Five arrested in drug bust operation

Waikato East Police arrested and charged five people when executing search warrants in relation to suspected local drug suppli-

Approximately 16 staff from the Waikato East Criminal Investigation Branch, Prevention and Public Safety Team undertook warrants for drug offending in Whangamata, Matamata and Te Aroha this month.

Two warrants in Whangamatā turned up 20 bags of meth. A 34-year-old local man has been charged with possessing methamphetamine for supply and obstructing police. He is due in Waihī District Court on March 23, and further charges are likely.

During a search warrant in Kennedy Bay, a man was charged with possession of cannabis for supply, cultivating cannabis and unlawful possession of a firearm. He is due to appear in the Thames District Court on January 13.

Staff also located a suspected clandestine lab in Paeroa and the specialist clandestine lab team attended to process the scene.

A 44-year-old man was arrested and remanded in custody on charges of possession of equipment and material intended for manufacturing methamphetamine. He is remanded in custody to appear in the Hamilton District

Court on January 9.

It is expected that further analysis of the items seized during the search of the property will provide evidence of methamphetamine manufacturing at the address.

In Matamata, two women from separate addresses were arrested and charged with supplying methamphetamine. They are due to appear in Hamilton District Court on January 5 and 15.

A series of search warrants were also executed at storage units and a residential property in Te Aroha, which will form part of on-going investigations into the supply of methamphetamine in the town and surrounding area.

Waikato Eastern Area Commander Inspector Hywel Jones said the aim of the operation was to disrupt local drug networks, hold dealers and suppliers accountable, and to reassure the community that police are listening and will act. "People see the harm that these drugs are causing in their whānau and communities.

"We hope this news of our operation will let people know what's happening, and prompt them to tell us about any suspicious activity, Inspector Jones said.

DETAILS: If you see suspicious behaviour, report it to Police on 111. Information can also be reported via105, either online or over the phone.

FATAL INCIDENT

A person has died after an incident involving a commercial mower in Te Kouma, Coromandel, police said. Emergency services were called to the scene on Te Kouma Rd about midday on December 18. Despite the best efforts of staff and members of the public, the person sadly died at the scene. The death has been referred to WorkSafe and the Coroner.

SPEED LIMIT CHANGES

New speed limits have been introduced in Karangahake and Waihī after a recent speed review was undertaken by NZ Transport Agency Waka Kotahi (NZTA). A 2.8km stretch of State Highway 2 (SH2) in the Karangahake Gorge between Albert St and Wait-awheta Rd has been reduced to 60km per hour. In Waihī, a stretch of Perry Palm Ave on SH2 has also been reduced to 60km per hour, between Dean Cres and the Martin St/Bader St intersection. NZTA director of regional relationships for the Waikato and Bay of Plenty Andrew Corkill said the consultation process ran for six weeks and showed mixed views, but highlighted strong community support for safer speeds, especially near busy intersections and local






hī mining project crosses final hurdle

OceanaGold's Waihī North mining project has been ap-proved by an expert panel under the government's Fast-Track Approvals Act, it was announced on December 18.

The Waihī North Project will involve exploration drill sites within Department of Conservation land, including four ventilation shafts and four new geotechnical drilling sites; a new underground mine at Wharekirauponga approximately 10km north of OceanaGold's current Waihī operation site; a new open pit at Gladstone Hill; and a third tailings storage facility. The Waihī North Project will ex-

tend mining at Waihī until around the year 2040, and will provide significant economic benefits for Waihī, the Hauraki District and

New Zealand, OceanaGold says.
OceanaGold also outlined its intent to establish an \$8.4 million predator control and ecological enhancement project called the Waihī North Biodiversity Project, in addition to any mandated environmental protection requirements in the application.

The approval of the mining project is subject to a number of conditions to be imposed on Oceana-Gold, which are outlined in the expert panel's 346-page decision

report.
The decision report also noted the panel had taken into consideration 22 submissions it received on the draft conditions, which were released on November 2

executive Gerard Bond said the Fast-Track Approvals Act process was tough but welcome. "This new legislation provides the efficiency and certainty of a very clear timeline, while maintaining stakeholder involvement and the necessary rigour, oversight and expert scru-

tiny of the company's proposals." OceanaGold had a proven 35-year track-record of working with-

in a tight regulatory framework, he said. "This includes obligations relating to vibration, noise, dust, ground surface stability, biodiversity, and water management.

