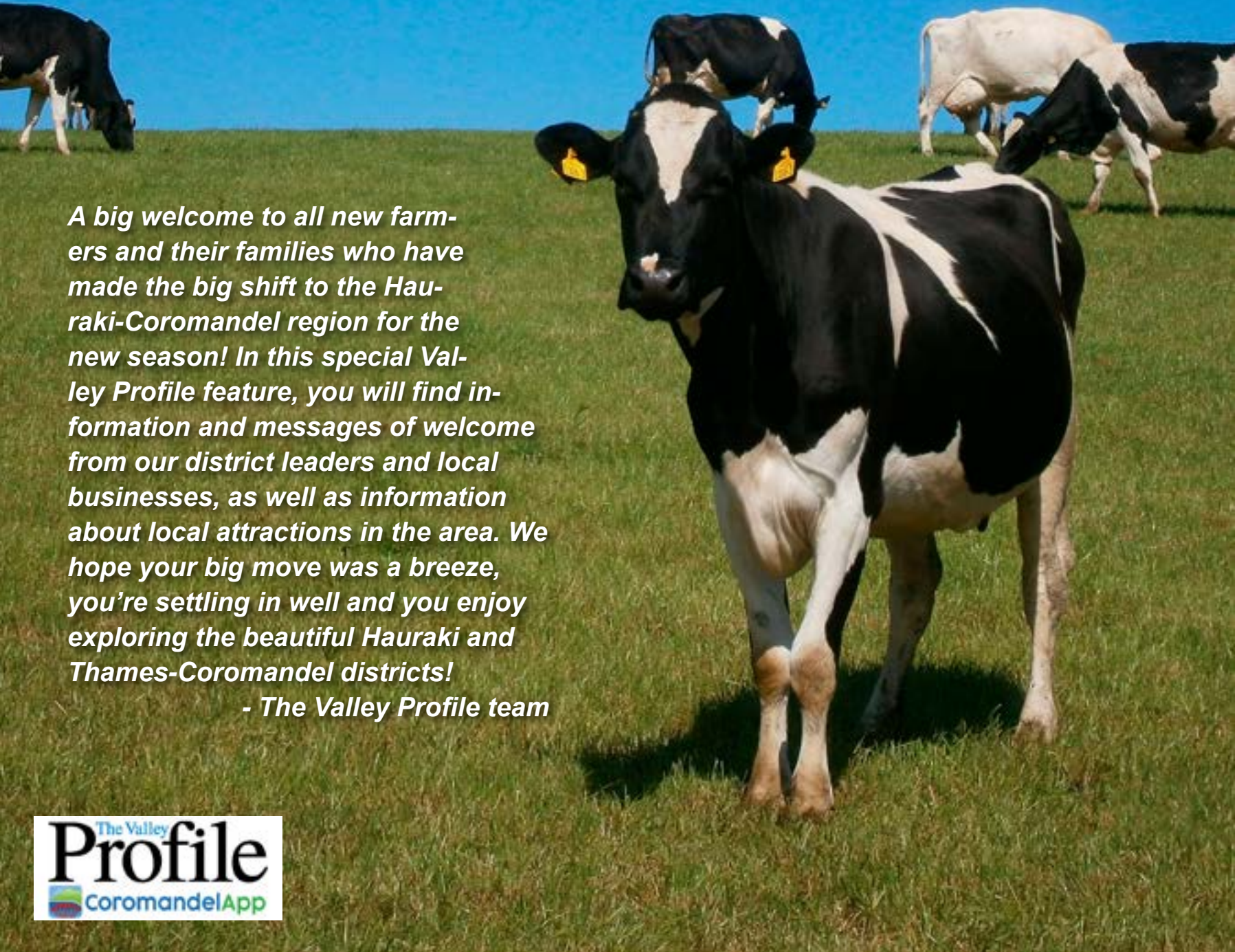

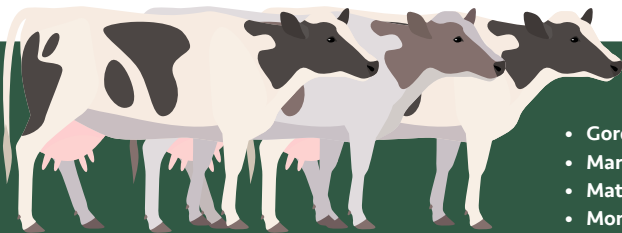

Coro events awarded funding boost

‘A stranger’s sad end’ at Paeroa’s Puke Wharf



As part of a Valley Profile series, **MEGHAN HAWKES** explores our local history by seeking out stories of life and death in the Thames Valley

