Thames Market has been a community-focused space from its very beginnings. As its 30th anniversary approaches on September 27, past and present owners discuss what the iconic weekly event has meant to them and the town. ALICE PARMINT-ER reports.

The market was opened in Grahamstown in 1995 by Dianne and Peter McKinnon. At the time, the couple were looking for some-

where to sell their produce.

Inspired by overseas farmers' markets, and noticing a distinct lack of similar spaces in New Zealand, they spent months planning and campaigning to get the council on board.

"It was definitely a huge, huge job to get it off the ground - there wasn't the awareness at all in those years that this could be something beneficial for the town," Peter said.

The market opened with only a dozen stalls. "This end of the street was absolutely dead, there were just closed shops," Dianne said.

just closed shops," Dianne said.

Dianne and Peter treated the market as their "family". Their focus was on hand-made goods and small homestead produce - every stall owner was expected to have had personal input into their products. "It was all down to communication," Dianne said.

Although the couple had to contend with local businesses concerned about the market's potential to eat into their customer base, they soon found the market thriving. Dianne reached customers via word-of-mouth and media interviews, holding regular events to draw interest.

"We put a lot of effort into advertising and getting all the stories we could in the local papers," she said. When the time came to hand over the reins, naturally Dianne and Peter looked among their regular stallholders for a like-minded successor. They found Angelika and Peter Peoschl, an immigrant couple from Germany who had been running a bread stall.

"We became acquainted quite soon," Peter Poeschl said of the market's original owners. "I was CONTINUED ON P2

baking bread a lot for the family at home because New Zealand bread was not to our liking at that time... We said, we could do a bread stall.

The four sat down for coffee one day, and Dianne and Peter McKinnon asked if they would like to own the market. "[We thought] it might be a bit much to do," Peter Poeschl said. "But then we dived in there and thought that's a really good thing because we wanted it to keep going the way it was... it needs to be preserved because if it's gone, then it would be really bad for the town.'

Angelika and Peter took on the market in February, 2009. "It was really mainly [Angelika's] business," Peter Poeschl said. "She really was the heart and soul of it - I was just assistant man-

The Poeschls remained in charge until June, 2021, when they, too, began the search for a successor. And once again, they turned to the "fam-

ily".
"I arrived in New Zealand in 2014, but before I came to the country I already knew Thames Market," current market owner Jiani Ranay said.

Soon she had a stall of her own, and a community around her. "In a way, the stallholders have become my family," she said.

Angelika and Peter had been looking for someone who loved the market as they did, and who would continue to run it as Dianne and Peter McKinnon had originally envisioned. Jiani fit the bill perfectly. "They hired me first as a contractor, but behind the scenes, they were teaching me how to do it," Jiani said.

"And I just carried on from there. It's challenging, but it's fun."

The previous owners still support Jiani and the market from behind the scenes. The market was a big part of their lives, they said, and it's had a huge impact on the town too.

Through the years, there've been stallholders going on from just being a little tiny thing into good businesses," Dianne said.

"For some stallholders, the market has become

the highlight of their week," Jiani added.
Nowadays, Thames Market hosts around 45

stalls in peak summer periods, and 30 or so over winter. It still receives a lot of support from the community.

Body found, man missing

A body has been found in the search for missing man Jared Sutton, Police confirmed on September 3.

The 35-year-old man was reported missing on August 26, and was last seen in Waiomu on August 24.

The body was located on the evening of September 2 near the Coromandel Peninsula. While formal identification is yet to take place, Police said it was believed to be that of the missing man.

The matter will be referred to the coroner.

Meanwhile, Police are continuing to appeal for sightings of missing Hamilton man Aydan. The 39-year-old was last seen in Chartwell, Hamilton, on August 17 and could possibly be in the Coromandel area, wider Waikato or Bay of Plenty region, Police said.

Ayden was believed to be driving a grey Mazda ute, licence plate QYA209, and Police said he may have parked up in a rural or bush area.





Candidate quizzed over 'enslavement' allegation

ne mayoral candidate's "legal matters" were under scrutiny at a recent Meet the Candidates event in Thames.

