New voices, new ma

They've taken different paths, but Michael Barlow, Des Tyler, and Rereahu Collier now represent an historic step for tangata whenua as the first Māori Ward councillors for Thames Valley. Elected unopposed, their roles face uncertainty with a binding vote set to decide the wards' future. KELLEY TANTAU reports

ing to Michael Barlow's school report.
One teacher described him as "a law unto himself". The label stuck and, for a <mark>while, h</mark>e was just another number.

Des Tyler grew up like many Kiwi boys, chasing dreams of pulling on the black jersey. Winter meant playing rugby and league; summer was for athletics. But his

career was cut short after a serious injury. Ironically for Rereahu Collier, his first semesters studying politics and public policy led him to discover he was too honest to be a politician. It wasn't until later when a Māori and Pacific Development lecturer challenged him to think bigger: if he wanted to make an impactful change, it had to go beyond the individual.

The three men took a different path, but all have arrived at an historic moment.

For the first time in the Hauraki and Thames-Coromandel districts, they will represent their respective Māori Wards at the council table.

It ensures that for the next three years, tangata whenua will have a voice

But while the local body elections are underway, there is also a "critical" crossroads - a binding poll that threatens to overturn the very representation just gained. As part of recent legislative changes made by central government, all councils with Maori Wards are required to hold a poll asking voters whether those wards should remain or be removed.

The question will appear as part of the regular ballot, arriving in letterboxes

across the rohe; the results of which will be legally enforceable at the 2028 elec-

Michael calls it a "critical moment", one that he, Des, and Rereahu all hope will result in a positive outcome.
"Māori Wards are not just a mecha-

nism for representation, they reflect our commitment to Te Tiriti o Waitangi, ensuring genuine partnership," he tells *The Profile*. "Māori Wards ensure that tangata whenua not only have a seat, but a voice at the decision-making table, where underpinning values and lived experiences are heard to help shape the future of our communities.

Michael was there when Thames-Co-romandel District Council unanimously voted to establish Māori Wards in 2023

The chamber was at capacity, full with community members, iwi, and Māori leaders from across the rohe. At least a dozen people spoke in support of estab-lishing the Te Tara o Te Ika Māori Ward. "This role isn't just about being a voice,

it's about ensuring our people are heard, our tikanga is respected, and our values are woven into the everyday decisions that affect our lives," Michael says.

"It's a privilege to have a seat at the table and to represent our people in a way that's grounded in kaupapa Māori and practical outcomes

For Michael, [Ngāti Maru, Ngāti Hikai-ro and Ngā Puhi], the 'E' that once meant failure in school has since been replaced

by real-world experience.

Told to leave before he could finish sixth form, Michael says he soon found his feet in the workforce, first at Coromandel Meat Processors, later known as Wallace Meats.

"Probably the best job I've had," he says.
"Over a span of 11 years, I worked my way up through different roles, starting as a janitor, handing out overalls, and eventually becoming site manager.

The self-described high school dropout went to Massey University and, in 2005, completed his Diploma in Meat Technology.

From there, he spent 11 years at Smart Environmental, navigating both frontline operations and council contract meetings.

In 2018, he and his business partner went out on their own as Coastal Bins Ltd, eventually selling to Waste Management, where Michael is now the operations manager.

The experience taught him that leadership wasn't about titles. "It's showing up, listening, and doing the mahi." With a wealth of governance experience to cap it off, including as chair of Thames South School, Te Tonga o Hoterini Kōhanga Reo, and the Thames Business Association, it's family that has shaped his journey above all else.

The loss of his second-eldest son last year was an experience he says no parent should ever go through, but it strengthened his commitment to whanau and community.

"I carry him wherever I go, literally. I have his name badge connected to my belt. He now rests at our whānau urupā Whaiapu in Totara with our tīpuna that holds deep meaning for our whanau. Whenever we all drive past, we all toot, and make no apologies for the honking of our horns.

For Des Tyler [Ngati Hako, Ngati Tamat-

era], though he never became an All Black, keeping up with the sport from the sidelines taught him valuable lessons in management. He went on to be involved in rep teams, was the team liaison for the Argentina Sevens, and most recently, was part of the Cook Islands Touch Association. He now works as a kaitiaki at Waiora Waikato Hospital and spent more than 10 years with Ara Poutama Department of Corrections.

The experience I have gained from doing these roles has helped shape me and given me an opportunity to be involved in projects at a national and Parliament level," ĥe says.

"And my learnings will give me confidence and help set me up with my role in the Te Pakikau o te Ika Māori Ward for the Hauraki District Council.