However, mining opposition group Coromandel Watchdog said the approval was "a crime against the environment", and said it planned to keep fighting the pro-ject. The group held a "Rally for Resistance" on December 20 at the site of the future entrance to the Wharekirauponga underground mine. "It legitimises more toxic waste, more damage to biodiversity and more profits will head off-shore," chair Catherine Delahunty

"[It] includes blasting and vibration under sensitive land and species, and threatens the forest



through dewatering and subsid-

Gerard said both he and OceanaGold recognised the ecological value of the Wharekirauponga area. "This is a key driver for the mine being underground and accessed by a tunnel from outside the Forest Park area, minimising any impacts at the surface.

ฟัลihī North is one of three mining projects to be approved under the Fast-Track Approvals Act so far. On December 11, approval was also granted for the develop-ment of a 60-metre deep quarry in Drury, Auckland, alongside the existing Drury Quarry; and on December 18 an expansion to the Kings Quarry operation in Wainui, Auckland, was also approved.





Paeroa school celebrates 125th birthday

St Joseph's Catholic School in Paeroa Celebrated its 125th birthday in November, with celebratory activities spanning several days in Term 4.

'The children came dressed for the year 1900 and the teachers donned the brown habits that the Sisters wore 'back

in the day'," principal Emaline Cull said. "Meanwhile our school library was transformed to a museum, showcasing children's learning about our foundation story, the Sisters and the Josephite charism, or way of expressing their faith, which is still alive at our school today.

A Jubilee Mass was held on November 29th, which was attended by the school, members of the community, and past students and teachers.

Following the Mass, the school's new Jubilee Garden and pouwhenua were blessed by Fr Tovio, Matua Eru, Sister Paula, and Sister Roseleen.



The ceremony also acknowledged the friends, whānau, tutors and employers who supported each graduate throughout their training.





Women scarred for life by skipper's actions

Pukekohe man Travis Vernon Whiteman, 25, was fined \$7200 on December 11 for seriously injuring two passengers in a boating incident near the Alderman Islands on Christmas

Whiteman, who was convicted in the Thames District Court on two charges of careless operation of a vessel under the Maritime Transport Act 1994, was also ordered to pay \$8000 in reparation to the two women.

Waikato Regional Council, through its Harbourmaster functions, brought the charges after an investigation found the skipper failed to ensure the vessel's propeller was stopped while recovering swimmers from the water.

The two women, visiting from Sydney, sustained serious leg injuries requiring surgery and have permanent scarring. Both women have name sup-

pression.

The court heard the skipper had been drinking alcohol dur-ing the day and believed the engine was in neutral when reversing toward the swimmers.

He initially pleaded not guilty but changed his plea to guilty

before the trial. "This incident was entirely avoidable," Regional Compliance Manager Patrick Lynch said. "What should have been a fantastic day out has turned to near tragedy. This incident shows how dangerous it is to leave an engine running when there are people in the water.

"Skippers must realise they bear full responsibility for passenger safety, and alcohol can

severely impair judgement." Waikato Regional Council urges all skippers to follow safe boating practices, avoid alcohol while operating vessels, and ensure engines are off when swimmers are in the water.

Fines, community service in effluent cases

Two farmers and two farming companies have been convicted and fined a total of \$108,000 for environmental offending after three separate prosecutions were taken by Waikato Regional Council under the Resource Management der the Resource Management

Stella Farming Ltd, LTB Farms Ltd, Scott Blundell and Michael Davison all faced charges relating to unlawful discharges of dairy effluent through improper use of irrigators and were fined \$44,000, \$26,000, \$2000 and \$36,000 respectively by Judge Jeff Smith in the Huntly District Court on

December 1.

Mr Blundell, an employee of LTB Farms, was also sentenced to 100 hours community ser-

Stella Farming Ltd faced an additional charge for failing to exclude stock from a waterway.

All the breaches occurred be-tween March and August 2024 in the wider Te Awamutu area.

Waikato Regional Compliance Manager Patrick Lynch said: "Effluent irrigation is a critical part of dairy farm management, but when it's done in-correctly, it can cause negative impacts on waterways".

All farmers have a responsibility to ensure their systems are fit for purpose and operated correctly

Waikato Regional Council remains committed to ensuring compliance with environmental regulations and protecting the

region's waterways and land from harmful discharges

Meanwhile, Dairy farming company Tihiroa Farms Limited has been convicted and fined \$37,750 for unlawful discharge of effluent into the environment.

