# Pay equity to be addressed in meeting, hearing

Apublic meeting in Thames on August 24 will help people understand amendments made to the Equal Pay Act in May and how it has affected pay equity and other workers' rights, organis-

The meeting will also act as a precursor to a public oral submissions session by the People's Select Committee on Pay Equity in September.

August's public meeting will feature Labour's spokesperson on workplace relations and safety Jan Tinetti as guest speaker, along with Jocelyn Pratt, an organiser with the Public Service Association (PSA) union.

Jocelyn said the meeting is in response to the Equal Pay Amendment Act, which was passed under urgency by central government on May 6.

"Women were outraged, and also what we saw at that time was a lot of confusion and mixed messaging about what the changes are and what the impact would be," she said.

Beryl Riley, chairperson of the Coro-

mandel branch of the Labour Party, said the meeting will get into the details of what the changes actually are and how they will affect workers, particularly women.

The whole question of what is pay equity? Because some people get a bit confused about the process, what [it means]. So time will be spent with our

speakers, explaining that," Beryl said.

The amended Act saw 33 pay equity claims scrapped, in what the PSA called a constitutional overreach" and an "attack on women". The legal claims, from mostly female-dominated professions, were put forward by unions or employees who believed their remuneration had been suppressed due to genderbased discrimination.

As the act was passed under urgency, it also bypassed the standard select committee process.

"Normally when we have this kind of significant change to legislation, there will be a consultation process, there will be submissions, there will be a select committee that should consider all submissions," Jocelyn said.

"Never before have we seen this kind of change that has an impact on so many workers in New Zealand and women workers and low-paid workers - an under secrecy, kind of in the darkness of a significant change that has long-term and short-term impact on the ability for women to earn reasonable wages."
September's public submissions ses-

sion will be run by the People's Select Committee, a group of 10 former women MPs who are collecting submissions from the public on the changes to the Act. The group, convened by former National MP Dame Marilyn Waring, has already collected public submissions and will be holding oral hearings across the

The People's Select Committee is not sanctioned by the government, but will be compiling a report to present to Par-liament. "They're doing the job of what the government should have done, Jocelyn said.



# I use questioned in Burton's mayoral

As this year's local elections approach, reporter KELLEY **TANTAU** continues to put the spotlight on the mayoral contenders, and asks why they think they're fit to wear the chains.

Hauraki man running for Mayor of the Adistrict is using social media to fuel his campaign, but amidst allegations of Artificampaign, but amidst allegations of Artificampaign and allegations of Artificampaign and Artifica cial Intelligence and his refusal to speak to media, questions are being raised over the transparency of his bid.

Levi Burton, who goes by Levi Phoenix on his social media accounts, has already listed himself as Mayor of the Hauraki district on his profile on LinkedIn, which is an online

professional networking platform.

He is standing for the top job as well as councillor in the Waihī ward, and in a press release announcing his candidacy, promised a "transparent and inclusive" future.

However online Burton has been accused of "hiding behind a computer" and using Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools to write his

On August 5, *The Profile* contacted Burton via email with a series of questions to gather information for an article ahead of the October local body elections.

Two days later, he replied.

That same night, Burton's responses to The Profile's questions were published in full by another media outlet; therefore, a phone interview was requested.

But Burton said he'd prefer email, and acknowledged he shared his responses composed for The Profile - with another reporter. "I wanted to be upfront with you about something that's been on my mind about something that's been on my mind. I recently replied to your set of questions, and while I also shared my responses with another reporter, I hadn't anticipated they'd

publish them ahead of you. That wasn't my intention at all - it was simply a misstep on my part in managing communications during a busy campaign, and I absolutely recognise that it wasn't ideal," the email said. "It's been a good learning moment for me, and I genuinely appreciate your understanding.

After running this response through several AI checkers, *The Profile* discovered most of his response was likely to have been written by AI.

For that reason, The Profile again pushed for a phone interview, but Burton responded: "It's all good. I think I've won already".

This belief is reflected in his Linkedin profile, which is complete with council logo, entitled: 'Levi Phoenix, Mayor at Hauraki District Council', and where he states he works 'full time" as Mayor.

The Profile made a final attempt to speak with Burton over the phone, asking why the man running for Mayor was not happy for a chat to local media. He was also asked whether or not he had used AI to formulate all or part of his social media posts and responses, or his responses to The Valley Profile, and if he would be attending any inperson meet-the-candidate events.