Des, who is a trustee for Tirohia Marae, says he's looking forward to being one of Hauraki's first-ever Māori Ward councillors alongside Rereahu Collier. "A big goal and vision for me is that I want our people to not be afraid to have a korero with us, and to know that we are there for them and for our people in Hauraki," he says. "I want them to be even more proud of where they come from, [and] I definitely want to see Māori Wards continue past 2028. It's important for Māori to be able to have representation.

Rereahu Collier [Ngāti Porou, Ngāti Tamaterā] graduated from the University of Waikato in 2017 studying Psychology and Māori and Pacific Development - now known as Māori and Indigenous studies.

Ironically, he says, during his first se-mesters he learned he was too honest to be a politician. "However, in my final years studying Māori and Pacific Development, one of my lecturers told me that in order for me to make impactful change in the lives I

wish to affect, I need to expand to beyond the individual, to reform the system so that it's geared to make equitable change for our people.

Rereahu went on to work for Auckland Council for eight years as a Kaikōkiri Ratonga Māori [senior library assistant - Māori services]. He's now a Senior Strategist Kaupapa Maori and says he's seen the power of the council and local boards of Tamaki Makaurau. The skills he gained in the big city have now brought him full circle, and he's returned home to Paeroa to share what he's learned and apply it to the development of the rohe. Since being back, he's been involved in kaupapa Māori initiatives, including performing with the regional kapa haka rōpū Hauraki Kōwhao Rau, and supporting the delivery of the Matariki Hautapu cer-emony at Mātai Whetū Marae.

"I am excited [for the councillor role] with a hint of nervousness of course," Rereahu says. "The way I see it, is that my tuākana and pakeke recommended I put my name forward to represent our hāpori Māori.

"While I may be the first Māori Ward Councillor for the rohe, the work has already been carried out by many of my pakeke in the past, I'm merely in service of the continuance of their work

Michael, Des, and Rereahu may have different experiences, but all three share the same commitment: to ensure tangata whenua have a voice in local decision-making.

However, whether that representation continues beyond this term will depend on the outcome of the Māori Ward Poll.

"Mā whero, mā pango, ka rapa te whai," Rereahu says. "With cooperation, work will be easily completed."



50 years of motorsport and saving lives

Grant Hirst never intended to become a paramedic.

The then-25-year-old had taken a day off work to see a movie, and happened to park outside a St John building in Auckland. They were hiring, and he popped in for a look out of curiosity.

a look out of curiosity.

"Then I got a phone call: 'Can you be at [the station] on Monday?' 'Oh, yeah, what's that for, a medical or something?' 'No, no, that's when the training course starts'," he said. "That's the way it was those days."

That was in 1975. On August 30 this year, Grant was awarded his 50-year gold service medal for ultra-long service at Thames' Hato Hone St John service awards cere-mony. The accolade is reserved for the organisation's longest-serving and most dedicated members

Grant has served in a multitude of roles at St John over the years - Pukekohe station manager, area committee, events officer, Central East events operations support officer and paramedic, national motorsport team leader, and health shuttle driver. In 2002 he was also admitted to the Order of St John. where he currently holds the title of Commander.

Grant has seen a lot of changes in his half-century with St John.

"When I first started, it was, 'here's your keys'... My first shift on the road was the 11pm-7am" night shift that I rode single crew,'

he said.
"So, straight out of training school, wet behind the ears and

you're working by yourself in the truck. I'm pleased those sort of things don't happen today."

Throughout Grant's many roles

in St John, one constant has been his love of motorsport. Working in the organisation gave him the op-portunity to combine his passion with his career

Grant would regularly give up his weekends to volunteer as an on-site first aid responder at motorsport events across the country.

"I was working at Pukekohe one day and there was a big crash... I said, I've got to do this better," he

"I talked to the chief ambulance officer about [forming] a specialist team in motorsport. And he gave me the okay to call for a meeting and see who would be interested.

This was the late 90s, and in 2000 the motorsport medical team was made official. All their training was done on their own time; their time at events was still volunteered. But the team was well-recognised as being very good at what they did, Grant said.

In 2019 he took on a full-time role as the national motorsport team leader, and advocated hard for his team. By the time Covid-19

was over, his team was getting paid for attending most events.

It had been really special working in events, he said. "Motorsports was very good to me."

It's not just good to me."

It's not just events work that's kept Grant in St John over the

years, though.

For him, the main reason to stay was the people - both his colleagues, and the wider community they served. "The people that work with St John's are friggin' amazing. Especially in the early days ing. Especially in the early days when I started, everybody knew everybody," he said.
"But the biggest impact is the

[patients] that you work with. It's not the big headline-grabbing things that get you. It's turning up in the middle of the night because Granny slipped going to the loo and can't get back up off the floor. "And you sit there and you make

her a cup of tea and she gets you the scone that she made the day before and stuff like that.