Steve Hart is running for the Thames-Coromandel District Council (TCDC) mayoralty, a venture he attempted at the 2022 local body elections, and was asked about an affidavit he signed in November, 2024, in which he wrote the council's chief executive Aileen Lawrie, alongside others, had "no exemption to being sentenced to the top end of 14 years in prison' due to "servitude, serfdom, debt bondage and enslavement".

The perceived "fraudulent ac-

tions" were due to TCDC staff's intent to remove an unconsented dwelling on Hart's Puriri property.

In the affidavit, seen by *The Pro*file, Hart wrote that council representatives were attempting to punish him for "not complying with their demands to apply for permission and consent to have this necessity in life. This is an action of enslavement with intent".

The affidavit continued: "I, Steven, as a living man do have the ability to create my shelter and administer my own affairs as I believe I should".

Referring to himself as a "living man" and signing the affidavit with a thumbprint were two signs of a Sovereign Citizen - an individual who claims they can legally withdraw their consent to be governed - according to a New Zealand Police pseudolaw presentation on the

However, Hart told The Pro-

file after the Q&A that he was not a Sovereign Citizen - "never have been, never called myself one, never will be, and will never call myself

The anonymous questions to Hart at the candidate meeting on August 30 were posed ahead of time, and in light of the affidavit, asked how he would work with chief executive Aileen Lawrie in a "positive and constructive way".

"And if elected to any role in council, how would you be able to work within the legislation and

laws governing all councils?"

Hart said the questions were excellent, and asked the audience if they understood them.

"There's a real dog's breakfast out there," he began. "Many of you may know of the incidents that I've been involved with recently here with TCDC and the supposed law-suits. The question I think at the end of the day - how am I going to work with the CEO? Well, there's no option. You have to work with the CEO. Simple as that," he said. "And I don't hold grudges. I don't

hold vendettas. I put all that aside and work and focus on the job at hand. Simple as that. All those other legal matters, they're a side

Meanwhile, incumbent Mayor Len Salt made a spur-of-the-moment pledge to the audience: to replace the podium at the town's Civic Centre. The centre was the venue for the candidate Q&A, but it wasn't without its technical hiccups and odd audio dropouts.

This podium is going to be reblaced. I hate it. I've always hated it," Mayor Salt told the crowd. "I'm

an audio engineer in a previous life, so we're going to get a new sound system for this hall. That's my commitment to you."

Five of the six mayoral candidates partook in the event, hosted by the Thames Business Association and facilitated by Mike Green - with a helping hand from Thames High student Annabelle Hutchin-

The candidates had a chance to introduce themselves and their priorities if elected, and answer questions pre-submitted to convenors ahead of time.

And aside from his promise to upgrade the Civic's sound system, Mayor Salt said his vision for Thames included a "tech centre" for small startups needing good Wi-Fi, easy parking, and "most importantly, great coffee".

"We've got all that in spades," he

Denise Messiter, the only female vying for the mayoralty, was posed the question: 'Working in the many community groups is one thing. Leading the TCDC is another. What makes you ready to take on the tougher job of mayor?

To this, the co-founder of Te Korowai Hauora o Hauraki, and Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit, replied that she had worked in tougher places than being May-

or.
"I understand fully the role of legislation. I know how to follow legislation. I understand policy. I know how to develop policy. But more so, I know what it means to create space for people so that they can participate in decisions that matter to them.

"I'm ready to be a mayor that doesn't want to take over the council but to be part of the council team.'

Peter Revell, a current councillor in the Thames Ward, was asked his stance on the chief executive's "high salary". At an earlier Meet the Candidates event in Matarangi, Revell stated he would've "done it differently".

"That was a decision that was made by the previous council, and that's one of the facts of life - we end up inheriting a whole lot of decisions... and the chief executive's salary is one of those things," he clarified on August 30.

The pay bump for the council boss was confirmed earlier this year, with a 1.8 per cent adjustment bringing Ms Lawrie's annual salary

from \$362,500 to \$369,025. "I don't believe there's anything that can be done to change that unless there ends up being a reason to change the chief executive," Revell said, "and at this point I see absolutely no reason to do that.'

Retired businessman Patrick Kerr was then directed a question about the Local Water Done Well legislation.