Burton did not respond

Burton did not respond.

This is Burton's first official quest for mayoral chains.

In 2023, he posted on a West Coast community Facebook page announcing his candidacy for Mayor of the Westland District Council; however, the local body elections had already taken place in October the year

In an email, he said he was a former Waihī College pupil and communication was one

of his "greatest strengths".


"My background spans a wide range of industries, from construction to finance, from policy writing to physical labour. I've worked with my hands, my mind, and my heart, and I've learned how to connect with people from all walks of life, whether it's a lawyer, a farmer, a rangatahi, or someone on the autism spectrum.

"Communication is one of my greatest strengths," he wrote, "and I believe it's ex-actly what's missing from local government

#### What's new for 2025/2026?

#### Property rates instalment due dates

Following community feedback about receiving three rates invoices in October last year, (HDC rates, HDC water rates and WRC rates), we've changed the property rates instalment due date months to September 2025 and March 2026.



#### Wastewater rates move to water invoices

From 1 July 2025 the wastewater rate you pay will move from your Property Rates invoice to your Water Rates invoice. If your property uses a septic tank, you won't see any change.

#### Water rates invoicing schedule

We've made some changes to our water meter reading and invoicing schedule. Check the billing months to see if your location has changed at www.hauraki-dc.govt.nz/property-rates/water-rates-instalment-dates

#### View your rates for 2025/26

Use our online address search tool to check your property rates and water rates for this financial year at www.hauraki-dc.govt.nz/property-rates/rates-search

#### Paying your rates

#### Have a Direct Debit with us?

If you're already set up with direct debits for rates and/or water, there is no immediate change to them. Your payments will continue as normal. We'll notify you once our annual Rates direct debit recalculation process is complete.

#### Have an Automatic Payment set up?

You'll need to update these yourself through your bank. Contact us if you need help in working out what you will need to pay to cover your rates and/or water to 30 June 2026.

#### **Water Invoices**

Your water bill now consists of three charges.



#### Water Connection

A fixed charge of \$243.36 per water connection per annum.

This pays towards the cost of infrastructure and maintenance to bring water to your water meter. It also includes water meter readings and water meter renewals.



#### Water Consumption

Covers the cost of treating the actual water used, with stepped levels of pricing based on consumption:

- Up to 200 cubic metres = \$4.27
- 200-400 cubic metres = \$3.07
- Over 400 cubic metres = \$2.61



#### Wastewater Connection

A fixed charge of \$847.56 per pan/toilet per annum. A residential property is considered 1 pan.

This covers the cost of infrastructure and treatment of the wastewater coming from your toilets, so it can be safely discharged back into the environment.

## Waikato Waters Ltd

#### Te Mana o Te Wai, Te Mana o Te Tangata – Healthy Water, Healthy People

It's official! Hauraki District Council, along with six other Waikato councils formally signed the Shareholders' Agreement for Waikato Waters Limited (WWL) on Monday 25 July. This marks the company's official incorporation as a joint council-controlled organisation (CCO), making Waikato Waters Ltd the largest joint water CCO in New Zealand.

Hauraki District will transition into Waikato Waters Ltd on 1 July 2027. Until then, it's business as usual. The only change you'll see for now is the Wastewater Rate included on your water bill rather than your land rates bill. Stormwater management remains with HDC.

#### **Who owns Waikato Waters?**

Hauraki, Matamata Piako, Ōtorohanga, South Waikato, Waipā, Waitomo and Taupō, district councils jointly own the company on behalf of their communities.



#### Why is a waters CCO needed?

Pooling resources gives our councils the scale and investment power needed to meet tougher water standards, plan for growth, and protect our waterways for future generations.



#### Will my water bills change?

In the short term, pricing will remain consistent with each council's current plan. Longer term pricing will be set by Waikato Waters.



#### What about iwi involvement?

The agreement commits to building strong, strategic partnerships with iwi, reflecting Treaty settlement obligations. In addition, each council maintains its own unique relationship with Iwi and hapu in their rohe.



### What is the status of Taupō District Council?

Taupō District Council is a Stage 1 shareholder having chosen for now to go with a stand alone water services delivery model. They will review this position within the next two years. However they remain a shareholder of Waikato Waters Ltd and will be using shared services such as procurement.