It was a privilege to be let into people's lives during their most vulnerable moments, he said.
"You have to turn up in the middle and the said.

You have to turn up in the middle of the day or the middle of the

night to the tay of the findere of the night to their private address and they're actually inviting you into their property, you know?"

Grant left St John in November, 2024. But now, 50 years after his time with St John began, he's still involved with the organisation as involved with the organisation as a volunteer health shuttle driver.

"I still do my bit... I think [the shuttle's] a pretty cool service," he said. "It's been a pretty cool life. Some really good stories, some bad stories, but there's been more ups than downs. I've met some really nice people."

Mayoral hopefuls a no-show as election nears

It was a packed house at Paeroa Rugby Club for the Meet the Candidates public meeting on September

10 - except at the table on stage. At the meeting, which was hosted by Paeroa Lions, incumbent Hauraki Mayor Toby Adams sat alone in the spot reserved for the mayoral candidates. His opponents, first-time candidates Levi Burton and Roman Jackson, did not turn up, leaving Adams to hold the floor unchallenged.

The scene was to repeat at the Ngatea ward's meeting, hosted by the Hauraki Plains Community Hub at the Hauraki RSA on September 11.

Organisers from both events said they had reached out multiple times with invites, but did not receive a response from either man.

Burton addressed his decision not to attend on social media, saying, "I did not agree to attend this meeting. Rather, I chose to spend my time out in the community listening to rate payers and finding real solutions".

Adams was cheerful about his lack of competition at the Paeroa event, and praised the candidates who did attend. "It's not an easy task putting yourself out in front of everybody, and once you get to the council table, you realise just how hard it is when you get all sorts of those names called at you, which I get frequently," he said. "Everybody thinks that the Mayor's got this massive axe that they can just come in there and swing and make all these decisions."

Adams is seeking a third term as Mayor. He was comfortable at the mic, beginning his speech with a rundown of his achievements to date and preemptively addressing contro-

versial topics like the council's heavy spending on water infrastructure.

"We get criticised because we've got debt, but we've been investing in our waters and wastewater network. Most of our water drinking plants are up to standard... our Waihī wastewater plant is fully compliant and up to scratch, and we're investing \$40 million here in Paeroa," Adams said.
"We [the council] make decisions

based on what is right for our community, not what's going to get [us] voted in or voted out."

He was also eager to engage directly with the crowd, encouraging questions. "Somebody ask me about rates," he said. "I want to give some interesting facts about rates

The other speakers in Paeroa were more subdued, but still had plenty to

say. Paeroa general ward candidates Michael Aitken, Michelle Magnus, and incumbents Paul Milner and Jo Tilsley spoke for five minutes each before fielding questions from the crowd. Many of the questions revolved around council spending, with voters wanting to know candidates' opinions on "nice to haves" versus necessary spending.

Aitken and Tilsley emphasised the community's role in deciding what was necessary. "It doesn't matter what I think personally, because I don't sit in chambers to represent myself... [feedback and] consultation feeds into our decision-making," Tilsley said, while Aitken commented, "it is important that we do look very carefully at the services that we offer to make sure that all members of the

community are being serviced".

"[Swimming pools, libraries and sports fields] are the things that makes our community a great place to live," Milner said.

"We have basic core services that fits our community and is affordable. The reason such big rates increases have come is the cost of compliance with water and wastewater."

Magnus, meanwhile, was directly challenged with questions asking what she considered to be council "vanity projects". She pointed to the Placemaking initiative on improving the town centres, along with upgrades to Paeroa's Railway Reserve, and planned murals on Wharf St.

"Until we can keep our rates under control, let's just put a hold on it.' Milner told the audience the Place-

making initiative was mostly funded by separate government funding. Incumbent candidate Rino Wilkinson was unable to attend due to illness.

Meanwhile, Plains general ward candidates Cynthia Bates, Andrew Pickford, and incumbents Ray Broad, Stephen Croovmans and Neil Grav took their turns at the mic in Ngatea, to an equally crowded house.

Both events also heard from the Waikato Regional Council candidates. The five candidates, Lindsay Algra, Walt Cavendish, Keith Holmes, Julie Taylor and incumbent Robert Cookson, are contesting two seats in the Waihōu ward. Taylor was unable to attend the Paeroa meeting, while Holmes was absent for the Ngatea meeting.

A third public meeting, hosted by Grey Power Waihī, is scheduled for September 26. It will feature the candidates for the Waihī general ward, regional council and mayoral seats.

There are four Hauraki councillor vacancies in the Plains ward, three in Paeroa and four in Waihī. Voting closes on October 11 at noon.