In mid-August, TCDC voted in favour of forming a joint Water Services Organisation with Western Bay of Plenty District Council, but the latter decided in favour of forming a joint organisation with Tauranga City Council and not TCDC. According to TCDC, the proposed partner's decision reflected "concerns about ongoing Treaty of Waitangi matters involving iwi and hapū local to each area". Kerr said council now had to "get on and do the job".

"The truth of the matter is that the iwi have disrupted the planned amalgamation of Local Waters Done Well. Not our iwi as I understand it, but it's from the Tauranga side of the equation.

"We're doing it in house. So, let's just get on and do the job. And if we can in the future gain some cost savings - which have never been explained to us the public - then that's

all well and done."
The final candidate James Subritzky was not in attendance.



Businessman stands for Mayor

As this year's local elections approach, reporter KELLEY TANTAU continues to put the spotlight on the mayoral contenders, and asks why they think they're fit to wear the chains.

After nearly a decade in Whangamatā and three years as chair of the local business association, Patrick Kerr seeks to step off the sidelines and into the mayoral seat.

the sidelines and into the mayoral seat.

He told *The Profile* that having experienced some actions of Thames-Coromandel District Council "with some dismay", he decided that instead of "just muttering about it," he'd throw his hat into the ring.

"I am a retired businessman who has owned and run many successful businesses throughout New Zealand," he said. "I am financially literate and have developed strong relationships with a large number of likeminded people standing for council."

minded people standing for council."

According to Kerr's LinkedIn profile - a professional networking site - his listed experience includes Executive Chairman for Peninsula Trust Limited, a company registered to Kerr, and Director of NZ Gold Equities Limited, a former company that Kerr said held mining and exploration permits on the West Coast of the South Island.

He said not only did his fiscal knowledge set him apart from other mayoral candidates, but so did the fact that he hadn't been "tainted by having sat at the table for the past three years, agreeing to a 36 per cent rates increase."

He also criticised other council decisions, such as voting in Māori Wards "without consultation" yet "consulting on rubbish collection", and changing the district's rating system from Land Value to Capital Value.

tem from Land Value to Capital Value.

In his speech at the candidates meeting hosted by Thames Business Association, Kerr said he believed in "one person, one vote" and would be voting against Māori



Wards in a separate poll being conducted in conjunction with the 2025 election.

And in a press release, Kerr said he was determined to restore financial health to TCDC and revitalise the district that had been "languishing under the current leadershin"

ship".

"Too many decisions are driven by political agendas that do not reflect the real needs of us

the residents and ratepayers," he said. "I want to be part of the solution, focusing

on revitalising our council in cost-effective, practical ways, getting back to basics, and ensuring our core services are fit-for-purpose. I am committed to cutting wasteful council spending, minimising rates, and tackling the council's ever-increasing debt." Council subdivision hits the market

Fifty two residential lots in the Hauraki District Council's Ngātea Northern Estate development are now on the market.

Hauraki District Mayor Toby Adams said it was a "momentous day" for council and the in-house project management team to finally cut the ribbon and declare the Ngātea Northern Estate complete and ready for sale. "It takes a bit of foresight and risk to do a development like this, so we're really chuffed to get these sections onto the market", he said.

The subdivision is the latest offering from the council, making it one of the largest property developers on the Plains. Mayor Adams confirmed each development funds the next one so the burden didn't fall on the rate payer. "It's a long tradition that continues the vision of the original Hauraki Plains County Council (1920-1989) and successive Hauraki councils since then to grow the communities and opportunities on the Plains", he said.

Other council property development on the Plains includes the Kerepēhi Business Park; development of another 15 hectare subdivision currently underway on the south side of Ngātea and the current construction of the new Plains Library and Service Centre, due for completion in 2026.

HPC strikes gold and silver at festival

Two ensembles from Hauraki Plains College impressed judges at the recent Waikato Itinerant Music Band and Orchestra Festival, clinching both gold and silver awards.

The festival, an annual event for secondary school bands and orchestras, was held late-August at the University of Waikato's Gallagher Academy of Performing Arts.

The college's jazz band won gold, while its guitar ensemble earned silver.

Jazz band member Jaskeerat Randhawa, 17, said its 11 members - including teacher Mark Houghton - performed songs Zoot Suit Riot, Respect, On Broadway and Feeling Good, which they had been rehearsing since the beginning of the year.