On 1 July 2025, the rates rebate income threshold per household increased. This means you could be eligible for a rates rebate of up to \$805.

Are you a SuperGold Card holder\*? If so, then your income threshold is higher.

### **CLIMATE CHANGE**

Our Council adopted two key documents in August.

The Climate Change Strategy sets out what Council will do to adapt and protect our assets and services, and our approach to working with communities.



The Greenhouse Gases Emissions Reductions Plan identifies our current emission volumes and how much we need to reduce them to achieve Council's long-term emission reduction goals.



## Boat ramp toilets

Installation of new public toilets for Kopū and Waikawau boat ramps started in mid-August and should be completed by late September. Kōpū has been funded by the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) through the Tourism Infrastructure Fund. Waikawau has been funded partially by MBIE and also through the Waikawau Boat

Both toilets are pre-fabricated allowing for a quick installation of 2-3 weeks.



### **Boundary Creek Bridge**

NZTA has awarded contracts for the replacement of Boundary Creek Bridge on SH25 Thames Coast, with work due to start in early October. A new, safer two-lane bridge and slow traffic passing bay at the southern bridge approach will be in place well ahead of summer holiday traffic.

The road will be closed for up to seven days, beginning in the week immediately after Labour Weekend, to allow for the demolition of the old bridge deck and installation of the new one. The bridge deck is being pre-fabricated and work hours extended to keep the closure to a minimum. Emergency services have been involved in the project and will have plans in place for the closure period.

The road is expected to be open to two-lane traffic from early December. For more information, visit nzta.govt.nz and search 'Boundary Creek'.

### Speed limits

Consultation will begin on 22 August on NZTA Waka Kotahi's proposed speed limit changes in parts of the Coromandel Peninsula, including a proposal to reduce the speed limit from 70km/h to 50km/h from Burke

# Burton's bacon worth waking up

n a country where bacon Lis both a Sunday morning staple and the crown jewel of a Kiwi burger, a local Thames Valley butchery is proving that tradition still matters - and has the awards to show for it.

Burton's Butchery attended the NZ Bacon and Ham Awards last month and brought home two accolades, a silver for its loin bacon, and bronze for its

It's proof the Matatoki-based butchery makes bacon worth getting out of bed for.

"Bacon is still one of the top sellers, especially when people hear we make our own," Elliot Burton told The Profile.

"It's the classic Sunday morning breakfast or the extra piece to make your Friday night burger something spe-

The butchery makes its own bacon using traditional techniques and a wood-fired smokehouse

Because there's no fillers added, this created a "goodtasting product that doesn't shrink or leave the pan full of moisture," Elliot said.

'And using 100 per cent New Zealand pork allows us to know the meat is already the best quality, and supports our New Zealand farmers. We also

Elliot said he and the team were "proud as punch" for the achievement and thanked his staff and loval customers, especially over the last few months as they moved their business from Paeroa to Matatoki, where they are the only retail

"Our move has been a big task... but it has started to settle and feel like home now," he

"It has allowed us to increase our processing capability and make improvements in our business, and with renovating the building, it has made compliance for our dual processing license easier to manage.

Elliot said they were now focusing on business as usual, but had sent four of the butchery's products off to the Great NZ Sausage Competition for judging. The competition is one of the premier events for New Zealand smallgoods producers and searches for the best sausage in the country.

The team was also getting a head-start on Christmas hams, which Elliot said would be limited this year, "so best to order them early".

# Paddle steamer sinks near old Puke wharf



As part of a Valley Profile series, MEGHAN HAWKES searches through old newspapers to bring you the stories Thames Valley locals once read about themselves.

#### 1932

Paeroa, the Northern Asteamship Company's paddle steamer, Kōpū, mysteriously sank near the old Puke wharf.

She came to rest with her bow on a sandbar and her stern in deep water. When the company's salvage gang attempted to raise the stern by attaching a punt at low tide and letting the tide do the lifting, they discovered the punt was not quite sound, and it leaked and eventually capsized. The punt was then brought to the river bank alongside the old wharf and a pump was rigged with which to pump it out. It was thought that boys had opened the seacocks on the  $K\bar{o}p\bar{u}$ .

She ran outside, calling for her husband, who was in the milking shed. He and neighbours were unable to quell the blaze and nearly everything was destroyed. It was thought that there may have been a detonator in the coal.

