# 25 reopens after bridge replacement

The morning commute will feel a lot smooth-The morning commute will feel a lot smooth-er for people travelling on SH25 along the Thames Coast, with the seven-day closure at Boundary Creek coming to an end last week.

NZ Transport Agency Waka Kotahi regional manager infrastructure delivery Darryl Coalter said crews worked extended hours during the closure to install a new bridge deck, with the state highway reopening on November 5

'After two weeks of work beneath the bridge repairing and strengthening the bridge supports, the road was closed so the old deck could be removed and a new one installed. By late Sunday night [November 2] the new bridge deck was in place and its topcoat of asphalt laid."

Mr Coalter said not only was the agency

pleased to get the job done within the timeframe, with the weather on its side, it was able to com-

plete more work than planned.

"In addition to installing the new bridge deck, we've been able to carry out additional works, meaning less disruption for traffic once the bridge reopens," he said.

Bridge expansion joints, crash barriers, and road marking were now in the process of being completed. The agency is also reminding people of upcoming daytime closures required on SH25A Kōpū-Hikuai from November 10-21.

State Highway 25A will be closed between 8am and 5pm, Monday to Saturday. The road

will open to traffic under single lane and stop/go each evening from 5pm and on Sunday, Novem-

ber 16. Delays can be expected. Meanwhile, SH25 at Moana Anu Anu Bridge in Whangamatā is now closed for five weeks, with a local detour in place.

#### In Brief

#### **FATAL CRASH**

Two people died following a crash on State Highway 2, Karangahake, on November 5. Police were alerted to the crash between Jackson Rd and Rahu Rd at 11.40pm. "A car collided with a power pole and tragically both the driver and passenger were killed," Police said. Enquiries into the circumstances of the crash are under way. SH2 was closed overnight and reopened early on November 6.

#### **UNEXPLAINED DEATH**

Police said enquiries were continuing on November 10 after a death at a residential property on Kerepēhi Town Road, Kerepēhi, on November 7. "The death is currently being treated as unex-plained," Police said. "A scene examination has been concluded, and enquiries are ongoing."

# St John ambulance station officially opens

The new, state-of-the-art station has already been operational for some time, with staff working from the site since August - a fact which was quickly highlighted when the alarms went off mid-speech, prompting an on-duty officer to head off to a call. November's event, however, was a chance for the organisation to celebrate the many years of hard work involved in making the new station a reality.
St John chancellor John

Whitehead unveiled the plaque commemorating the occasion, following which Brad Mitchell from Mitchell Construction handed over the keys to the building. Blessings and speeches rounded out the formal ceremony.

The afternoon featured open hours, allowing the community to take a peek at the inside of the building. It contains a two-vehicle ambulance bay, bedrooms, offices, a meeting room, kitchen, and lounge.

The staff's favourite thing about the building, though, is less tangible.

"It's a place for them to rest,

to restock, recharge, and to feel safe," group operations manager Julia Te Huia said.

'Look how far we've come from bars on the windows, leaks in the walls when the rain falls... Once, I came in in the morning and one of the beds was absolutely saturated because the rain had leaked on to the bed where somebody had been sleeping. We don't have to put up with that anymore. So we're very grateful.'

The new building has been two decades in the making,

with the Waihī area committee working tirelessly on their fundraising efforts since then.

There have been many, many area committee members to make this project work," area committee chair Kris Purden



# Swimmer shines on world stage

Hauraki Plains College student Rylee Sayer made her international debut with New Zealand's national swimming team, the Aquablacks, at the World Para Swimming Championships in Singapore in September, and what a debut it was.

The 17-year-old competed in four individual events - the Women's 50m Freestyle S7, Women's 100m Freestyle S7, Women's 100m Breaststroke SB7 and Women's 50m Butterfly S7 - and came away with three top-eight finishes and two personal bests.

"[It felt] like a dream come true, it made all the hard work and sacrifices finally pay off," Rylee said.