Around 11am on a Sunday in December, 1914, Frank Carlsen, a Norwegian barge hand, was in search of tobacco. The 38-year-old had been employed for the past three weeks on the *Rotokohu*, one of the Northern Steamship Company’s barge pulling steamers, now alongside Puke Wharf at Paeroa. He asked two other barge hands, Sorensen and Rasmussen, if they had any tobacco and Rasmussen gave him some. Frank went away with a partially smoked cigarette in his mouth. Rasmussen, working wharf-side, later borrowed a broom from Frank, going on to the steamer to get it. Sorensen left the steamer for lunch about 12 o’clock, returning an hour later. The cabin door was open and he guessed Frank was lying down - he was in the habit of sleeping on the barge in the river by himself. Rasmussen returned the broom a little after 5pm, throwing it on to the barge, and at 5.30

The next morning at 8, when Mr Silcock, agent at Paeroa for the Northern Steamship Company, arrived at work, Captain McDonald of the *Rotokohu* told him Frank was missing. The cabin door was open. Frank’s washing was hung out to dry on the fence near the wharf. His best suit was missing, although all his hats were there. The police were called. There was a 12-inch-wide plank from the wharf to the barge, which the *Rotokohu* lay on the outside of. The length of the plank was only five or six feet, and went from one of the stringers of the wharf on to a stack of manure on the barge. It was thought Frank had

slipped from the plank and drowned. Later that evening, after a search by Constable Miles and others over several hours, Frank’s body was found near the Puke wharf. Newspapers reported on ‘A stranger’s sad end’. At the inquest Mr Silcock said Frank had been very steady and attentive to his work. He was really off duty at the time of his accident, and the company took no responsibility. Dr Smith said there was every evidence of death by drowning. Sorensen, working about 60 yards from where the barge was lying, said it would have been quite possible for Frank to have fallen off the plank without Sorensen seeing him. He heard no splash or anything to cause him to think there

had been any trouble. Frank appeared to be in good health and spirits when they spoke. Both Sorensen and Rasmussen considered the plank safe for anyone to walk on. When Rasmussen returned the broom, the plank was in the same position as it had been at 11 o’clock that morning. A verdict was returned of ‘found drowned’, with there not being sufficient evidence to show how Frank came into the river. So far as was known, Frank was unmarried and had no relations in New Zealand. He was known to Auckland police due to a drunken quarrel and failure to pay fines, but appeared to be on the verge of a new start in the Thames Valley. Frank was buried at Paeroa’s Pukerimu cemetery.

Promoting wellness this winter

Winter has arrived here in Hauraki, and with it the seasonal illnesses that come with shorter days and cooler weather.

The Whānau Health Centre team at Te Korowai Hauora o Hauraki, led by Poukura Hauora Janine Thompson and Clinical Services Director Dr Martin Mikaere, have some important winter wellness messages to share.

“There are some steps that we can all take to look after each other during cold and flu season, remembering the basics of regular hand washing, wearing a mask if you have symptoms, and staying home if you are sick,” Janine said.

Throughout the month of June, the team are focused on getting whānau immunised.

“Immunisation offers the best protection for our tamariki mokopuna against serious diseases like whooping cough and measles, which can result in hospitalisations and cause serious long-term health effects.”

All immunisations on the National Immunisation Schedule are free for tamariki under 18 years old, and if you’re not sure whether your child is up to date, you can check with your Well Child/Tamariki Ora nurse or your GP practice.

Flu vaccines are also available now in all of our Whānau Health Centres and are free for some groups, including hapū māmā (pregnant people), whānau aged over 65, and whānau who have a long term medical condition like diabetes, asthma, or a heart condition.

“Our enrolled whānau can ring and book an appointment to come in and have their flu vaccine and, depending on the individual, they may be able to get their Covid booster at the same time.”

And a reminder from Janine that if you or someone in your whānau is unwell, the free Healthline service is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

You can call and speak to experienced nurses and paramedics who can offer health advice and information about what to do next.

“And if that advice for our whānau is to see your doctor, you can give us a call on our freephone number and we will plan the best care for you and your whānau to get well again.”

The other day, I was in a meeting chatting about a new project and it needed a team around it. I offered to help get things started - get the ball rolling - but made it clear I'd need to step back once the team was set as I'm juggling a lot right now.

Most of the people in the room were at the retirement stage of life - more time to offer, decades of wisdom to share.

Someone chuckled and said, "We're all busy, Mike".

I smiled. Said nothing. But inside? I wanted to lay it all out.