The explosion was heard by a linesman working in the Turua power sub-station, across the . Waihōu River.

Thinking it had something to do with the power he promptly shut off the current.

Over in Waihī, Mr Mounsey's Snappy Syncopators were led by a Waihī boy, his orchestra brightening many Thames Valley entertainments. # Planting, composting for sustainable future

Over recent months, Kopuarahi School students have been getting their hands dirty - in the best way possible.

The small rural school has been

involved in three environmental and sustainability-focused projects over the winter months, each connected to its curriculum and strategic direction. In July, tamariki joined Trees

for Survival, Moanataiari School, Hauraki Plains College, and Thames Rotary for a major riparian planting day in Hikutaia, adding 1750 native plants to the land-

The plants had all been nurtured from seedlings in shadehouses at both Kopuarahi and Moanataiari Schools, making the planting day a satisfying 'full circle' moment for tamariki. "This is one of the most satisfying things I have done outside. Planting for the future is amazing," 10-year-old DJ said.
"One day I can come back and

see how tall the trees are," Oakley, six, added.

Back at Kopuarahi School, the school's maara kai (food garden) and fruit forest received a major boost with a tunnel house, garden shed, raised beds, new fruit trees, and refurbished plots - supported by Oke (Fisher Family Trust), Fonterra, Ngatea Lions, and the community.

Along with practical gardening skills, the students worked on their financial literacy as they budgeted and planned for the up-

And a new community composting station was installed this month at the school, in partnership with Air New Zealand and the CarbonCycle Company.

"I love measuring the temperature of our compost every day. It's getting hotter quickly. Today there

was steam coming out when we moved the sacks," seven-year-old ' seven-vear-old Maverick said.

"The worms love the leaves and horse poo and chicken poo. They're making good compost for

us." Mikaylah, eight, said.
With a large site and strong community partnerships, Kopuar-

ahi School was set to keep growing its role as an outdoor classroom and hub for kaitiakitanga, school principal Chris Patel said.

Trees for Survival, Oke and CarbonCycle Company all bring an abundance of energy to what they are doing - they have worked in partnership with our kura to help build our own understanding of our role as kaitiaki, guardians

of our role as kaitiaki, guardians of the future in an engaging and meaningful way," Chris said.
"We are very grateful for the support we have been given. We are at the beginning of an amazing journey. Small steps really can lead to great things."

# Presenters drive home positive speedway shift

What began as an online simulation racing group has grown into one of New Zealand motorsport's most passionate media voices, and now, it's earned national recognition.

Kokpit Media, which shines a

spotlight on speedway and other forms of motorsport across the country, claimed two accolades at the recent Speedway NZ Awards: Best Online Presence and Best Media Show. Presenter Rino Wilkinson, from Paeroa, said the group had humble beginnings as a simula-

tion racing community, where drivers predominantly raced speedway cars on New Zealand

Founder Craig Booker then came up with the idea to start a media show, and the pair quickly became co-presenters, creating an online interview platform where tracks, event organisers, and drivers could promote

Since then, they have conducted numerous interviews and travelled extensively across the country. Beyond media coverage, they have also organised fundraising events, raising close to \$70,000 combined for the NZ Cancer Society, Heart Kids NZ,

and Cystic Fibrosis.
Throughout it all, Rino said, Kokpit Media's main focus has been to "be positive" - and this

ethos even led them to launching

an anti-bullying campaign.

"Like many other sports, the negative side that we read on many social media platforms saw us both decide that we'd had

enough.
"We thought: 'let's put our sport in a great spotlight and celebrate everyone - from the track committee, promotors, volun-teers, drivers, crews, families, emergency services, photographers and live-streaming com-

Kokpit Media was nominated for two categories at the re-cent Speedway NZ Awards, and ended up being finalists for Best Online Presence and Best Media

Rino said he and Craig were up against some tough competition, including CRC Motorsport, and were "blown away" when they were announced the winners.