"I was super nervous in my first race. The call room was really intimidating as you are so close to some amazing athletes who are world record holders. [But] I placed sixth overall and it made me realise that I did deserve to be there and was competitive."

The event came only 18 months after Rylee finished

for the cancer which claimed her right arm. But despite the fatigue of her health battles, Rylee kept pushing towards her goals.

Reaching the Para Swimming

Championships was empowering not only for its place on the world stage, but also because Rylee was able to meet other athletes with challenges to overcome.

"There are so many disabili-

ties there. Some of the S1 and S2 athletes are crazy - to see them swim is truly inspiring," Rylee

or sharing a lane in warm-up. It

was a little surreal.

"[I feel like] I have found my people. To be surrounded by others who don't notice disability was great."

Rylee has also been named her school's Sportsperson of the Year, an honour she was surprised to receive.

"We have some really amazing athletes at Hauraki Plains College who have competed on the world stage too so I genuinely had no idea that it would be me," Rylee said.
"There are lets of people here

"There are lots of people here who are a big part of my journey so to be recognised in front of them was super special."



# Halfway mark for \$40m plant

Council's \$40 million Paeroa Wastewater Treatment Plant reached the halfway mark recently and is expected to be finished on time and on budget.

Council chief executive David Speirs said it was pleasing to see the flow on effect for the local economy, with more than 14 local businesses and contractors supporting the biggest infrastructure build in council's history. To celebrate the halfway mark, a barbecue lunch was hosted by the

contractor, Spartan Construction, followed by a site visit to view pro-

Mr Speirs said the last time he was at the site, the focus was on drilling and pouring hundreds of concrete piles to stabilize the ground before any building could

ground before any building could occur, so there wasn't much to see.

"At the 50 per cent completion mark, above ground progress is well underway with sludge tanks, filters and filter tanks all under construction. The site is really taking shape and looks great," he said.

A Spartan Construction spokes-person said the build had been

challenging but they were making good progress. It was complex in-frastructure, including civil, struc-tural, and mechanical and electrical engineering aspects.

We would also like to take the opportunity to thank all of the local businesses who have supported the project."

The project includes the con-struction of a new screening system; concrete aeration tanks over six metres in height; membrane bioreactor technology; new equip-ment and administration buildings; 240kL sludge storage tanks; sludge dewatering; chemical dos-ing and numerous other ancillary structures.

Forming part of council's 10-year, \$100 million investment in wastewater infrastructure across the district that began in 2022, the upgrade is sized to meet Paeroa's growth needs up to 2035 in its first phase, with provisions made for stage two growth catering to 2050 requirements, council said. Construction will continue through to early 2026 with the new plant scheduled to be fully commissioned around mid-2026.

# Meeting held for proposed rezoning

Waihī Beach residents met last month to talk about the proposed rezoning of the Beach Rd Recreation Reserve, which Pinnacle Incorporated, a not-for-profit primary healthcare organisation, has applied to Western Bay of Plenty District Council to

The proposal would see a medical centre and associated parking occupy around 30 per cent of the reserve, located between Beach Rd and Marine Ave, and resident Peter Bullock said the group met with re-elected councillor Allan Sole to discuss their concerns.

"Unfortunately many more questions remain unanswered due to a lack of detail available

within the council planning department," Bullock said.
Cr Sole told *The Profile* the Oc-

tober 12 meeting went well.

"The people were extremely respectful. They have sincere concerns," he said.

Cr Sole said consultation about

the proposal was to take place over two months; a starting date yet to be confirmed. He encouraged all those who had a view on the issue, "be it for or against", to make a submission.

"I did encourage those at the meeting to make practical, con-structive comments, and suggest other options for the medical centre. I'm sure they will do that as they are very sincere people, he said.

"I understand that the practice

owners are keen to tell their story and why they selected that site."
Primary Health Care Ltd, the

parent company for Pinnacle Ventures - the owner of the Pri-mary Health Care Ltd group of general practices - earlier said its current facility on Wilson Rd was "no longer fit for purpose"

"no longer fit for purpose".

