What began as a school leadership project quickly moved beyond the classroom when 12-year-old Mieya Smith learned that the fight for a safe footpath in her community wouldn't be so straightforward.

The Ngātea Primary School student said a decades-old safety dilemma affecting families in Kaiaua and her hometown of Whakatīwai was the desperate need for a safe footpath connecting the coastal villages. So, she decided to take action.

"The school project was all about giving back to the community, so I went out and talked to the villages," Mieya told *The Pro-*

surveyed local residents, walking door-to-door and sharing an online form, and discovered that the majority of people ranked the footpath as their top priority for what change they wanted to see in the community.

"From there I knew I needed to get more awareness from beyond the towns, so with the help of my mum I emailed [Hauraki District Mayor] Toby Adams and council's Long Term Planning committee."

Mieya presented her findings to the mayor and councillors - a "big step" that at first yielded positive

However, she has since learned that central government funding cuts to safety works have halted the footpath's construction.

"When [Mayor] Toby emailed me back and said that the funding were cut for their safety works.

ing was cut for their safety works, I was really disappointed."

Mieya said she was also told by Coromandel MP Scott Simpson that the decision would be left for the district council to make.

So, enough was enough. On July 20, Mieya and a group of supporters stood at the edge

of Whakatīwai holding posters to raise awareness. She said she wanted to show the council how important a footpath was to the community.

"This isn't just about convenience, it's about making sure kids can walk to school or between the two villages without fear," she said

"Tourists get nice cycle trails and walkways, but what about the residents who live here year-round?

"Kids, parents, and even grand-parents told me how scary it is to walk or bike along the road, especially with no safe space for pedestrians or pushchairs.

"Some suggested a flashing 'slow down' sign near the school too, but the footpath was the biggest need.

"It's a matter of safety for everyone

Mieya said their voices were heard on the roadside, but this wasn't the end of the fight.

She's calling on Hauraki District Council to find a way to fund the

footpath project, even if it means reprioritising other spending.
"Safety shouldn't have to wait," she said, "and I think if a 12-year-old is putting in all this effort for this footpath so should that." this footpath, so should they

Mayor Toby Adams said there'd been "a lot of talk" for a number of years about a footpath connecting

Kaiaua with Whakatīwai.

The project was set to happen under the previous government, with a programme that funded 61 per cent of the district's safety improvements on or near its roads.

However, with the change in government, Mayor Adams said, the funding was "squashed".

"So now we're going through our programme to see what [roading

Mayor 'fit for duty' amid health concerns

hames-Coromandel District Mayor Len Salt is adamant he is still fit to lead, despite a spate of health issues which have left him confined to a wheelchair as he awaits surgery.

Mayor Salt posted a message on social media on July 27 thanking Thames and Waikato hospitals for care he received during a "cycle" of inpatient visits between July 1 and 20.

"The last few weeks have been particularly challenging for me with a couple of niggling health issues getting bad enough to land me in hospital more than once," he said.

"At the core of these issues seems to be a combination of hip and spinal issues, some of them historical. I have undergone a series of MRI and CT scans as well as the usual x-ray and blood tests. I am happy to say that overall I'm feeling much improved. There is still more work to do and discussions with the orthopaedic specialists which will happen over the next few weeks.'

The Mayor told The Profile he now needed to use a wheelchair at work, although he could still walk short dis-

"I'm on a list to be seen and to get some surgery, but it's not a fast list.



Len Salt says he won't let recent health issues affect his mayoral duties.

"It's going to limit me for a little while... If I'm out and about and looking at things on site, there's going to be some areas where I've just got to be careful about whether I can access the site or not," he said.

'But I've got teams of people around me who are really ready, willing and

Accessibility accommodations, such as a closer carpark, are already being made for Mayor Salt at the council building in Thames.

There's no getting away from the fact that I might be partially disabled, but that is purely an access and mobil-

Mayor Salt also confirmed his intention to run for re-election later this year, and he said the community could be "absolutely confident" in his ability to perform the role.

"I won't be the first partially disabled mayor or politician around, but it's a good exercise for a council in particular and for a community, in how to work in that disability space," he said.