Winning gold was a proud moment for the group, he said, as the college's jazz musicians had only returned to perform at the festival last year.

"HPC has won gold in the past, but we haven't for a while, so getting gold in our second year back feels really good, especially for the Year 13s, being their last year," Jaskeerat said.

They enjoyed the group's dynamics but encouraged them to be more confident.

They were equally impressed by the college's guitar ensemble, liking their selection of music - *Get Up, Shades of Ruberto, Am I Wrong* - and asking them to improve on stressing less and letting "the music flow from within" - guitarist Awa Hay, 14, said.

"The guitar ensemble has nine students, and the teachers are Mr Hewat and Mr Anker. Both are itinerant teachers coming to HPC once a week," she said.

The ITM Festival featured more than 30 schools this year, with three genres of music students can be involved in: the jazz and guitar ensembles, as well as choir.

Schools don't perform against one another, but in front of judges who provide an overall grade based on the groups' showcase.

"For my first time I was really nervous because we had to wait until the last performance," Awa said. "So nerves set in, but I really enjoyed it."

"It was a fun experience," Jaskeerat added, "and seeing other college bands perform was really good."

Meeting addresses Retirement Act review

Retirees gathered on August 22 to hear about ongoing efforts to reform the Retirement Villages Act 2003, the legislation overseeing the relationships between retirement village operators and their residents.

The meeting, held in Bupa Tararu's community lounge, was hosted by Althea Hill, the Waikato district representative for the nationwide Retirement Villages Residents Association (RVR). The guest speaker was the association's vice president, Di Sinclair.

In 2023, the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development called for public submissions on reviewing the Act. It received over 11,000 submissions, most of which came from members of the RVR.

Work to review the Act began in September, 2024, with three issues being made a priority: the maintenance and repair of operator-owned chattels and fixtures; a revamped complaints and disputes process; and quicker repayment of capital when residents move out of a village.

Residents in a retirement village usually don't own their home outright - they sign an occupation right agreement allowing them to live in the unit. There is currently no fixed timeframe in which the village operator must repay the occupant's capital funds when they die or move out - they do not need to pay until the unit is resold.

Di Sinclair said the first two

priorities were well underway to being addressed, with the Commerce Commission saying operators charging residents for chattel repairs risked breaching the Fair Trading Act, and the Retirement Commission looking into an independent disputes resolution process.

But the issue of promptly repaying residents' capital had been a sticking point, she said.

"This review is not about village life. That has never been in dispute. We all know why we moved into a village, and 99 per cent of us are very happy where we are," she said.

"This is about rebalancing the presence of power imbalance and quietly strangling the goose that has laid the golden eggs for so long... There is nothing in the present law that incentivises operators to push on and give you your money back."

Di outlined the RVR's proposed repayment structure, called the

Four Pillars, to the meeting attendees. The structure would require village operators to return 10 per cent of the residents' refundable amount within five days of the unit's vacancy or termination notice, with full repayment within four months.

"The purpose of this is that it brings certainty for residents and families, it enables bridging finance to be sought if necessary, and it supports financial planning for families," Di said.

Michelle Palmer, executive director of the Retirement Villages Association (RVA) which represents village operators, said in a June press release that most repayments already occurred within a reasonable timeframe, and mandatory payback timeframes could disadvantage smaller operators. "Ours is a resident-funded model, where repayments to outgoing residents are generally made possible by incoming residents. There is no large pool of cash - just a carefully managed system built for the long term," Michelle said.

"We're seeking a balanced and sustainable framework that meets residents' needs while recognising the realities of operating villages."

The government has indicated that any legislative changes were expected to be made by the end of 2025, with amendments to the Act introduced in July, 2026.

Your voice matters

Terrifying plunge adds to miner's lucky escapes



As part of a Valley Profile series, MEGHAN HAWKES explores our local history by seeking out stories of life and death in the Thames Valley

Thomas Clarke was on No 5 level of Thames' Prince Imperial mine when he heard what sounded like something falling rapidly down the shaft followed by cries for help.