Business manager Mark Taylor said the organisation was work-

ing closely with Western Bay of Plenty Council and "will be guid-ed by their plans and processes". He said the organisation planned to hold a community meeting and encouraged resi-dents to roise concerns or ask dents to raise concerns or ask questions at that time.

# Peculiar case of poisoning eventually solved



As part of a Valley Profile series, MEGHAN HAWKES searches through old newspapers to bring you the stories Thames Valley locals once read about themselves.

#### 1875

A most peculiar case of poisoning occurred at Thames. Dr Von Mirbach was called in to see a young man, employed at the Post Office, who had been ill some two or three days.

The doctor found his patient very feverish and delirious, but with no fever symptoms.

He prescribed for him, but the next day found him much worse. Dr Von Mirbach then came to the conclusion that the young man had been poisoned, but could not discover any food likely to be the cause.

The doctor's second visit took place in the bedroom, and there he quickly discovered the source of the illness. The room was papered with a coarsegrained green paper, very commonly used and known to contain arsenic. He immediately administered antidotes and although they worked, the young man was in a very dangerous

condition for some time.

arsenic dye in the 19th century.

He had inhaled quite a quantity of poisonous matter from the evaporation of the arsenical colouring of the paper before medical assistance had been sought. The doctor took a piece of the paper, which had been recently put on the wall, and, in the presence of Mr Brittain, chemist, analysed it.

It was found to contain a large quantity of arsenic. The walls of the bedroom were immediately denuded of the obnoxious covering, and the place thoroughly cleaned. Two other gentlemen who were sleeping in the same room experienced no ill effects, but their beds were near the window. The public were warned to exercise care in the selection of their wallpaper.

Over at Mackaytown, one of the greatest inconveniences was the want of a Post Office and some regular mode of conveying the mail from Paeroa.

Scarcely a day passed when anxious inquiries were made after missing letters. This was a terrible annoyance to businessmen who regularly received letters announcing the shipment of goods days after the arrival of the goods themselves. The government was called upon to arrange some plan for convey-

ing the mail to Mackaytown leaving it at some stated place, where people might know where to look for their letters.

This would remove the evil and would do until a permanent Post Office was arranged.

Meanwhile, a visitor to Paeroa observed that the settlement consisted of a store and grog shop, a butcher's, a baker's, a cheap boarding house, and a number of tents.

Men were engaged in constructing two or three wooden buildings, the warehouses for a drapery, grocery and groggery.

Austin's store was the central point, and would do a very excellent business were it not for the gross incivility of the proprietor.

The visitor had heard previous to his arrival of the semi-barbarous nature of this individual, but was not prepared for the insolence which he met with there.

At an encampment of miners, the scene at night was very romantic. The tents were all illuminated, and from one came strains of melody from a strange mixture of instruments the only distinguishable one being a big drum beaten with a vigorous arm.

In other tents, the diggers were amusing themselves by playing cards, discussing the prevailing topics or speculating on their chances of finding



# Paeroa 150th marked with tree planting

A new tree in Paeroa Domain bears a plaque commemorating 150 years of Paeroa and the surrounding district.

Members of the Paeroa
Historical Society gathered
in the Domain on October 23
to witness the planting, along
with dignitaries including
representatives from Ngāti
Tamaterā, Hauraki District
Mayor Toby Adams, former
Hauraki District Mayor Basil
Morrison, and members of
long-standing local families.

Paeroa was named in 1875,

when a Deed of Cession was signed by Ngāti Tamaterā chiefs and representatives of the Governor of New Zealand.

The February 17 signing allowed the 132,175-acre area of land known as the Ohinemuri Block to be mined for gold.

The township of Paeroa remained part of Thames County until 1915, when it was gazetted as a borough.

The new tree planted to mark the milestone, a Claret Ash, was gifted to the town by the historical society. Before planting, the tree was blessed by kaumātua Apanui Skipper - a descendant of one of the original signers of the deed.

The planting was carried out by the society's curator, Laurie Smith, and two local tamariki (children), Graeson Pakinga and Nyah McShane.