The knowledge that I have built up and the experience over the term and the projects that I'm working on with my team that are partway through will continue and they'll be beneficial to the council in ways that I'm really excited

Mayor Salt's duties were delegated to Deputy Mayor Terry Walker during his

"I can't thank Terry enough for his assistance during this period. This has ensured smooth and seamless continuation of council activities and the duties of the office of the mayor.

The Mayor also thanked his wife, Svargo, and close friend and campaign manager Anna Dunwoodie. "It's been tough on them. But I can't say enough about how much they've



Not So Good

Florist latest victim as retail crime rises in Thames

A Thames florist already battling an increase in shoplifting says rising drug use is fuelling a wave of retail crime. Her store is the latest to be hit. KELLEY TANTAU reports

florist in Thames "beefed up" secu-Arity to respond to more brazen and more frequent thefts, but two offenders still at large weren't deterred when they wantonly cut, smashed, and stole inside the Pollen St store.

Nicole Phillips, who owns Flowers on Pollen, was the victim of a break-in between 1am-2am on July 23

Two people were caught on CCTV cameras changing their clothes in Service Lane 5 before making their way to the front of the store.

At 1.13am, one kept watch while the other jimmied open the doors and slashed the business' recently-installed electronic security blind with a knife.

In the 30 minutes the pair were inside, they removed two security cameras, and stole electronics, a sound system, jewellery, cameras, chocolate and paperwork.

They toppled shelves adorned with ceramic pots, plants, homeware, and locally-made gifts.

They damaged the shop's counter and register.

Costs were still being calculated but Nicole believed the crime had cost her upwards of \$7500.

"We have seen a gnificant increase significant in shoplifting lately - usually just small items, skin care and

confectionary mainly, but we had an incident a few months back where someone stole eight bunches of flowers and some product in one go, so incidents of theft are more brazen as well as frequent, and we beefed up security as a response," Nicole told The Profile.

She believed retail crime was getting worse in Thames, and said there were many factors at play, which was why the issue was getting "hospital passed" between organisations and "accountability holders".

"I think it's a community-wide problem; a mental health, addiction, housing, economic, crime - and consequences - problem.'

She also believed drug use in the town was fuelling a lot of the crime.

"We have seen so much antisocial and criminal behaviour on the main street. We have also had people urinate and defecate at our front door. There is just a real decline in standards in our town's main street," she said.

"I know the community board, council, business association and police are all working on initiatives to try and make our streets safer, and I hope we can get a good outcome for our com-

Thames Business Association chief executive Sue Lewis-O'Halloran said she was "heartsick" about the latest break-in at Flowers on Pollen.

She echoed Nicole's sentiments and said there were two key issues at play, "just as they are in small towns and big cities throughout New Zealand: mental illness and addictions, particularly meth".

"There is no question that having a stronger, 24/7 police presence would probably help as we know our police are under-resourced. So I think a multiagency, community-focused approach could be an effective way to deal with this," Sue said.

"There are no easy solutions, [but] Flowers on Pollen is such an asset to Thames, as is Nicole, and she has worked so hard to create a beautiful space.

Waikato East Prevention Manager, Acting Senior Sergeant Lara Beisly,

told The Profile that at around 4:50am on July 23, Police re-4:50am ceived a report of a burglary at a commercial premises on Pollen St.

The burglary was believed to have occurred earlier that morning, at around 1:40am. "Police have visited

the premises and sur-

rounding businesses and are working to try and identify the offenders.

"CCTV footage has been located that shows a vehicle of interest outside the premises at the time."

She said Police currently had a community constable, as well as frontline officers, assigned to carry out regular beat patrols in the Thames CBD area.

In the past week they have been visiting and speaking with local shopkeepers to discuss crime prevention measures. "This type of crime is incredibly frustrating and can have a significant impact on innocent people's lives," she

'We encourage all property owners to look at what they can do to deter criminals. Simple measures can have a big effect as many offenders are looking for easy targets. These measures include installing CCTV, securing windows, and reviewing locking mechanisms on buildings to ensure they can't be easily broken.