I wanted to say, "Mate, I've got four kids. I'm up at 4:45am most mornings. I'm building an online course, trying to figure out how to publish a book, working full-time, and holding the rest of life together on not enough sleep.

We're lucky if we get two nights a week without something on."

But I didn't say it. I kept quiet.

And later, I started thinking - how easy it is to assume.

How quick we are to judge someone else's 'busy', or pain, or priorities.

We hear one comment and think we know the story. But we don't.

Not really.

Everyone's carrying something. Sometimes it's obvious.

Most of the time, it's tucked behind a polite smile, a quiet "I'm fine", or a nod that says, "Don't worry about me".

The next day, I came across a Proverb about how each heart knows its own bitterness - and its own joy.

It hit me.

We can't fully share in what someone else is carrying - but we can slow down.

We can hold off on the assumptions.

And we can choose to listen.

Next time someone says they're tired or can't commit, don't roll your eyes.

Don't assume they're lazy or unmotivated.

Ask.

Lean in.

Try to understand.

You might be surprised by the weight they're holding with one hand - while pouring your tea with the other.

Contractors for NZ Transport Agency Waka Kotahi cleared the slips and the road reopened later that day.

From sawdust to second chances

Offcuts and leftover materials from the new library build at Waihi Beach are weaving their way into the community through a recycling effort that is giving them a second life in gardens, schools, farms and local projects.

Close to 170sqm of materials - mostly offcuts of timber, piles and plywood - have been utilised by individuals and community groups, including the Waihi Beach Menz Shed, Waihi Beach School and Habitat for Humanity. Much of the timber was recycled via an on-site 'kiosk' run by construction company Hawkins, from which people could collect materials for their home and community projects.

Garry Kirkbride, from Waihi, used cut-off timber piles to replace a garden retaining wall in his backyard. "It was a tyre retaining wall and, although it served its purpose, it was ugly - we are very happy with the result," he said. "It's a great initiative, offering scrap material free of charge to the locals."

Other materials that could not be reused, were recycled where possible through other means - polystyrene was returned to Expol, plasterboard went back to Winstone Wallboards, metal offcuts to a scrap metal dealer, and plastic was sent to saveBOARD, who upcycle packaging waste into new building products.

"In general, a site this size would generate up to 30 cubic metres of waste. So far we have redirected at least half of that," Hawkins site manager James Reynolds said.

"The aim was to do as much as we could for the community, while diverting as much waste away from landfill as possible. We also used as many local people and companies as reasonably possible."

Te Ara Mātauranga – Waihi Beach Library and Community Hub, is due to open at the beginning of July, replacing the existing library and service centre which was on the same site. "This approach turns construction into a community resource. When a building project gives back to the community in this way, everyone benefits," Western Bay of Plenty District Council's general manager strategy and community Rachael Davie said.

"It's a great example of sustainability in action – reducing waste while supporting the kind of connected, resourceful communities we all want to live in."

Items recycled and reused included: 33sqm rough-sawn timber; 57sqm piles' 40sqm plywood offcuts; 32sqm timber offcuts; 6sqm reinforcing bars; three cubic metres plastics (saveBOARD); and 20sqm polystyrene (Expol).

Fluoride set to be added

Waihi Beach and Athenree will soon have fluoride added to their water, as the Western Bay of Plenty District Council acts on a directive from the Director-General of Health.

Council said the directive, issued under the Health Act 1956, required it to begin fluoridating the water supplies at the Athenree and Wharawhara water treatment plants. The decision to require fluoridation was made by the Director-General of Health, not local councils, it said.

The affected areas include: Waihi Beach, Athenree, Tanners Point, Katikati, and the reticulated rural area through to Morton Rd, Aongatete.

"Fluoridation will begin at the Athenree Water Treatment Plant in June, once the newly installed equipment is tested and commissioned," council said. "The same process will take place at Wharawhara in July."

"Council is responsible for safely implementing the directive and ensuring fluoride is added within the Ministry of Health's recommended levels - between 0.7 and 1.0 parts per million. There is no expected disruption to the water supply during this process."