"It's nice to have both sides, the young ones, the old ones," society president Gaye Cleave said

"It's a good representation of the community as a whole."

The plaque was laid by John Strange.

# Living Well Trust goes solar

Thames' Living Well Trust has taken a major step toward a more sustainable and resilient future with the installation of a 29.7kW solar power system at its community hub on Mary St.

For more than 30 years, the trust has been a lifeline for the marginalised, isolated, and homeless - providing meals, mentoring, school programmes, and the Thames Community Foodbank.

Now, with the help of Meridian's Community Decarbonisation Fund and local partner Adams Electrical, the organisation is turning sunshine into savings, freeing up resources for the people who need them most.

The new solar installation includes 66 high-efficiency panels, and battery storage providing 19.2kWh of usable capacity. Together, the system is expected to generate over 41,000kWh of clean energy each year, cutting the Trust's power bills by an estimated \$5800 annually - and more than \$124,000 over its lifetime based on best estimates.

The environmental gains are equally significant: each year, the system will avoid around five tonnes of CO<sub>2</sub> emissions, the equivalent of 912 trees planted or 447,000 car kilometres avoided.

Living Well Trust team lead Ed-

Living Well Trust team lead Eddie Churton said the project was about much more than energy

even in an emergency. It's about making sure our most vulnerable whānau are never left without support."

port."
The Thames Coromandel District Council has also recognised the Trust's facilities - including a planned new shower - as vital for Civil Defence readiness, contributing funding to ensure the site can operate as a community support base during emergencies.

"A huge thank you to Meridian Energy for providing the bulk of the funding through their Community Decarbonisation Fund, to Thames Coromandel District Council for their generous support, and to Adams Electrical for their outstanding work installing the system and tidying up our electrical infrastructure," Eddie said.

"This has truly been a team efort."

The trust hoped its solar initiative would inspire other community organisations to explore renewable energy, Eddie said.

newable energy, Eddie said. "Sustainability and compassion can walk hand in hand.

"By going solar, we're not just reducing costs - we're showing our community what's possible."

Over the past year, Living Well Trust has provided: 1430 meals through "Tasty Tuesday"; 1068 food parcels (around 17,088 meals) from the Foodbank; 4534 visits to the Open Door drop-in; 5800+ young people engaged through resilience and mentoring programmes in schools.



# Stop the itch before it starts

Pests, Big Problems for Pets Fleas might be small, but they can cause big headaches

for you and your pets. These little bloodsuckers can infest cats, dogs, and even your home. A single flea can lay up to 50 eggs a day - so it doesn't take long for a small problem to turn into a full-blown infestation!

Pets with fleas often scratch, bite, or lick themselves constantly. You might spot hair loss, red or irritated skin, or tiny black specks (flea dirt) in their coat. In heavy infestations, fleas can cause skin infections, allergic reactions, or even anaemia - especially in young, frail, or elderly pets. And don't be fooled - fleas don't just bite pets, they'll happily snack on humans too! Once they're in your home, flea eggs can hide in bedding, carpets, and furniture for


A flea comb revealed flea dirt, and a skin test confirmed flea allergy dermatitis. After a vet-recommended flea treatment and a thorough house clean, Leo's skin healed and his coat grew back within two weeks. Treating both the pet and the environment made all the difference.

Flea prevention checklist: Firstly, treat your pet: Act fast if you spot fleas. Ask your vet which product suits your pet best - spot-ons, tablets. or collars all work differently.

Also treat your home: vacuum regularly, wash bedding, and use sprays or bombs if needed.

Lastly, stay on top of it: Keep flea treatments going year-round. Prevention is far easier (and cheaper!) than dealing with an infestation.

# Lifetime of culinary love shared

iz Cameron has a saying: L"So many recipes, so little time"

Her husband jokes that she never makes the same meal twice - a sign of her lifelong love of tasting and experimenting, now being served up in the form of her first cookbook. Hailing from the Coroman-

del, Liz is a former home economist and food consultant, and cooking has always been on the front burner ever since she was

She grew up on a South Otago sheep farm in the 1950s and 60s, where one of her earliest memories is of her mum making ice cream, coloured green at Liz's request.