Miranda farmer missing after coal discovery



As part of a Valley Profile series, **MEGHAN HAWKES** explores our local history by seeking out stories of life and death in the Thames Valley

William Bird was of a roving disposition so when he dropped off the radar in April 1921 no anxiety was initially felt.

The 45-year-old Miranda farmer was on his way to Thames when he called at a relative's place at Ngātea. He then travelled to Thames by launch to do some business

He left the township at 5pm for Shelly Beach where he had left his horse at another relative's farm. It was dark when the launch reached the Shelly Beach wharf, and he was the only passenger to alight.

Since then nothing had been seen or heard of him.

After family, in communication by telephone, realised that he had not collected his horse from Shelly Beach, the police were called.

It was feared that William may have lost his way in the dark. His relative's place

was about a mile away from the wharf and it was thought he may have stumbled into the river as the tide was fairly high.

All launch owners and others travelling by boat, both on the Piako River and in the head of the gulf, were urged to keep a sharp lookout.

William, formerly a Thames miner, had been the owner of the Evening Star claim at Waiotahi Creek. After the claim was floated into a company he bought the farm at Miranda.

Lately he had been interested in coal at Miranda which had originally been discovered around 1870 on Mr Foote's farm.

Mr Foote had been prospect-

ing and sinking holes for some time before discovering an immense body of coal.

Tests found it to be superior to Bay of Islands coal as it burned faster and was suitable for the Cornish boilers used in gold mining.

The coal seam was near the surface and little needed to be done to open a mine. Ten miles of road were required or a good tramway to take coals to the beach opposite Grahamstown.

But it would be another 16 years before anything significant was done.

In 1886 the Miranda coal mine opened but was only worked for seven years. The coal was found to be inferior

and it was difficult getting it to the railway line.

About 24,000 pounds were lost in working the mine and the company was liquidated in 1893.

In 1900 Mr Tattley took over the Miranda coal mine formerly known as Footes, and it was worked by the Miranda Coal & Iron Co but that too met with little success.

By 1921 interest in Miranda coal had revived. It was suggested that if cheap transit could be provided a coal field would be a sound business proposition.

The discovery of coal so near the sea would be a boon to the district. It would enable farmers to develop and use the great deposits of shell along the Miranda coast.

The possibilities promised a great deal for the whole dis-

William's business that fateful day in Thames had included bringing over coal specimens from an outcrop he had discov-

Despite extensive searches William was not found until about six weeks later, when at Waharau, near Ōrere Point, his body was recovered by Mr Ashby.

An inquest found that William had accidentally drowned.

His funeral, which was largely attended, took place at Shortland cemetery.

The birthday girl spent the beginning of her party perched on a tall stool in the backyard, friends and family watching in silence as her long, wavy tresses were carefully portioned into sections in preparation for hairdresser friend Caitlin Taipari's silver scissors.

Arya was donating her hair, to be made into a wig for cancer patients.

The idea was entirely her

"I just want to do this for a good cause because heaps of our friends and family have died from cancer, and have cancer, and I've wanted to do this for ages," Arya told The Profile.

"I thought it'd be a good thing to do on my 10th birthday.

The party doubled as a fundraising event, with Arva collecting sponsorships to cut her

She raised just over \$1000, which will be donated to the Cancer Society.

Around 30 family members, close friends, and Arya's teachers and school principal were at the party to witness Arya's

Her mum, Rachael Wenzlick, said there were at least 40 more people who were unable to make the event but who donated money to Arya's fundraising "All these people here have known Arya for ages... they all think so highly of her," Rachael

"It is a big deal, cutting off all her hair, because she's been growing it for ages and she loves her hair so much.

"Cancer has affected a lot of our family and friends... we've had a few friends up at Starship and her best friend at the moment has a mass on her brain, and we don't know if that's can-

we've just been talking about the last few months.

In preparation for her donation, Arya treated her locks with a hair mask and slept on a satin pillowcase. Her hair was measured - donated hair needs to be at least 35 centimetres long - and a new, shorter haircut decided on.

"[She was] excited and nervous," Rachael said of the days beforehand.