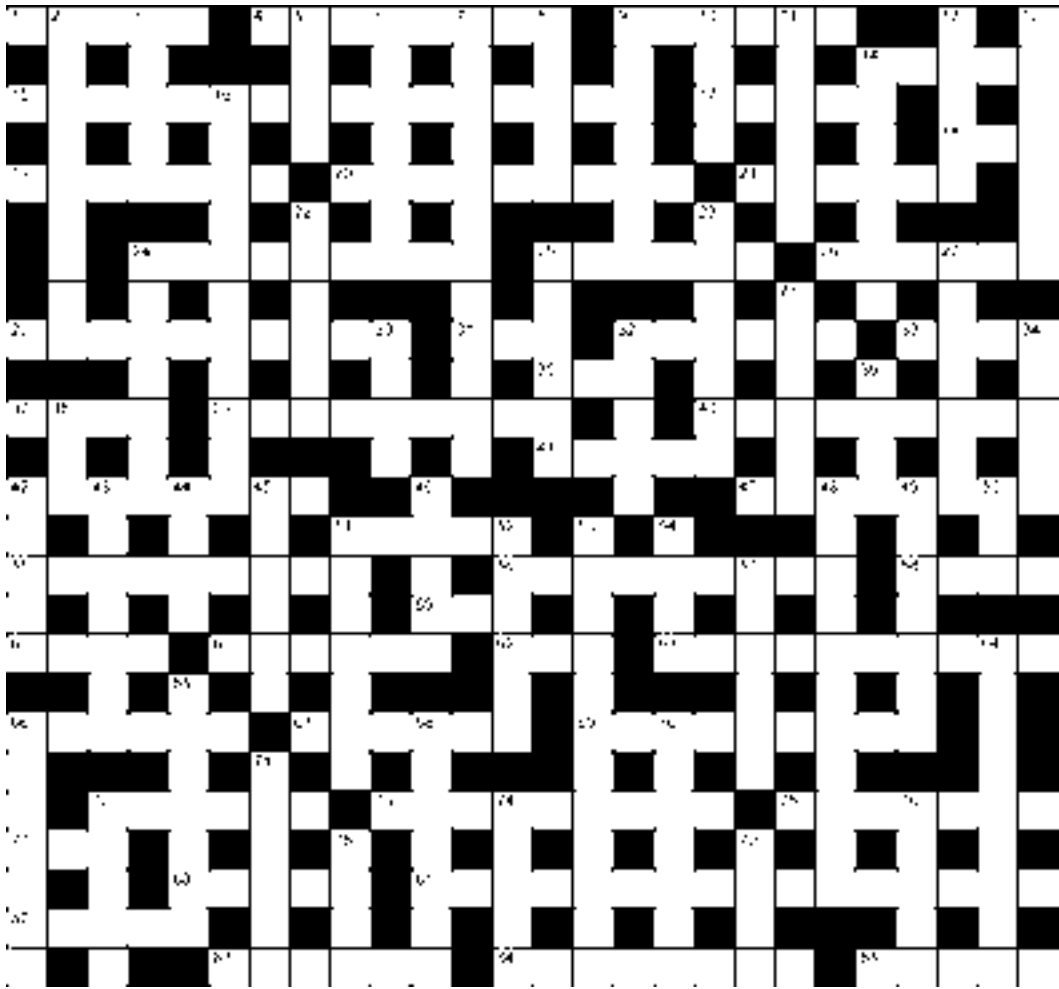

Fundraising to keep ‘hope in the hallways’ alive

The Living Well Trust in Thames needs to find a final \$10,000 to ensure the longevity of its wellbeing programmes, after facing a “significantly tough” year.

Michael Wilkes, a youth worker with the trust, runs mentoring and resilience programmes across Thames and Paeroa, and said it costs around \$200,000 a year to keep the initiative going.

It is currently \$10,000 short of being sustainable.

However, Michael told *The Profile* it was not a “do or die situation”.

“It will mean that we have to draw from our limited reserves which, if the situation continues, will lead us towards closing our doors in the long-term, but not the immediate future,” he said.

“This year has been significantly tougher. About six months ago, we were looking at a \$50-60k shortfall and much of my time has gone into fundraising - along with our amazing treasurer who enjoys remaining in the background.”

“So, I am really proud to be

seeing such a [small] gap to close.”

The Living Well Trust falls under the banner of Thames Baptist Community Ministries and does not receive government funding.

It has started a Givealittle online fundraising page, which has so far raised more than \$1600 of its goal.

Michael said the money the trust raised would help cover the shortfall in youth worker salaries, programme resources, and the behind-the-scenes costs that keep facilitators “turning up for young people when they need us most”.

“Our goal remains the same, to see young people thriving, to see a place where our young people feel heard, valued, and look to their future with hope.”

“We are currently piloting an additional programme with young leaders with the support

of local school principals, so we are excited to see how that goes,” he said.

“The students are loving it at present.”

The programmes Michael offers teach tools to help navigate anxiety, build resilience, grow

confidence, and “remind kids they are not alone”.