In 1963, when she turned 15, she was given her first cookbook, and a few years after that, she left home to study for a Diploma in Home Science at Otago University, graduating in 1968. "[I] then went to teachers college in Epsom. I taught sewing and cooking in Auckland, then in Vanuatu and Fiji, coming to Coromandel in 1975, where I taught Home Economics at the area school.

Liz said the two years she spent in the islands taught her a lot about other cuisines during a time when New Zealand's own tastebuds were "still very simple".

So it was eye-opening for me to see different dishes and different ingredients being used," she said.

"Sometimes, it just seemed pointless to cook lots of food just to photograph the result, but early this year I decided to make a concerted effort and get it done, so I spent three-four months working hard on it. I set myself a timeframe and kept at it, then sent it to Debbie Morgan, a graphic designer who did a wonderful job."

Liz said the most challenging aspect of collating her book was writing the recipes and making sure they were consistent and easy to follow

She couldn't pin down a favourite among them, and instead said she simply loved try-

ing new recipes.


Thames MAD's new presi-

# Tech solution for forestry road safety

Porestry roads nationwide are set to become safer, thanks to a new agreement between WorkSafe New Zealand and one of the country's largest forest management companies.

Forest360 Ltd has agreed to fund a range of actions in response to a death on one of its sites.

Fifty-nine-year-old Greg Stevens was killed when his logging truck and trailer rolled while negotiating a tight bend on a Coromandel forestry road in May, 2023.

WorkSafe's investigation

WorkSafe's investigation found the design, maintenance, and risk assessment of the road by Forest360 was inadequate.

The company's funded response forms a binding commitment, known as an enforceable undertaking (EU), which WorkSafe has accepted.

It comprises an investment of more than \$400,000 including: Funding research to develop a method to assess forestry road safety; sponsoring software development to help forest owners and operators identify unsafe road conditions; and promoting the software and sharing insights with the forestry sector, including at conferences and through the Forest Industry Safety Council.



Forest360 will also donate to education programmes through Discover Forestry and to Wāhine in Forestry; and pay amends to Greg Stevens' wid-

"Many forestry roads in New Zealand are old and potentially unsafe, having been built decades ago to outdated engineering standards," WorkSafe's Head of Regulatory Services Tracey Conlon said.

"The software development

has the potential to transform how forestry roads are assessed for safety.

"By making cutting-edge technology accessible across the industry, Forest360's initiatives could significantly reduce risk and save lives."

Forestry was a priority for WorkSafe as it had the highest fatality rate of any sector in 2024, she said.

"Our role is to influence businesses to meet their responsi-

bilities to keep people healthy and safe."

This was the first time Work-Safe has accepted such a commitment from the forestry sector, she said.

EUs are a way for WorkSafe to hold businesses accountable for health and safety breaches.

WorkSafe monitors progress on the agreed commitments and can seek a court order if they are not upheld.

Two other businesses remain

before the court in relation to the death of Gregory Albert Stevens.

In a statement, Forest360's managing director Dan Gaddum said Forest360 deeply regretted the tragic loss of a logging truck driver employed by one of its subcontractors, who was fatally injured while operating on a forestry road under its control.

"Our thoughts remain with his family, colleagues, and community," he said.

"We take our responsibilities for contractor safety management extremely seriously, and this incident has strengthened our resolve to lead improvement across the industry.

"Sometimes it's less about dwelling on what went wrong, and more about doing something meaningful to stop it happening again."

Through the EU, Forest360 was investing in technologies such as LiDAR (Light Detection and Ranging), machine learning, and drone-based road assessments to better identify and manage road risks, he said.

"Our goal is to deliver safer outcomes for everyone working in and around our forests, and to share what we learn to lift safety performance across the wider sector."

# Students to present at sedge grass trial event

Ctudents from Mangatāwhiri School Ovisited Waitakaruru stream to undertake water quality monitoring recently ahead of a Field Day for farmers and landowners on November 13.