The sentence was imposed in Hamilton by District Court Judge Melinda Dickey on November 21 as a result of a prosecution taken under the

Resource Management Act by Waikato Regional Council.
Council officers conducted an inspection at a farm near Otorohanga in September last year where Tihiroa Farms Limited is employed as a share milker.

The officers found dairy ef-fluent discharged from an irrigator was causing an overland flow directly into the Ongaruhe

"Despite having adequate effluent infrastructure in place on the farm, the defendant had failed to put in place robust management practices to prevent against discharges into nearby waterways. The impacts on this stream were significant," Mr Lynch said.







Christmas ain't what it used to be'



As part of a Valley Profile series, **MEGHAN HAWKES** searches through old newspapers
to bring you the stories Thames Valley locals once read about themselves.

"Christmas ain't what is used to be in my young days", reminisced an old timer from Thames in 1925.

"The trouble is that we are getting too respectable. They would want to turn out the military now if we had one of the old-time Christmas Eve celebrations about the time that Thames goldfields was at its best."

A steady stream of men would head for Auckland - the loggers down from the timber camps, gum diggers from the gum fields, and miners from Thames and Coromandel, all with good cheques to spend.

The last steamer to leave Thames on Christmas Eve was always packed. On one occasion there was fear that the steamer would turn turtle, there was such a crowd on board. Men sat at the stern with their boots off, ready to swim for it. When they reached Auckland wharf there was a mob of Thames boys waiting to show the new arrivals to their loďgings.

"Some cranks used to go round singing carols on Christmas morning early. Now, when a fellow was recovering from a night out with a bad head, and a tongue that felt three sizes too big for his mouth, it did not



appeal to him much to hear 'Christians, Awake,' or the 'Herald Angels Sing.' What he did want on the morning after was a real

good sleep.

It was part of the pleasure at Christmas to know that the mill whistle did not blow at

7.30am."

The diggers and loggers had a good time and returned to Thames leaving practically all their savings during the past year behind them in Auckland.
It was the 'week after the week before' rath-

er than the 'morning after the night before'

which affected Paeroa in 1935.

The tumult and shouting of the Christmas shopping nights had died away and Belmont shopping nights had died away and Belmont and Normanby Roads were very quiet. The proverbial cannon ball could have been fired down the streets with little chance of injuring anyone. There had been a few 'rush hours' though, notably the rush of housewives to restock the larders. Shop assistants were noticed occupying their time redressing windows and restocking shelves, or flicking real and imaginary dust off stock.

Only the farmers who dashed in and out of

Only the farmers who dashed in and out of town between milkings seem to be their normal selves, sporting suntans from their outdoor chores. When the Christmas campers returned they would have a faraway look, still dreaming of warm sands, shady bush, swift flowing rivers, long roads, sandflies, mosqui-

toes, tin openers, and blown-down tents.

Christmas at Waihī in 1927 saw Seddon
Street crammed with people and continuous
streams pouring into and out of shops keeping the assistants at their wits ends trying to

meet the demands made on them.

The footpath was so densely crowded that rogress was extremely difficult and many took to the road. Farmers were present in their hundreds and the measure of their prosperity was illustrated by the remarkable array of motor cars, there being at one stage between 120 and 130 cars in the shopping section of Seddon Street. Members of the

section of Seddon Street. Members of the police were in evidence and tactfully handled the traffic, their cheery "Move on, please," always meeting with instant responses.

Even Father Christmas had to be admonished for causing people to congregate, but the old fellow took it kindly, and with a wag of his long white beard and a smile, went on his way.



Liquid feed to help plant health during summer

My pre-Christmas check on the long-term weather forecast for January indicated we may experience a mixture of rain and sunshine with temperatures marginally lower than what we experienced through December.

Moisture is a critical component of gardening at any time, so close monitoring is essential. Liquid feed is worth the effort to help plant health. It's about having the right balance which is often hard to judge.

Close observation of your plant and soil health is the key to a continual and abundant supply of fresh summer vegetables.

Considering the continual increase of the cost of fresh fruit and vegetables, it makes good sense to produce as much from your garden if possible. Vegetables grow best in full sun and a sheltered position. Our local garden centres will give good advice for the most cost-effective methods and your requirements.

Crops ready for harvest are beetroot, beans, carrots, corn, cucumbers, lettuce, zucchini, peas, potatoes, spinach and tomatoes. It is a time of extreme growth so if your harvest is more than you can cope with remember your neighbours, family, friends and the community garden table. It is a lovely thing to share your excess produce.

It's harvest time for nectarines, passionfruit, blueberry, strawberries, raspberries, apricot, peaches and plums, Plant new strawberry plants or trim long runners back to the centre of the plant to encourage another batch of fruit.