When you sit down with Libin Baby, the Village Manager at Ohinemuri Village in Paeroa, you quickly understand why people here speak so fondly of the place. He has cared for the village for more than eight years and says the appeal comes down to three simple things: quiet, affordability, and community.

Ohinemuri apart, he explains, is its scale. "Most providers have a big village with a small care centre. We're the opposite, only eight villas, with a large care centre beside them. That balance means independence with peace of mind."

For one fortunate new resident, there's now a rare chance to join this community. When conversation turns to the vacant villa, Libin's expression brightens.

"This one's special. It's fully refurbished, new floors, walls, wardrobes. It even has a dedicated mobility scooter park and charger tucked around the back. And the view out across Paeroa, it's pretty hard to beat. People walk in and say, 'I didn't expect it to feel this light and sunny."


Yet what matters most, he insists, isn't the buildings, but how people feel once they're here.

What I hear most often from residents is, 'I should have made the move sooner.' They still have their independence, but with the ease and peace of mind they didn't realise they were missing.

Artist finds 'something poetic' in new exhibit

A step into the world of art was inevitable for Erica Soman.
The creative from Thames said

her hometown in the 1960s to 70s was "art-centric" and called herself lucky for the strong art teachers she had at Thames High School.

Once she realised that art-making engaged an "infinitely broad range of skills" and intellect, plus her excitement for knowing she could go to art school: "I knew that becoming an artist was my path", she told *The Profile*.

She grew up on land that four

She grew up on land that four generations of her family lived on, in a house that had a view over the Firth of Thames toward Miranda, she said.

It's what makes her upcoming art exhibition in Miranda so significant.

Sustain/ing will showcase works on paper by Erica and fellow art-ist, friend and Elam School of Fine Arts lecturer Christine Hellyar at Miranda Farm Gallery on September 20 to October 13.

It will be a mix of large graphite botanical drawings and large tissue paper artworks.

"The exhibition also plays trib-ute to the network that holds us as artists. Christine Hellyar has been my lecturer, employer, friend and beacon of hope since I went to Elam Art School

"Christine's fluid, vibrant yet delicate, alive yet mysterious drawings are a part of this show."

Erica said gallery owner Annie Wilson had shown Christine's work before, as well as that of Warren Viscoe, two highlight respected artists. "Sadly Warren Viscoe is no longer with us but I vividly recall works shown at Miranda Farm Gallery.

The artist said there was "something poetic" about showing her

works in the landscape she used to

draw so often.
"I have been working on an ongoing series of botanical drawings based on the seasonal blooms of my garden since 2019.
"The blooms I focus on are grown with lave in my own sprewling.

with love in my own sprawling, vintage seaside garden on a tidal estuary," she said.

"These works are either in graphite on large sheets of Hahnemuhle paper or made with tissue paper, which I cut to form geometries and then carefully glue together, followed by working on top with

watercolours and ink. There's one thing Erica hopes eople will take away from the exhibition: "Plants give so much to this planet, to our towns, and to our neighbourhoods to our ecol-

ogy.

"These works honour the biological role of a flower in our continu-ation as a species," she said. "I hope that these works contrib-

ute to an awareness of the gener-

osity of the biological."
Something Erica highlighted was that "artists do not make work in isolation".
"For this show I wanted to ac-

oters face full field in Thames ward

With only three seats earmarked for Thames around the council table, the run for the ward in this year's local body elections is hotly contested.

Voters will be weighing up familiar names and fresh faces in the race for Thames councillor - and they got a good look at both at the August 30 Meet the Candidates event hosted by the Thames Business Association.

Sitting councillors Martin Rodley and Robyn Sinclair are both hoping to return for a third term, while their colleague Peter Revell has set his sights higher, throwing his hat in the ring for Mayor Kishan Raikwar currently sitting on the Thames Community Board, is now contesting a seat on the council.

The six other candidates are former council Chief Financial Officer Steve Baker, Kopu local Scott Bright, Creative Coromandel chair Fiona Cameron, Carson's Bookstore owner Greg Hampton, 27-year-old electrician Cole McDowell, and ecology architect Steve Hart, who is also running for community board and Mayor. The candidates were thrown an anonymous question each, with the most pointed being directed to Sinclair, in regards to a council meeting held last month.

"Having seen your verbal attack on the Mayor at the August 5 council meeting and prior to this, how will you, in the best interests of the community, support the elected leader if they are not the leader of your choice?'

Sinclair took to the podium to say she did "challenge the accuracy of a report that came to council" that day, in which the mayor's activities were listed. The Profile watched the recording of the August 5 meeting; in it, Sinclair asked that it be noted that incumbent land transport committee meeting. She also asked for increased commentary and transparency around his listed mayoral activities.