"Especially when we measured it again, and it wasn't as long as we thought.

'I thought she would go, 'nah, I don't want to do it'. But she was like, 'oh, well, it'll grow back. Someone's going to enjoy my hair'.'

On the day, family members were invited to help Arya with her donation. Sections of her hair were cut by her mother, grandfather, and brother, with Caitlin's guidance.

There was a round of applause as Arya's final ponytail was tucked away safely in a plastic bag, ready for mailing to the donation centre. Her loose ends were quickly tidied up, leaving Arya with a stylish pixie cut and a sense of achievement.

"It's a very selfless thing to do," Caitlin said.



Zachariah leads US Air Cadets in Jaj

Zachariah Siemers was around 10 years old when he realised he wanted to join the US Air Force

It was something that sparked his interest after he watched some old World War II documentaries with his dad, the now 16-year-old told *The Profile*.

"My dad once told me about my great grandfather being a pilot in World War II and it just inspired me.'

Zachariah said his great grandfather was in the United States Army Airforce or USAAF.

Zachariah, who is a current member of 37th squadron Thames ATC, said he had a lot of family members who served in the army or navy, and "wanted to be the one" to follow his great grandfather into the Air Force.

It's what makes his recent news a special milestone in his journey.

Zachariah returned to New Zealand after a two-week en-campment in Japan last month with the US Air Cadets at the Misawa Airforce Base, a joint United States of America/Japan base on the shores of Lake Ogawara, where he was selected to take part as a cadre or cadet leader. He attended the same encampment in 2024 as a cadet, and was awarded Honour Cadet of his flight.

But his transition into cadre this year was "definitely a big step", he said.
"As a cadet, you are the one

learning and achieving things amongst your peers. Moving into cadre, you are being put into leadership so I had to now put my skills from last year into a leadership position."

The leader, who is also a year 11 student from Hauraki Plains College, said all cadres had to be "at the top of their game" as they were expected to set an example.

'We are the ones making sure the cadets have someone to look up to and go to at the end of the encampment," he said.

His title was Cadet Chief Master Sergeant, but people referred to him as Chief Siemers. He was able to take on new experiences, such as when he said he visited the Japanese side of the air force base and met members of the Japan Air Self-Defense Force or JASDAF such as pilots, trainers and crew



members who worked on the T2 Training Fighters, he said. "They allowed us to put on the

gear that is required to fly and

sit in the cockpit."

But the best part of the encampment was being reunited

with old friends he met previously, who also went back as

One significant thing Zachariah was able to do was trade unit patches.

"My unit commander from

37th squadron Thames gave me three of our unit patches."

He said it was a very rare thing as his squadron didn't give patches out easily.

His first trade was with his cadet deputy commander from California for a challenge coin from the Los Angeles Space Force at the Air Force Base in California.

The second trade was for a 35 MXG Staff patch with his encampment unit commander, who worked as an engineer for

the F16 engines.

His final patch was traded with a senior member from the Okinawa cadet squadron who gave Zachariah a patch from his squadron.

His love of patches was evident, as he purchased more and was also given some as gifts.

It's no wonder he soon adopted the call sign "patches".

Zachariah's advice for people who would like the opportunity to do something similar was to research and look up the New Zealand Cadet Forces.
"It may not be the US Cadet

Forces but they are just as awe-

"The closest unit is 37 Squad-ron ATC in Thames at the airfield. There is a recruitment night coming up in August at the Thames airfield... but you can still drop in any time," he

said.







Students lead school farm wetland restoration

An undeveloped paddock at Hauraki Plains College's Hayward Farm is set to become a thriving wetland, thanks to a new project that blends environmental restoration with hands-on learning.

The initiative is part of a long-term development plan for the college's school farm, which was purchased by the Haurakian Charitable Trust to support hands-on learning in Primary Industries - a programme that now attracts around 250 students each year.

"The school farm's teaching and management team had proposed a long-term development plan, which included a wetland area," Yotam Kay, the college's teacher of horticulture, social and environmental studies, told *The Profile*.

"We chose this area as it has low grazing value while being a great wetland site, restoring a natural habitat, providing shelter and food for wildlife, and acting as a privacy shelter belt between the farm and the new neighbourhood being developed."