Revitalise plants after their growth spurt and keep them looking great through sum-

mer by giving them a homemade organic tea break. If you have a worm farm, use the liquid that collects at the bottom as your fertiliser. Dilute it first. Alternatively, you could buy liquid fertiliser from your garden centre.

Keep an eye out for Black Spot – large irregular black spots on leaves. Rust - brown pustules on the underside of leaves. Powdery Mildew – a white or light grey coating on foliage and stems. Make sure that plants aren't crowded to ensure they have maximum air circulation. Try to water around the base of the plants to avoid wet foliage and water early morning when possible. If despite your efforts powdery mildew does strike remove diseased foliage or whole plants immediately to help stop the spread.

In the flower garden keep summer flowering annuals looking beautiful, dead head regularly and provide regular deep watering especially those in pots. Cut back any that have become straggly.

Summer is hard for roses if the humidity increases. If black spot becomes a problem, spray immediately and continue fortnightly.

Dead head and give a light summer prune to encourage more flowering. Keep wellwatered and mulched. A regular sprinkle of sheep pellets around your roses with keep them well fed.

Don't forget your houseplants they need a bit more attention in the hotter months.

Lawns – Water lawns weekly and avoid cutting them too short.

Compost Heap – Turn frequently and keep moist.



Mining application concerns

More than 80 people gathered at a public meeting in Thames on December 11 to discuss opposition to an application for a gold mining permit over the Thames fore-

The local group, Thames Hauraki Anti Mining, supported by Coromandel Watchdog of Hauraki, presented information on the Hawkeswood Mining Limited applica-tion, which covers a 200.5 hectare section of off-shore coast between Thames town and Moanataiari.

The New Zealand Petroleum and Minerals website shows the company applied for the exploration permit on November 13, to search for gold and silver. The application is currently under evaluation.

currently under evaluation.

"The public meeting included many very concerned people who know this end of Tikapa Moana (Hauraki Gulf) is already badly degraded by pollution," Coromandel Watchdog chair Catherine Delahunty said.

"The last thing this foreshore needs is to be thing up. Pight now exploration of this area is

dug up. Right now exploration of this area is legal but mining is banned under Schedule 4 of the Crown Minerals Act. However, these are uncertain times and we need to protect the future of this sensitive coast from all

mining activity."

The meeting participants were keen to act to prevent impacts on fisheries, waters and the RAMSAR site next door to the permit, Catherine said. About 70 people signed a letter addressed to Hawkeswood Mining, stating that the community will peacefully oppose their activities.

Catherine said the meeting resolved to ask Thames-Coromandel District Council to oppose any consent applications from Hawkeswood Mining to explore the Firth.

Four councillors attended the meeting.

"People told us loud and clear that this mining company has no social or cultural licence to operate next to their town, and a number of actions to raise awareness and prepare for action are proposed," Catherine

Hawkeswood Mining Limited was charged with illegal mining at its Millers Flat site in Dunedin in 2024, after it was found to have extracted "considerable amounts" of gold while operating under an exploration

permit. The company accepted diversion and the charges were dropped.

Stone sculpture brings symposium to shopfronts

Asmall stone sculpture is quietly making its way through Thames' main street, helping to raise awareness of local artists and

Te Kapua [The Cloud], a sculpture by Davey McGhie of Titahi Bay, Porirua, was gifted to the Thames Public Art Trust [TPAT] following this year's Ngākau Carving Symposium at Thames South School. The work is carved from Taranaki andesite and mounted on a steel frame painted blue to represent the sky.

TPAT trustee Jenny McLeod. who has been closely involved with the project, said the sculpture was gifted to the trust following this year's Ngākau Carving Sym-

posium.

"We had been watching the Ngākau Carving Symposium at Thames South School for the last couple of years and wondering how we could support each other.

"After this year's event they ap-

"After this year's event they approached us with a gift - Te Kapua... We were thrilled to receive this gift and immediately decided it would be a great tool for promo-

Because Te Kapua is too small for permanent outdoor installation, the trust decided to use it as a travelling exhibition, placing it in shopfront windows along Thames' main street.

"So far it has been in my shopfront, Jenny McLeod Glass, Carson's Bookshop and now the

"We have no fixed timeframes for its display and it has been a casual arrangement with each business owner. We have been very grateful for the spaces provided so far," Jenny said.