Mayor Salt said there were "technical issues" that delayed him from joining the committee meeting, and additional providing commentary alongside his Mayoral Reports was unfeasible. "There will be times when there simply isn't the time and the capacity to do that. There are minute takers for these minutes. The minutes are fully recorded. There are recordings online. So, yeah, I'm not convinced that I'm going to be doing reports on all of these meetings," he said. "I simply don't have time.

"With respect," Sinclair followed, "I did email you five weeks ago asking for an update about something that had appeared in one of these reports and

I'm still waiting for a response."
She suggested they discuss the matter further offline, but Mayor Salt said because the issue was raised online, the full picture needed to be heard.

"I spent a good part of that time in hospital, so I'll get to it when I'm feeling well enough to do it. But that needs to be noted," he said. "If you're going to make those comments then also fill out the picture by saying that the mayor was in hospital at the time."

Mayor Salt posted a message on social media on July 27 thanking Thames and Waikato hospitals for the care he received during a "cycle" of inpatient visits between July 1 and 20.

The core of the problem was a combination of hip and spinal issues, but the incumbent earlier told The Profile voters could be "absolutely confident" in his ability to perform the mayoral role if re-elected.



Addressing the audience and the anonymous question on August 30, Sinclair assured she could work "with anyone". "I am very happy to work with a wide range of different elected members, and you can look at the two councils that I've worked quite suc-cessfully on for the last two terms and see a wide range of political and personal views," she said. "I think I have very good relationships with almost everybody on council at the moment extremely good relationships within the community board."

Meanwhile, other candidates fielded questions on sporting facilities, the new Thames Pool, and arts and culture - with a minor detour as a couple weighed in on whether Thames should indeed be called a 'gateway'.

"I feel I struck a nerve on the gateway thing," McDowell said with a laugh near the meeting's end. He was earlier asked if he believed Thames needed to be "the strong economic hub of the Coromandel".

He answered: "A way we could potentially grow economic growth for Thames as a region is focusing more on being the gateway for the Cororest of the Peninsula as well. So doing simple things like making it super easy to get off the main road, get fuel, get groceries, get all your bits and bobs while you're on your way to your holiday destination.

In his final pitch to the crowd, current councillor Martin Rodley said he thought "we had put the whole 'Thames being the gateway thing' to

'We did a lot of work with Explore Thames with some recovery money from central government, and I feel that we've really boosted the offering and the awareness of Thames actually being a destination, not a gateway. Please stop calling it a gateway.'

Fiona Cameron was asked how her three decades of arts and business background would be beneficial around the council table

"I'm really proud of the work I've done in my life. I'm proud of what I can take to the council," she said. "If I'm on that council table, I will bring my business experience. I'll bring my connections and those creative industries with me, which is a huge part of who we are here in Hauraki-Coromandel.'

Bookshop owner Greg Hampton was asked how he would progress upgrades of Pollen Street while mitigating disruption to businesses.

He replied that any work should be done in stages, block by block, and in the off-season "between April and Au-

"Our community is on a knife-edge economically. You walk down the main street now and we've got a dozen or more empty shops and a lot of businesses are walking a very tight line.

"We need to support local businesses. We need to buy local. We need to circulate our money within the dis-

Scott Bright was asked: 'What improvements to the natural environment would you support council to do?' Bright, who in his candidate profile said he'd had 43 years in business across food production, mechanical, and construction, said he believed everybody had a responsibility to be environmentally friendly.

"I would support - and I'd expect -the council to do everything that's necessary to look after our environment."

Former council chief financial officer Steve Baker was quizzed on his focus for sporting facilities in the Thames area, to which he recalled a "precedent" being set when Whitianga was building a sports ground and asked the rest of the district to help pay for it.

We put a very firm message back to Whitianga: it is your sports stadium, you will pay for it. I'm pretty sure Whitianga will remember that conversahe said, "so our pool will be our cost. We just need to pick one we can

Steve Hart is covering all bases in this year's local elections, standing for mayor, councillor, and community board member. He wasn't directed a pre-composed question during the councillor stand-up, so asked the audience one in return: 'How can we [Thames] stay alive?'
Gastronomics Restaurant owner

Kishan Raikwar was pressed about his tenure on the community board, but his closing address to the crowd perhaps best captured what voters looked for in a candidate

pirited spook causes great excitement, fear



As part of a Valley Profile series, **MEGHAN HAWKES** searches through old newspapers to bring you the stories Thames Valley locals once read about themselves.

1893

Turua, a ghost was at Alarge causing great excite-

The spirited spook was seen jumping fences, swimming in rivers, and heard knocking at doors and windows.