"Craig - and he'll hate me for saying this - got emotional in his speech as he's never ever experi-

enced anything like this before," Rino said. "The applause and handshakes, the congratulations, were overwhelming. It was a brilliant night. We were both over the moon. Rino said the awards were a proud moment that recognised

the pair's hard work behind the

backs and out of our own pockets which shows - to me - the passion we both have for our sport. For Rino himself, speedway

has been a big aspect of his life since the late-80s, and he re-called days "watching from be-hind the fence at the original Reversh" Bavbark'

He, alongside his wife or his family, have travelled to attend the NZ Superstock Teams Championship in Palmerston North for the past 37 years in a

"Next season we're off to Christchurch," he said. "Talk about being addicted to the rac-

ing and speedway hot dogs."

Overall, Rino - who is also a commentator at Huntly Speedway - told *The Profile* he enjoyed everything about the world of speedway - from the racing, to the people.

"It's something I count down

to during the off-season and can't wait until October comes around.

"What's next for Kokpit Media?" he said.
"It's to keep promoting our weekly interviews with everyone, and still keep enjoying ourselves." still keep enjoying ourselves.

# Travel Through Time for town's anniversary

September marks the 150th anniversary of Ulster Irish settlers in Katikati, and the town is celebrating with a weekend of entertainment and familyfriendly events for all ages

The settlement of Katikati was established by Irishman George Vesey Stewart, who led two groups of settlers to New Zea-land. The first came aboard the ship *Carisbrooke Castle*, with 34 families from Ulster, Northern Ireland, arriving at 'The Land-ing' on the Uretara Stream in Katikati on September 16, 1875.

A second group of settlers arrived in 1878 aboard the *Lady* Jocelyn. Both names live on in local street names.

Māori and the new settlers worked closely together, withstanding early economic prob-lems to develop Katikati into a thriving town based around farming and agriculture. The town has always had a

vibrant community with more than 80 volunteer groups pro-viding activities, entertainment and support for the locals.

The 150th anniversary celebration will take place on September 12-14, with the theme

Travel Through Time.
The weekend kicks off on September 12 with 'Rugby Remembers'; rugby players will reflect on various tours and how rugby has evolved over time.

Western Bay Museum will have a display of Gallaher mem-orabilia on loan from the Ponsonby Rugby Club collection.
This will be followed by an

evening of Irish Music and song

September 13 sees a full line-up with plenty of activities planned. # Pest plant removal marks first stage of track reinstatement

The removal of pest plants across the reserve surrounding Waimata Gemstone Bay marks the start of work to reinstate the track to the picturesque beach.

Waimata Gemstone Bay was one of several Coromandel locations impacted by extreme weather events in 2023 which damaged Department of Conservation

Department of Conservation (DOC)-managed tracks.

In July, DOC announced it would be reinstating tracks to Waimata Gemstone Bay, following news in May the Hahei Beach. Short Walk would be rerouted and

repaired.
DOC's Mautohe Cathedral Cove sustainability project manager Michael Sparrow said work to remove the weeds at Waimata Gemstone started recently.

'It's a small but important first step on this project. We've arranged for four kaimahi (workers) from Coromandel iwi Ngāti Hei to

remove these weed species from the reserve," he said. The Ngāti Hei team spent a week at the site clearing woolly nightshade, gorse, pampas grass, cherry, pine, moth plant and any other undesirable plant species identified.

This will be followed by planting native vegetation to enhance the site's biodiversity and mauri, with underplanting included to suppress weeds and reduce ongoing maintenance. Local businesses, the community and tourists have donated close to 300 trees, which

will be planted at the location as part of Destination Hauraki Coromandel's 'Good for your soul' initiative. "They'll focus on around two hectares of land in total, spread along both sides of the track," Michael said.

Ngāti Hei conservation representative Shelley Balsom welcomed the shared environmental improvement initiative and efforts

improvement initiative and efforts at Waimata Gemstone Bay.

"Ngāti Hei support this kaupapa," she said. "It is in alignment with Ngāti Hei values as restoration is a priority for us. We thank the tourism industry for this initiative."

The repair to the Waimata Gemstone Bay track will see the track rerouted and an extra 40 metres constructed. Reinstating the track will restore land access to a popular snorkelling destination within Te Whanganui-O-Hei Marine Reserve enjoyed by educational groups and the local community.