Yotam said the planting area would provide an array of learning opportunities during its development and as it ma-

tured.

"Students are the ones propagating and growing the plants, as well as [the ones] who will be planting them and maintaining the area, which we hope will include pest control." The area chosen to be developed as a wetland was in a low-lying paddock with poor drainage, Yotam said.

It will be planted in two phases, with each area about 2000 square metres in size.

The planting in the first site started this month.

The college is also in its fourth year of being involved in Trees for Survival, an environmental education programme which has seen the school plant around ooo natives

Yotam, who also runs an environmental learning lab each week with Year 13 environmental council lead Ruby McKay, said students were "absolutely" becoming more 'hands-on' when it came to eco-minded actions.

"Most students find planting native trees an empowering and fun activity, and when asked if they would like to do this again, we mostly hear a resounding yes," he said.

"Students love contributing

"Students love contributing to the improvement of our environment's health. They are aware of the pressure we are placing on the environment and want to contribute to making it healthier.

"Research shows that opportunities to take action, like planting trees, directly contribute to their well-being and sense of efficacy.

"It is really exciting to collaborate with students and teachers on real-world projects in and around the school, and we are fortunate to have so many committed and passionate students who embrace these opportunities and see their leadership skills grow."

Gardens show signs of what's to come

e are at the crest of the hill and it is all downhill to spring.

It has been lovely watching the birds in the garden all vying for whatever food, nectar and bugs that they can find.

There is a distinct pecking order in the bird world so put a few nails in the top of the fence or on a post and put some citrus halves on to the nails.

You will be pleasantly surprised by the visitors to your garden.

This month is also a good time for a winter tidy up, clip hedges, edges and a final prune.

Prepare the vegetable garden for spring planting by digging in compost, blood and bone and sheep pellets. This helps to condition the soil and attract earthworms.

If the seed potatoes are in your garden centre, now is the time to get your potato beds ready by digging in some good compost.

Continue harvesting existing crops and start planting out more cut and come varieties of lettuce.

Plant tomato seeds in trays and place on a warm windowsill in a garden shed or under cover so the seedlings are ready to plant out once the last frosts have

Divide old rhubarb clumps which have wintered over and plant out pieces containing new green shoots.

If you are a bulb fan, your garden should be showing signs of what's to come once spring arrives.

I have been treated to beautiful Hip-

peastrums and Lachenalia through June and July. And now we can look forward to Magnolia and Camelia shows.

Plant marigolds, hellebores, azaleas and daphne while conditions are right. If it is warm enough, gladioli corms can be planted out. Keep beds well weeded and mulch.

Plant new season roses, they like sun, good air flow and when planting, a seaweed tonic. This promotes good root growth.

As existing plants awaken from their winter hibernation it's time to feed them to prepare for the flurry of new growth. Once fed they can have a new layer of mulch. Spray with a Copper Oxychloride to prevent infestation.

Attend to your fruit trees with a copper spray now. This will help prevent fungal and bacterial diseases on your pip fruit trees, stone fruit and berry plants later

in the season.

Repeat weekly until the little green leaf tips start to appear, especially if you had a problem last season. Always remember to clean up leaf drop around plants to avoid spreading diseases. Sprinkle fertiliser around the drip line of the trees and mulch.

Prune your feijoas to encourage a healthy fruit crop for next season. Spreading a Lawn Fertiliser over the lawn in late winter will provide a rich source of nutrients which will nurture and improve the soil structure and the integrity of the lawn. Lawn growth is a good indication of warming soil temperature.

Aerate compost heaps and add your prunings to keep the worms happy and well feed.



Yusuke Koizumi threaded a beautiful through ball to Troy Costello, who burst behind the defence but poked his shot wide. Koizumi then sent a precise pass to Caleb Tehoaki, who returned the ball to Koizumi, whose curling shot was brilliantly saved by Unicol keeper Samuel Hodgson.