Nervous women and children, and men too, were very frightened. All attempts to capture the phantom had proved futile. In days of yore the local parson would have been called upon to exorcise the spirit. In these more sceptical times the spirit would be pulled up before a magistrate and fined, with seven day's gaol as an al-

Meanwhile, an excursion to Miranda promised to be a big success and tickets sold smartly. Many excursionists were anticipating a dip in the hot springs, believing that great good would result from the waters. The trip was recommended for several reasons. First it



was a short voyage, secondly, 11 hours could be spent in the interesting district; thirdly, the medicinal properties of the hot springs were unrivalled; fourthly, sports and horse races could be watched, and fifthly, those interested in coal mining could view some of the vast seams of coal found there; sixthly, the landing was a good wharf and

there would be no getting stuck

in mud, and lastly excursion-

ists would return to their own homes by 9pm to sleep soundly and well

At Waihī, a gale would long be remembered as one the roughest and wettest ever experienced. All day there was a continuous downpour of rain, but in the evening a hard wind from the east moved in and drove the rain along in perfect sheets of foam. About midnight the gale culminated in a terrific

squall of wind and rain, which lasted an hour. Chimneys were blown down, sheets of iron stripped off roofs, houses shifted from their foundations, with one or two blown over, while fences and outhouses were levelled to the ground. Two ladies in a spider buggy sheltered in some stables, the wind and rain being so bad that they dared not venture out all night. They remained there until daylight shivering in their wet clothes, as they could only cover themselves with some corn sacks.

The gale also saw off a plague of caterpillars at Waihī, the arrival of which had puzzled residents as there was nothing for them to eat but stunted fern and quartz boulders. After the gale they departed to places

Meanwhile at Paeroa a young lad, aged 10, having got tired of rural existence, saved up his money, and boarded a steamer bound for Auckland in order to see life. The amused captain took the boy's pound note for passage money and held on to it, cutting off his financial resources. On reaching Auckland the captain communicated with the police, and telegraphed the boy's father.

Acting-Detective Mahon put the boy on a steamer, and sent him back home again. The lad was very much disgusted, as he had planned on having a good

'Leaf' your mark at community planting day

The Te Mata Reserve at Waihī Beach is being brought back to life with thousands of native plants, and Western Bay of Plenty District Council is inviting people to get involved at a Community Planting Day this Saturday.

More than 19,000 plants, including

More than 19,000 plants, including kahikatea, puriri, ti kōuka (cabbage trees), harakeke (flaxes) and carex species are being planted as part of a wider restoration effort to improve stream health and replace vegetation removed during earlier erosion protection works.

Weed control and site preparation was carried out in July, including reshaping streambanks, and planting began last month.

"This restoration work will help pro-

"This restoration work will help protect the steam, improve local biodiver-

sity and create a more natural space for the community to enjoy," council's Water Services Project Engineer Divesh Sami said.

"The Community Planting Day is an opportunity for locals to come together, roll up their sleeves and contribute to the long-term care of Te Mata Reserve. It's a chance to give back, enjoy the outdoors and make a positive difference to the place where you live."

Muster to provide valuable insight

The annual Matuku Muster has returned for its second year, and it's set to provide more valuable insights into one of New Zealand's most elusive wetland birds – the critically threatened bittern (matukuhūrepo or kautuku).

This year's muster coincides with the recent launch of DOC's Always Be Naturing campaign – during Conservation Week – encouraging all New Zealanders to take action for nature.

A nationwide initiative run by Love Bittern - a charity organisation and community group promoting protection of the matuku-hūrepo - the Matuku Muster calls for volunteers and community groups to count and observe the cryptic and rare birds in wetlands across New Zealand.

There are estimated to be less than 1000 matuku-hūrepo nationally.

The particular focus is listening for the distinctive booming sound made by males. The muster helps identify and address gaps in the known matuku-hūrepo environment and how the birds use those spaces.

DOC Science Advisor Harry Caley says the contribution of volunteers involved in the first muster provided valuable data on the matuku-hūrepo population.

"The first Matuku Muster helped us understand more about the shape of matukuhūrepo populations and how they use their wetland habitats so we can help keep their homes healthy, and so they've got space to thrive," he said.

homes healthy, and so they've got space to thrive," he said.

"We want matuku-hūrepo populations to shift towards and beyond not being threatened by making sure their wetlands are healthy now and into the future."

Last year more than 500 volunteers across New Zealand counted 223 male birds at 462 sites. Finding females requires an entirely separate method still

being developed by researchers. However, they can sometimes be seen paired flying with males at sites across the country during the Muster.

ing the Muster.