Organised by the Western Firth Catchment Group in partnership with the wider Piako Waihou Catchment Trust, the results will be used as benchmark data for a planting project, demonstrating the effectiveness of planting native sedges to improve water quality and increase biodiversity.

The students undertook several tests to monitor the health of the stream, including; clarity, temperature, conductivity, and stream flow, along with recording habitat observations and the presence of macro-invertebrates.

They also learned about eDNA testing, a tool which allows the identification of species present in and around a waterway.

Follow-up testing will be done periodically over several years to monitor improvements in stream health.

Leading the stream monitoring work is Kelly Deihl from the Western Firth Catchment Trust.

She hoped the "easily replicable project" could be rolled out in other schools across the region as funding

allowed. "Educating kids about the health of waterways and allowing them to see for themselves the impact shading water has on creating habitats suitable for native species is a fantastic way of empowering future generations with the tools and motivation to make choices which support our natural environment," Deihl said.

The Field Day and information event for farmers and landowners will be held at Waitakaruru Hall from 11am until 3pm on November 13. It will include a presentation by students of the data collected, as well as a talk from farmer Johan van Ras, sharing his experience planting waterways.

This will be followed by an on-site farm visit to see the new planting.

Peter Roberts, Chair of the Western Firth Catchment Trust, said farmers were "practical people running a busi-"From what we saw in the Piako Catchment, sedge grasses offer a sensible, practical and cost-effective way to achieve freshwater outcomes.

"This is why, as a Catchment Group, we chose to trial them here and why we want to share this information with our local farmers. Shade and temperature reduction on our small waterways offer huge benefits"

Matt Vare, Catchment Lead for the Piako Waihou Catchment Trust, is also keen for farmers and landowners to learn more about the benefits of shading waterways.

"The benefits are significant, including increasing habitat for native species, reducing algae bloom, deterring aquatic weeds and invasive koi carp, and decreasing bank erosion and sediment - this can reduce the need for expensive excavation of blocked

drains," he said.



Iwas about 10 years old, out tramping in the Kaimai Ranges with my dad, my

brother, and my uncle.

It was an epic trip.

It all happened near a bridge. We needed water, so my brother and I took the little track down to the river.

He filled the bottles while I looked for a faster way up because, of course, everything was a competition back then. That's when I saw it.

Halfway up, things were going well. Near the top, I reached forward - and slipped.

forehead slammed straight into the rock. I grabbed my head and when I pulled my hand away, it was bright red and dripping.

When I got back to Dad, dazed and bleeding, he just looked at me and shook his head. And that moment stuck

See, shortcuts can be brilliant... but sometimes they come at a cost.

In life, we often try to push the pace - in our careers, our relationships, our goals. We want results now.

But sometimes, in our rush, we miss the safer track. We bypass wisdom and end up flat on our face, hurting ourselves or others in the process.

It's not that taking action is wrong. Far from it - I'm a big fan of momentum.

But it's about knowing which action to take. The wise ones

take time to assess: shortcut really saving time, or will it cost me more in the long run?

So before you go chasing the fast way forward - stop, breathe. and check your footing.

Because sometimes, shortcut becomes the long cut.

# Chaotic weekends for Thames police



By RON AGNEW

In the 1970s and 80s, policing the Thames area on busy weeks and weekends could be quite chaotic.

With only five policemen and two traffic officers, Alan Austin and Colin Malloy, stationed here, providing 24-hour cover seven days a week for the area, it could be quite exhausting as each policeman and traffic officer worked by themselves on one-man shifts, though supported by a member of our great group of civilian civil Defense police personal on Friday and Saturday nights.
With drinking and driving being

more generally accepted in society at that time, motor accidents were very common in the wider area, many of them being fatal ones, especially on the Kōpū-Hikuai and Hauraki Plains.

However there were few police cars, Thames only had one with no siren, and a little red roof light which went round and round. The three country stations had no police cars and had to use their family car, their mileage being reimbursed by the police.