The Hahei Reroute and Gemstone Bay Track projects are part of the wider Mautone Cathedral Cove Sustainability Project, a long-term initiative focused on enhancing the visitor experience, managing visitor impacts and safeguarding the cultural and en-vironmental values of this iconic

Meanwhile, with visitor numbers returning to pre-Covid-19 levels, long-standing challenges like littering, graffiti overcrowd-ing, marine safety, and environmental pressures have resurfaced. In response, DOC, Ngāti Hei,

and community partners are working together to develop a Visitor Management Plan and sustainable operating model that addresses transport links, visitor flow, site maintenance, and in-frastructure resilience, while supporting local businesses to thrive.

Nature was vital to New Zealand's economy, and a significant proportion of tourism is based in, on or around our unique natural environment, DOC said

Tourism on public conservation land is worth \$3.4 billion each year. More than 50 per cent of international visitors and 80 per cent of New Zealanders visit protected natural areas every year.

But I wasn't chasing money for money's sake. I wanted to build something — something that helps people and creates a future I believe in. So I threw myself into writing a book, designing an online course, and building a platform that aligned with my purpose.

And man, at the start, I felt unstoppable. The motivation, the buzz, the sense of mission – it was like rocket fuel.

Then the grind kicked in – motivation waned – and progress began to die.

Here's something I've learned - and it's backed by brain sci-

Our emotional brain (the same one that reacts to realdifference between reality and imagination. So when we start dreaming, visualising success, picturing the impact - our emotional brain feels it as if it's already happening.

That's why the start feels so

You're living the dream emotionally, even if it hasn't materialised yet

But shifting from dreaming to doing? From vision to execution? That's where the buzz starts to wear off.

Suddenly, it's 4:30 mornings writing and recording before the kids wake up. It's every spare

evening, grinding. It's skip-ping other healthy habits just to make room for progress. And it's heavy. Consistent, yes. But the emotional fire? Gone

That's what happened to me. I got stuck in the doing. I stopped visiting the dream. Stopped imagining the freedom and impact I was aiming for.

So I returned to the vision. I let myself feel it again. I pictured the lives changed, the legacy built, the life of purpose and presence with my family. And it fuelled me.

Because here's the truth: if you're pursuing a dream and the excitement has worn off, revisit

If your why isn't stronger than the grind, you'll likely throw in the towel.

So here's my reminder for us - don't forget to dream while we build.

Revisit it. Feel it. Let it fuel you.



# Rugby Remembers - shared milestones last the test of time

Yelebrating a milestone is ✓always a special thing, but celebrating 150 years is a very special event, which is what the township of Katikati will celebrate next month.

What makes this also special is that the Katikati Rugby Club is able to share a similar milestone, with it achieving 145

years this year.
When the Irish settlers arrived in 1875, they were Kati-kati's second arrivals to leave a mark.

They were to bring with them new cultures, religions, customs and lifestyles, and these new settlers were very keen to establish those life beliefs in their new homeland.

For the Ulster settlers, their main focus was to establish their homes, schools and churches, and of course their sport teams.

So it was to be no surprise the game of rugby was soon to become part of the community for

the next 145 years.

Though it was surprising it was rugby, and not football that the early settlers would enjoy and support.

Even though times were hard, money was tight and the infrastructure we take for granted now, were still years away, the

community needed something they could enjoy, use to unwind and take their minds off the tough times - and also something that would bring them together every Saturday afternoon, and rugby was the winner.

Sports have always been a great tool for bringing people together, no matter who you are or where you have come from.

For Katikati, the local rugby

club in its various forms has been one of those tools that's been part of this community.

The club has shared in the community's highs and lows, the tough and good times, and it's brought the community together on occasions.

We remember the 1920s though until the 1950s, when Katikati was one of the leading clubs in the Thames Valley Un-

ning the Baywide Championship in 1986.

The club has endured economic changes, survived wars, a depression, and even a global pandemic.

It has given the community numerous heroes and players to cheer for and support every Saturday, and it has lasted the test

Another role the club has been able to create is the ability to bring cultures together.

It very quickly became obvious that not only the Irish men were passionate about rugby, but also the original settlers, the tangata whenua males who took to rugby like they were born to play it.

There have been generations of both Māori and Pākehā whānau that have contributed to the history of the club.

This has now also included a new culture that has arrived in our community, the arrival of the Polynesian community, who bring a new and exciting passion to the game.

The club congratulates the Katikati community, and looks forward to sharing and supporting the community of Katikati for the next 150 years. The 150 anniversary of the arrival of the Katikati Ulster settlers kicks off on Friday, September 12 with Rugby Remembers.