"The muster is a way people can take action for nature. With more people involved we can reach more wetlands, count more birds and protect wetlands into the future - not just for bittern but for the animals that call them home.

"The previous Matuku Muster data helped us identify and address gaps in the known matuku-hūrepo environment," Harry said. "Our aim is for the species to survive in locations for several generations by providing optimal matuku-hūrepo habitats within each wetland network, maintaining those sites indefinitely, and adding or enhancing addition/enhancement of new sites for the birds."

Harry said repeating observations of matuku-hūrepo at sites also meant scientists could model the birds' abundance and determine their population status.

The first Matuku Muster revealed knowledge of the birds is more widespread than anticipated. Many matuku-hūrepo habitats observations are not on land managed by DOC.

Tt's not often I need to wear gumboots for Lan interview.

That's because it's not often I get to visit a

school that operates its classes on a farm.
Hauraki Plains College is the exception, and the classroom in question is Hayward Farm. The sun is out on August 21 as I drive down Kaihere Rd.

Dozens of students, some in overalls and gumboots, scatter along the 300 metre stretch of riverbank footpath from the college to the Hayward Farm entrance

The farm was purchased by the Haurakian Charitable Trust in 2018.

The trust was created in 2004 by a group of past students from Ngatea District High School and Hauraki Plains College, with a purpose to provide additional resourcing and opportunities to strengthen the educational, social and wellbeing outcomes for young people of Hauraki Plains College and the community. The farm was subdivided and 8.8 hectares was left for Hauraki Plains College to teach agriculture and horticulture to its students.

As I turn right into the farm's entrance one thing is clear to me: this is not a regular farm.

Students bound down the driveway ready

for the final block of the day.

Teacher in charge Primary ITO (Industry Training Organisation) Ag/Hort Trades Academy and Agriscience Bronwyn Dyer greets me as we walk to the clearing, where can see different sections of the farm.

There's a fruit orchard, chickens, stockyard, old milking shed, big barn, native trees, and a swarm of students ready to get

Bronwyn tells The Profile the point of Hayward Farm is to teach students skills that can be transferable to either an agriculture or horticulture environment, whether it's on a farm or used to support people in the primary sector.

The New Zealand economy is "crying out" for young people to work in these areas, Bronwyn says, so the farm helps inspire and pique that interest for students.

"It is also a place to give students a chance to learn something that they may never have had the chance to do without the farm.

All the students gather around us before they split into clusters at different stations.

We follow a group who are working with cattle alongside Agriculture teacher and Primary ITO AgHort trade academy teacher Brett Harris. The squelch of cow splats be-neath hooves and students' gumboots is the only reminder I need to position myself at

least three feet away from the stockyard. Students round up the cattle and prepare them to be weighed.

"They're very, very good at doing it. They don't need a lot of guidance from the teacher now because they've been doing it for so

long," Bronwyn says.
Their focus is to measure the animal's mass and mean weight, and check how many kilos it's gained in the past two

"They do that to make sure the animals are putting on weight and they might separate some that need a little bit of extra

There is currently extra land adjacent to Hayward Farm which the school uses to graze 120 dairy replacement R1s (rising one-year-olds) for the trust's new farm in Waitakaruru. The students and teachers look after the stock from a vulnerable age until they are ready for mating, she says

Students vaccinate, apply zinc boluses for facial eczema, weigh them to check their progress and drench them for worms, she says.

Students also help raise the school's 20 mixed age beef steers to R3 stage, which helps contribute to the running expenses of Hayward Farm, she says

Bronwyn points out that Brett is also a trained chainsaw tutor and teaches year 12 and 13 students how to operate the piece of machinery

'He just had a student that got a job straight out of school on \$45 an hour working with chainsaws.

It goes without saying, there is certainly a need for sectioned areas on the farm. That's why students are also equipped with the skills to build fences - they learn how to tie fence knots, put in posts and hang gates. At the next station, Hayward Farm manager and Primary In-

dustries assistant Chris de Beer helps a student tie an end knot. while others watch and learn until it's their turn on the tools. Safety goggles, concentration and patience are a must.

When the students graduate from school, Bronwyn says they'll be able to work for a fencer or do

their own farm work. Next to the fencing students, another group takes turns learning how to drive in the two little orange tractors. One student carefully maneuvers around the orchard and loops back for the next person to have their practice.

We toddle along to the fruit orchard by foot and see the next group of students with horticul-ture and sustainability teacher

Yotam Kay. The orchard is home to around 240 fruit trees made up of stone fruit, pip fruit, citrus, feijoa and the latest addition:

"We have just established a Gold Kiwifruit orchard thanks to the kind help from Owen Ruddell, who gave up his time to help the school, and KVH [Kiwifruit Vine Health] who gave us [a] kiwifruit licence," Bronwyn says.