Our area to the north was up the Thames Coast to Wilsons Bay, where the sole constable at Coromandel, Horrie Chesnutt, took over. Our boundary to the south went to Omahu, halfway between Puriri and Hikutaia, where the two Paeroa policemen, Paul Sherriff and Brian Dunn took over. In the west, our area stopped at the Kōpū Bridge, where the sole policeman at Ngatea, Bob Cuthbert, took over, policing a huge area of the Hauraki Plains with one traffic officer, Gavin Ballantyne, similarly resident in Ngatea. It could be a very busy station, with the higher speeds of busy state highways running through their area.

However, on quieter evenings in the early hours, we knew where to head for a cup of tea and a chat. The Toyota car factory security gate at night had

a day. Oscar Wilton was often the night security officer and did enjoy company. Similarly, the boiler man at the hospital boilers who manned the huge boilers there 24 hours a day, and lot of our confiscated cannabis was disposed of

Probably our favorite though, was the hospital kitchen where the day's unused food and meals had to put out and disposed of at midnight each night by the staff. We were usually very keen to help the kitchen staff dispose of these, being past their use by date.

It seems quite funny to me now, but often, early on weekend evenings, people would call in, or phone and request while on patrol, that police call in to the parties occurring that night, mostly at private homes, to deter gate crashers and the uninvited from the vicinity. Especially if they were being organised by ladies who may be worried, after the pubs emptied out.

One of our tasks was to try and get to every hotel in the area of an evening, to be a presence, and gauge the likelihood of trouble later on at closing time. We had eight pubs in our area, Tapu, Lady Bowen, Junction, Salutation, Imperial, Warrick Arms, Kōpū and Puriri. We knew which ones were likely to have trouble, and the Burger Bar at 10.30pm was often the site of flash points occurring. However, the owner there would often look after himself and did let go one night with hot fat, at an aggressive intoxicated male who tried to jump the counter. He offered free chips for us when ordering our meal, if we would hang out there or in the vicinity at pub closing time.

However, a Crown Solicitor when visiting the station for a large drugs case was horrified about this being the start of corruption! In my time in the Police, there was never ever any suggestion that any such thing existed in New Zea-

land Policing.

Drinking, and hotels, were a very common and accepted activity in society in years gone by, and many intoxicated people poured out on to the streets at 10.30pm in high spirits, and at times aggressively so. On occasions, reports of fights were coming in faster than we, in the one police car, could get round to them. Our aim was to try and get people off the streets and home, as fast as we could. Especially during the busy summer months.







performing well - not results," she said. Alysha still made the ball final and qualified first for the ribbon final; owever, she admitted it took some hindsight to truly feel proud of those achievements.

"Looking ahead to future comps, I need to realise why I decided to go back to gymnastics in the first place. "I'm back because I absolutely love

it and I want to make the most of this while I still can; medals and placings should be seen as a bonus now, not an

expectation," she said.
Alysha stepped away from the sport

raki Plains College, complete a Diploma in Professional Scuba Instruction, and work for Dive Zone Whitianga.

She said she's lived her life with gymnastics and without it, and enjoyed her life with it "a lot more". So, she's embarking on the Austral-

ian Nationals yet again, as well as trials in February for a tour to Japan. "Maybe it's because it has been part

of my identity for so long it was hard to adjust to a life without it, maybe it was because I genuinely love it, maybe I missed being an athlete and all the people and experiences that came with it, or maybe it was just the fact I truly felt like I was not done," she told The

Profile.
"I still had more to give, and thank god I decided that was the case because imagine what I would've missed out on. I have to do a quick reality check though," she added. "It has been an incredibly busy year and there were times I was on the verge of burnout."

Alysha said she "pretty much lived" out of her suitcase for four months and spent a lot of late nights driving and early mornings training before work. She said she was looking forward to

spending a few weeks of summer stay-

ing in one place - the Coromandel.


"I still have big goals in both diving and gymnastics, but I also have goals that go beyond either of these.