He promptly gave the alarm, and in three or four minutes he


He promptly gave the alarm, and in three or four minutes he and some mates arrived at No 7 level in the cage. They found 32-year-old James Brownlee clinging to the guide in the shaft, holding himself above about 10ft of water in the well hole.

Earlier that morning, on the surface of the mine, James had loaded a cage with timber.

He climbed on top of the timber and gave the signal to be lowered to No 4 level.

The engine driver lowered the cage sufficiently below No 4 level to enable James to step out on to the chamber.

There were three compartments in the shaft but James mistook where they were, stepping into an open one and being precipitated a distance of about 220 feet (67 metres).

James, who had been employed for several years as a shift foreman, was placed in the cage and hoisted to the surface.

He was immediately taken to hospital, where Dr Callan was quickly in attendance. Had it not been for the water in the well hole, James would have been killed instantly. He was severely bruised and cut and Photo: SUPPLIED

although no bones were broken, the shock to his system was very great; his lungs were lacerated and internal haemorrhage had set in. It was a hopeless case and he was unlikely to

James had been born at Portadown, County Armagh, Ireland. He went to India with his parents, and then arrived

in New Zealand, staying first at Tauranga, then at Thames, where he worked as a miner

where he worked as a miner.

He married Elizabeth Culbert in 1878 and they started a family. James had been an experienced miner, and a careful and trustworthy man.

His accident was attributed to one of those things that overtook even the most cautious.

But James defied the odds. As the days passed, the *Thames Star* reported on his health. He was much better and hopes were now entertained of his ultimate recovery.

After steady progress his recovery was looked upon as almost a certainty. Four months after the accident he had so successfully recovered that he was able to return to work.

James's terrifying plunge in August, 1885, would be talked about for years to come as would his startling experiences of twice being blown up on the American Eagle mining claim and escaping without serious injury.

But mining in the end felled James when the dread lung disease, miners' phthisis (silicosis), laid its grip on him. He rapidly weakened and in 1914 died at his home in Irishtown, aged 62.

Mr Brownlee's Adventures were recounted in newspapers - "His sensational experience in the old Prince Imperial mine is still spoken about... that he escaped a fearful death is nothing short of a miracle."

James was buried at Shortland cemetery, Thames.

Auckland-coromandel ferry set to resume

Tourism operator Explore Group is reinstating the Auckland to Coromandel Town ferry service this summer, launching on October 24 just in time for Labour Week-

The new service departs Auckland's Viaduct, arriving at Hannaford's Wharf in the Coromandel, where it will be met with a shuttle bus connecting passengers on to Coromandel Town.

A shuttle bus will take passengers to and from Coromandel Town and Hannaford's Wharf, where the ferry will arrive and depart.

The service will initially operate an express Friday evening service, as well as Saturday and Sunday departures, with plans to increase the schedule with demand. The jour-

ney will take just over two hours.
"We're really pleased this is happening,"
Thames-Coromandel District Council economic development lead Mitch King said.

The community has been looking for the ferry service from Auckland to be reinstated for several years now because it's such an important part of the Coromandel's hospitality offering.

The new service has been long awaited by the local Coromandel community, Coromandel Business Association chair, Jennifer Ashman said. "The local community is delighted that a ferry service has been reinstated. Positive input from the community has demonstrated local demand from businesses, locals and visitors alike and contributed to the successful reestablishment of a service that will

be invaluable to connecting our community." General manager of Destination Hauraki Coromandel Hadley Dryden said the reopening of the maritime link has much to appeal to visitors.

"The revival of the blue highway is fantastic news. Cruising the islands of the Hauraki Gulf - alongside marine wildlife, past mussel farms, with the Coromandel Ranges and city skyline at either end - is an experience not to be missed. Once aboard, visitors will understand why Hauraki Coromandel is good for your soul.



Pay equity headlines at meeting

round 20 people attended a public Ameeting at Te Kura o Te Kauaeranga Thames South School on August 24 to hear about changes to the Equal Pay

Speakers Jocelyn Pratt from the Public Service Association (PSA) union and Labour workplace relations spokesperson Jan Tinetti took the audience through the history of workers' rights and pay equity in New Zealand.

They then spoke about the amendments to the Act, which were passed under urgency in Parliament in May.

The amendment changed the framework for assessing pay equity claims, and cancelled 33 claims which were already underway.