The breakthrough came just after the hour mark when Tehoaki found Sogo on the right. The winger crossed to Matt Baines, who controlled and slipped the ball under the keeper for a 1-0 lead, a rare but vital goal from the meandering left-back. Unicol struck back almost immediately, as Naidoon's searching pass found Aidan Timbers, who sidefooted home for 1-1 - capitalising on a lapse of concentration from Thames.

A promising move saw Xavier Brown whip a cross for Koizumi, who teed up Baines, but the finish was wild. Moments later, Keegan Applerly launched a long ball forward that Costello expertly controlled before teeing Brown, whose shot sailed over the bar. Stellar club debut for Fox Den fighters

The challenge had been issued to fighters across the country; and on July 5 it was Paeroa's Fox Den Combat Gym which came out on top, with three of its members claiming belts and World Kick-boxing Association New Zealand

'Hauraki Combat' was Fox Den's first official fight event since opening its doors late last year. Held at the Paeroa War Memorial Hall, the event featured 25 fights

involving 13 Fox Den members.

Mikayla (Kayla) Fatamaka, 16, took out the NZ Junior Women's title against Hunni Fariu from SALT Gym in Auckland; while 31-year-old Tim Lingley beat out Auckland New Era Gym's Jeff Tautogi for the Regional North Island title land title.

The headliner fight against Forged Fitness Rotorua's Issac Morgan-Rangikataua was won by Kayla's brother Leighton Fatama-ka, 17, who now holds the Cruiserweight NZ Junior title.

Kayla and Leighton's father, coach and former fighter Zack Fatamaka said the trio, and all of the chuk's fighter and all of the club's fighters, worked hard for their achievements.

"I'm proud of these guys. Some really good wins, some hard losses, but lessons learned for us," Zack said. "We're back to the drawing board at the moment - we're just changing the way we're training to accommodate what we picked up



in terms of fighters' performance, the way they're moving.

Fox Den Combat Gym, which initially ran under the name Paeroa Boxing and Fitness, closed down during Covid-19. It wasn't until late last year that Leighton con-vinced his father Zack to revive the

"I do have a history with [kick-boxing]. But at the time, it was either become a full-time professional fighter or create my roofing and building business," Zack and they in the middle said. "And then in the middle of last year, Leighton started... saying, 'Dad, can you train me,

please?'They've reignited my love for the sport.

In just nine months, Leighton has claimed four belts. Along with his most recent title, he also holds two North Central Island titles, and is the NZ Iron Fist 90kg cham-"It was actually just meant to be a little bit of a side thing and then sort of took over our life," Leighton said. "We've trained pretty hard. I thought I was fit as when I first started... Then I had

my first fight and nah.
"I love it though. I love to grind, love being busy. Keeps me sane." Leighton's success soon drew

Kayla into the ring as well, and in just seven months' training, she's

also taken to the sport completely.
"I love it. It takes a lot of pressure off when I come back from work - I just bang the pads," she

July 5 was Kayla's first five-rounder fight, and although she came away "knackered", she was thrilled with the result.

Tim, meanwhile, has been in the sport for a couple of years, after switching codes from boxing and training for a time in Hamilton. He loves the tight-knit Fox Den community, he said, which thrives

ka family. "It's a huge amount of time, and you don't make money off it. Zack and [wife] Tracey, they've got their own family, their own business. Life is very full," he said. "It doesn't happen without them."

There was a lot of support from the Jacobsen and Laurent families too, Zack said, who along with the club's sponsors have put an enormous amount of time and energy into keeping things running.

Now, the fighters are working

towards their next event on October 4, 'Hard Knocks'. "It's good to see the rewards come through with the wins and stuff. But October 4th is a big one. It's international opponents coming in."

His fighters were up for the challenge, he said.

"We have a programme called Couch to Coached. You train like

a fighter, you eat like a fighter, and you go to fight after your 20 weeks' training. We do a lot of road work. We do a lot of pad work, a lot of

gym work, a lot of IQ stuff.
"[Leighton's] got a really strong
mindset, which is good because a lot of these guys feed on that. They see him working and putting in

But the titles and belts are just a bonus for Leighton.

They're not what I'm chasing, really. The main goal [is] to get my last name out there and rep my family," he said.