The kiwifruit will be used to teach students how to manage a small, commercial-style orchard through the seasons from the establishment stage.

Students learn how to prune, thin and harvest all of the trees in the orchard. It's something I get to witness as the students use secateurs to tend to the lemon

Four buckets full of the citrusbounty will be donated to teachers, students and different departments to be used for hospitality.



One thing Yotam says he loves about being in the orchard is when students ask if they can eat

"Of course you can have some fruit. That's what it's all about."

But the farm just keeps on giving, with more opportunities everywhere I turn, including mini projects such as poultry raising, landscaping and plans for cowshed alterations.

One new project in the works was a market garden. On the other-side of the orchard boundary line, near the kiwifruit rows, they

plan to grow a market garden with vegetables such as potatoes, cabbages, carrots and pumpkins.

They will be used for hospitality, but also to donate and sell at cost so students will get to experi-ence everything from development to maintenance to harvest,

Every year, a soil professional visits the farm and teaches students and teachers how to take and read a soil test.

We then make decisions on what to apply to the orchard, Bronwyn says.

We are working on a no-pesticide spray programme and try to only use organic type fungicides. "This year we will trial phero-

mone spirals to find a way to reduce the need for insecticides.

There are also plans to establish a wetland area for students to learn about wetland management, and also to develop a running and cycling track around the farm for outdoor education, Bronwyn says, where horticulture students will plant native trees.

I can see her passion for the

subjects and students she teaches. It's something that makes this term a challenge for Bronwyn as she prepares to leave her role at Hauraki Plains College at the end of term three after almost a dec-ade of service to the school and students she loves.

Bronwyn will take on a new role to promote horticulture at Massey University as the stake-holder development officer for horticulture.

"My hope is to encourage peo-ple to look deeper at the exciting careers in horticulture with its many different avenues.

The Hauraki District Rugby League competition made its long-awaited return to Ngatea and Waitakaruru with a huge carnival day hosted across two venues – Ngatea Domain and Hauraki North RFC grounds, affectionately known as the Waitakaruru International Stadium.







Hometown support for Stag's shield success

When Southland Stags' Fletcher Morgan ran in a try during the squad's Ranfurly Shield win over Waikato in Hamilton, it was a proud moment, though one that came with split loyalties among his local supporters.

The left winger grew up in Waihi, but has been living down south for a few years and was named in the Stags in June. This meant there were a few torn allegiances during the August 31 match - "one foot in each camp" - but they nonetheless rooted for the player they knew best.

"It was super special," Fletcher said. "It's essentially my home province, so I had a massive support crew there... On the TV broadcast, I don't know how they did it, but it panned straight to my older brother who was up cheering with a crew of my family, so when I dotted down it was pretty cool. They were stoked that I could be doing them proud."

The Stags took the shield back down south for the first time in more than a decade, and despite losing it to Canterbury a week later, the shine was not dulled.

For Fletcher, holding the shield was a pinch-me moment, having grown up remembering the excitement surrounding the trophy.

"Jokingly, at the start of the year I said I wanted to win the Ranfurly Shield, and I remember



as a young fella when Southland last had it and what a buzz it was around Southland," he said.

"Being part of it and being just a contributor in a small way, it was a pinch-me moment, and the cherry on top was for [the game] to be in Waikato."

Involved with the Rugby Southland High Performance Group, Fletcher, 25, was part of the Heartland Championshipwinning Thames Valley side last

season. He played for the Highlanders Bravehearts earlier this year and trained with the All Blacks Sevens team.

He said contributing to the Stags and playing at a national level had been a long-time dream of his, and he was proud of how far he'd come.

far he'd come.

"This year for the Stags it's been about rewriting the script and being a different team to what Southland has been the last few

years, so to get an opportunity to go and play for the shield - number one, that was huge. Then to go up and win it, it was extra special.

"To everyone down here in Southland," he said, "it was incredible."

Fletcher spoke to *The Profile* ahead of the Stags' NPC home game against Counties Manukau on Sunday, but said the squad's goal was to keep progressing and focus on one match at a time.

"Southland hasn't won four games in a season in quite a long time, and we've won three [this season], so if we can focus on the game in front of us and pick up a victory then we're already rewriting the script on what we've done before."

And though the NPC fixtures have kept him busy on-field, Fletcher thanked his hometown supporters who managed to cheer for maroon and gold - even if they bled red, yellow, and black.

"I certainly feel it and hear all the messages," he said, "and when I get nervous going out to a game or anything like that, I just think of all the support that I've got behind me, and I just want to do everyone proud.