Jocelyn said the New Zealand Council of Trade Unions will be holding a national Women's Day of Action on September 20 across the country, which is billed as a "bold and visible statement

in the fight for pay equity".

Meanwhile, a public oral submissions hearing, due to be held on September 10 at Kerepēhi Marae, has since been cancelled due to cost.

The in-person hearing was to be held by the People's Select Committee, a group of former female MPs seeking public feedback about the changes to the Act.

The hearing will instead be held over Zoom, from 9-11am.

Bloat - make sure you know the signs

Whiskey is a 10-year-old female bearded collie cross who started panting and vomiting on Matariki morning.

Her owners

rushed her to the clinic, where radiographs showed she had a gastric dilatation and volvulus (GDV), which is a lifethreatening emergency.

Whiskey had decompression of her stomach to allow her to breathe and was taken immediately into theatre, where her stomach was secured to prevent the rotation from happening again.

This GDV is a real emergency and can progress rapidly from vomiting through to struggling to breathe and even death. Early recognition of the signs is key to the greatest chance of successful treatment.

Affected dogs often appear bloated in the abdomen. They may be constantly retching and trying to vomit, but not bringing up any material from their stomach due to the twist. Some dogs are lethargic, while others are hyperactive and stressed.

They will often be panting, and their gums will be pale due to the pressure on their large abdominal blood vessels caused by the distended stomach.

Dogs that suffer from GDV require emergency surgery to derotate the stomach and perform a gastropexy,

which refers to the process of securing the stomach to the internal surface of the abdominal muscles to reduce the chance of this emergency happening again. Surgery also allows the veterinarian to assess the appearance of the stomach wall and spleen, both of which can have their blood supply reduced due to the twist.

Breeds that are at risk of GDV include Great Danes, German Shepherds, Weimeraners, and Saint Bernards; however, any deep-chested dog can be affected.

If your dog is at risk, make sure you know the signs of an emergency and ask your veterinarian about preventative gastropexy to reduce the risk.



Director's nude awakening with Calendar Girls

As Stuart Floan steps off-stage to take the director's chair for the first time, he's discovering that not all awakenings are rudesome are nude, poignant, and full of heart.

The Thames Music and Drama [MAD] thespian has taken the helm of *Calendar Girls*, a show he says is about friendship, connection, loss, and grief - all done with a sense of humour and a small amount of - concealed - nudity.

"We kind of transitioned into it." Stuart said with a laugh.

going for it. So first we turn the
heaters up and make sure the
place is warm."

The stage show is based on the 2003 film of the same name, in which a group of middle-aged Yorkshire women produce a nude calendar to raise money for Leukaemia Research.

The motivation to put the production on for Thames audiences later this month came about after Stuart's wife and other members of MAD saw the *Calendar Girls* show roughly two years ago

show roughly two years ago.
"They came back and said:
'Great show, really funny, really poignant moments. We have to do it'. So it's kind of been trucking along in the background. I thought I'd give [directing] a go, and I've had support from people

like Diane Connors and Asha Peppiatt and Hilary Rodley who've all directed lots before."

Stuart said it was essential for his six leading ladies to gel well together, not only for the vulnerable moments, but for the heartfelt moments, too.

"The whole story is about friendship, and it was really important that we got it right in terms of the group of people, making sure that they gelled together and it felt natural and looked natural and all those things, so that's been quite a lot of work," he said.

"But we've got a really good cast, so it's been - I hate to say it - it's been kind of easy in some aspects because everybody's been really open to stuff.

open to stuff.

"When we did the auditions, we weren't sure what would happen because obviously there is nudity, but we had loads of people come out and we'd be upfront and say: 'Look, the part you're auditioning for includes nudity. You're going

to get nude on stage. We'll control it, but it's going to happen' and in all honesty, I think, out of the 15, 20 people who were there, maybe one or two went, okay, that's not for me, but everybody else was into it."

The cast - plus a few additional "Calendar Guys" - have also committed to producing a calendar, which will be on sale during the production's run.

And even though Stuart joked that the photo shoot itself was

harder than doing rehearsals, all of the cast's efforts were for a good cause.