The trust plans to continue find-

ing new locations for the sculpture around town next year, using it as a promotional tool for both the Ngākau Symposium and TPAT's wider work. "Our main aim is to wider work. "Our main aim is to create support and awareness of the Ngākau Symposium and our Thames Public Art Trust, and all the artists and volunteers involved in both, of which there are so many," Jenny said.

The Octopus, a striking new sculpture by artist Adrian Worsley, has been installed outside the Thames Civic Centre to mark 10 years of Steampunk the Thames, in collaboration with the Thames Public Art Trust. Crafted entirely from scrap metal, the artwork aims to reflect the unique character of Thames, where steampunk, history, and the Hauraki Rail Trail intersect. Standing at the civic centre since November, The Octopus joins Worsley's growing collection of sculptures found along the trail. Worsley designs and constructs his sculptures entirely from recycled materials from his studio in Te Aroha. His series of Bike Rack sculptures can be found displayed in Te Aroha's main street. The Trust acknowledged the support of Chris Fraser from The Memorial Company, who donated his time and use of a HiAb truck to transport the sculpture from Te Aroha to Thames. Records, rescues for The Fox fundraiser

Even as top Kiwi golfer Ryan for two Waihī Beach charities over December 13-15, the charities themselves were out saving lives. The sixth running of The Fox,

presented by Shimano Fishing New Zealand, raised a record \$60,800 for the Waihī Beach Surf Lifesaving Club and the Waihī Beach Coastguard, with 25 teams spending a day fishing on the Sun-day and a day playing golf on the Monday.

What really made things meaningful for the world No 38 golfer and two-time PGA Tour winner in 2025 was seeing the emergency services in action, putting those charity dollars to the best use im-

aginable.

As the tournament was kicking off on December 13 at the surf club, veteran Waihī Beach life-guard Christiaan Maarhuis was saving a young girl's life while out training in the waves. And during the fishing the following day, the new Gallagher Rescue patrol boat - partially funded by the tournament - made two emergency calls to help boaties in trouble.

"I spend a lot of time in Waihī Beach and Mum and Dad still have a place down here and they're both charities you hope you never have to use, but you've only got to look at what happened over the weekend," Fox said. "It's great to know someone has

your back when you're out there on the water and we're proud to have been able to make a difference over the past six years.

The tournament itself is a lot of fun but I'm really proud that we're

also looking after two great causes that legitimately save lives."

Maarhuis was heading out for a

ski paddle around 6:45pm when he noticed two young swimmers struggling and being pulled out to sea in half-metre swells, with the leash of a boogie board wrapped around the young girl's neck, while

her older brother tried to help.

Maarhuis immediately swam
over to the siblings, held the panicked young girl afloat, and removed the leash from her neck.

While Maarhuis assisted the girl

back through the waves on her board and back into the beach, an ex-Karioitahi lifeguard swam out with fins to help her brother in.

"It was a very close call for both of those kids," Maarhuis said, after reuniting both children with their anxious mum.

They got dragged out very quickly and were in pretty serious trouble by the time I got to them." The Waihī Beach Surf Lifesav-

ing Club has used the funds to help support an after-hours call-out squad - which Maarhuis is

involved in - while a new satellite base at Bowentown is also being built and fitted out with support from The Fox. The Coastguard, meanwhile, launched Gallagher Rescue, a specialist 10m Fantom RV1000 boat, with proceeds from The Fox helping get the boat on the water almost 12 months earlier than planned.

This year's tournament again featured a number of sporting ce-lebrities, including All Black wing Caleb Clarke, former All Blacks Mils Muliaina and Grant Fox,

Black Caps bowler Neil Wagner, Waihī Olympic gymnast Dylan Schmidt, rowing legend Eric Mur-ray, fishing personality Matt Wat-son and Bay of Plenty rugby stars Naitoa Ah Kuoi and Kurt Eklund. Muliaina showed his fishing

prowess by taking a prize for hauling in one of the largest trevally of the day, while the first-ever game fish was caught during The Fox, a 93.2kg striped marlin caught by Jared Radovancich. "I reckon I'll be smiling like this for the next year - what a day, what a day," a jubilant Radovancich said.

Event director, Sports Inc's Kelsen Butler, said support from the community continued to grow.

'It's amazing that [Fox] continues to make time for this tournament but when he sees first-hand what a difference it makes in a community he loves, it's one of those feel-good stories.

"It's also really heart-warming to see so many businesses and supporters... come together to raise much-needed funds.

The Fox has now raised \$275,000 for the two charities over the six years it has been running. This year's winning team was the Sandicappers.