All profits made from the show will be going to the Thames Cancer Support Society. "We've had really good support

"We've had really good support over the past however many years with big shows and little shows, and when we looked at *Calendar Girls* as a committee, we thought that any money that we raised should stay in the community, and was used for the people that have come along to our shows for years," Stuart said.

"We agreed that we would give all profits to the Thames Cancer Support Society; they do great stuff."

Thames-Coromandel District Council have also waived the cost of the Civic Hall hire so Thames MAD can maximize its donation.

"Why *Calendar Girls*?" Stuart said of his foray into directing. "It's a story of friendship and connection. It's humorous, but definitely poignant.

"I want people to come and I want them to laugh, first of all, but I also want them to cry. I want them to walk away feeling that there was a connection there."



Enviro projects shine during conservation week

A Conservation Week event at the Kauaeranga Visitors Centre just outside Thames featured a showcase of environment-focused school projects, interactive workshops and conversations to inspire children to care for nature.

The event, a collaboration between Enviroschools and the Department of Conservation, saw 11 schools attend from across the Hauraki and Coromandel regions.

First up was the "Market Day", where eight of the schools set up stalls explaining the environmental projects they had undertaken.

Students wandered among the displays, which featured a wide variety of initiatives.

Many of the schools spoke about efforts within school grounds to replant forest areas, develop food gardens, care for worm farms and chickens, and cultivate seedlings for planting within the community. Netherton School students chronicled their trips to a local kahikatea stand, where they study and care for the ngahere [bush].

Pūriri School students talked about their studies in their awa [river], finding leeches and learning to test soil.

At Matatoki School, their environmental learning was incorporated into the arts, with the students showing off their costumes and awards from their conservation-themed performance at the performing arts competition, Showquest, in June.

Hauraki Plains College students had also incorporated the arts into their environmental work, with their exhibit of foil blankets made from recycled chip packets

from recycled chip packets.

Meanwhile, Waikino School displayed their hands-on learning approach with an interactive stall, where they taught other students how to whittle with knives.

Enviroschools environmental

education facilitator Jo Buchan said she loved seeing the students sharing their knowledge and ideas for interacting with nature.

"It's amazing to see young people taking real action to protect our environment," she said.

"These students are the conservation leaders of tomorrow."

The event aims not only to celebrate current achievements but

also to foster collaboration and long-term connections between schools, Jo said. "I love hearing the kids talking to other schools... being interested and wanting to learn what they're doing," she said.

"There's no other space that I'm aware of that gives the schools this opportunity to share what they've been doing."

The market was followed by

workshops run by local conservation groups - students were able to encounter native geckos and fish, learn about pest trapping and worm farms, plant seedlings, discover native shorebirds, practice their recycling skills, learn about native plants and kiwi, and more.





Thames Women storm into final after stunning comeback

A magnificent second-half display saw Thames FC overturn a 2-0 deficit to beat Northern United Premiers 5-3 in a dramatic cup semi-final at Rhodes Park on Sunday.

Thames were handed the toughest possible semi-final draw: runaway Division One champions Northern United Premiers, who had been beaten just once all season and conceded only 10 goals.

The first half belonged to the visitors, who looked dangerous from the outset - controlling the game with ease and forcing Thames deep into their defensive third. It took just six minutes for them to draw first blood. Sasha Nelson pounced on a loose ball and thundered a 30-yard strike in off the crossbar for 1-0. With an easterly wind at their backs, Northern kept Thames under sustained pressure, pinning the hosts deep.

A brief spell of pressure gave Thames a route back into the game, as a goalmouth scramble in the Northern box resulted in a penalty. It was a key moment as Brooke Douglas stepped up, but McKenzie Claydon dived to her left, palming the ball away to safety.

Despite the scare, Northern continued to dominate and made it 2-0 with a neatly curled free-kick from playmaker Hunter-Rose Earl. Thames were hanging on as the half ended with a flurry of chances for the visitors. First, Abigail Marshall came close with a rasping drive before Hannah Jordan set up Nicola Gonzalez, whose shot hit the bar, with Thames goalkeeper Bryony Wayne pouncing on the rebound.

The half-time whistle brought some much-needed relief for Thames and a chance to recalibrate after a testing opening 45 minutes.

As the weather started to change, so did the game. Coach Xavier Brown adjusted the shape to a narrow 4-4-2 system and introduced fresh legs to reinvigorate his side. With the wind and a packed grandstand behind them, Thames began to find a foothold and work their way back into the tie.

It was captain Emma Hinds-Senior who set the

second-half tone and dragged Thames back into contention. A neat turn opened space for a low shot, which took a big deflection before finding its way into the corner of the net - a welcome stroke of luck.

Momentum was shifting, and it wasn't long before Thames drew level. There was nothing fortunate about the equaliser as Keltie Mc-Manus broke through the defence before arrowing a shot into the top corner. Northern were stunned and left to wonder how their comfortable two-goal lead had evaporated so rapidly.

Thames continued on the front foot and took the lead on the 70-minute mark. McManus's corner was initially cleared, but a follow-up cross found poacher Ariel McNab in the six-yard box. The striker steered a volley inside the near post for 3-2, sparking jubilant scenes in the crowd.

The game was far from over. Northern, unaccustomed to trailing after a season of dominance, soon hit back to level once more. Samantha Warwick drove through the Thames midfield before threading an inch-perfect pass to Nelson, who applied a neat finish into the far corner for

The tension was high. The tie perfectly poised heading into the final 10 minutes. A moment of magic from Samantha Chamberlain edged Thames back in front. The combative midfielder burst into space before unleashing a powerful low strike that skidded off the surface and nestled into the corner.

With the 90 minutes almost up, there was just time for Thames to cap off their stunning second-half display with a fifth goal.

Chamberlain broke into the box and was clumsily brought down with the referee pointing to the spot. She stepped up and coolly converted to seal a famous 5-3 win and confirm Thames' place in the cup final.

The Rhodes Park faithful witnessed a pulsating semi-final, rich in drama and quality from start to finish. Thames looked down and out at half-time, but a spirited second-half display sparked a remarkable comeback.

Attention now turns to September 21 and the final against Waikato Unicol - with an historic league and cup double on the line.

Walrus swim returns

After a five-year break, the legendary Walrus swim returned to Waihī's Oceana Gold in the first week of September.

Five swimmers initially braved the 15 degree celsius water in the gold mining company's polishing ponds at the water treatment plant to swim the chilly 110 metres to glory.

Somehow six swimmers crossed the finish line when one of the organising committee swam the last 25 metres "just to show how it should be ďone"

The Walrus goes back around 20 years, and traditionally has been swum around mid-winter, regardless of the weather.

In some years the rain was so bad that no photos of the event

The swim takes place in the less-than-two-metre deep pond where treated water is held and monitored for quality before being discharged into the Ohinemuri River.

Around 30 staff gathered to

cheer on the participants, none of whom have taken part in the event before.

Underground mine engineer Zibo Lin blitzed the field to win the race, with processing manager Thomas Trott coming in second and environmental officer Michaela Malone taking out third place.

Each swimmer was awarded a prize, and certificates were also presented for 'Best Walrus Lookalike', 'Loudest Cold-Water Shriek', and 'Most Realistic Shivers'

Now that the Walrus is back, the organising committee said they hoped for a larger field next year.

Along the way, we stopped at the skatepark. My oldest daughter was carefully walking her bike down the ramps, but I knew she could handle riding them. So I gave her a gentle push - figuratively.

She refused at first, saying she was scared and couldn't do it. I promised to run alongside and catch her if she fell. She gave it a go

gave it a go.

By her third attempt, she was beaming, racing down the ramp with a confident "Thanks, Daddy!" as she took off on her

Later, at the playground, my oldest son was giving "parkour" a crack. I jumped in beside him, helped him figure out ideas, and when he said "I can't", I encouraged him with tips on tech-

nique and reminded him what he could do.

By the end of the day, the kids were glowing - more confident, more capable, and with a slightly bigger world.

As parents, we can't afford to be asleep at the wheel. We're seeing anxiety on the rise in our teens.

Our phones - and all the apps on them - are doing everything they can to steal our attention.

But we can't let them win.

The cost to our kids is too high. We need to be intentional. Push them a little further - with



The 18-year-old also said it was cool to be the first team in the Thames Valley to kick it off, with the first capping ceremony held at their game on August 9.


